Cycle B -- Reflections on the Readings

Feast of the Holy Family

Theme: **“The Family that prays together lives together”**

Sirach 3:2-6,12-14; Psalm 128; Colossians 3:12-21; Luke 2:22-40



God is not just a noun but also a verb; God is not just a person but also a certain flow of life, between three divine persons of the Trinity. Inside God there is a kind of family life going on. So, he created human beings as he is, as a family. When within family we give and receive from each other, when within the family we break open our lives and hearts, joys and frustrations and finances, we are letting the life of God flow through us, and we are giving skin to the inner life of the Trinity.

Family is the basic cell of society because it is the cradle of life and love. It is basic because all that is accomplished by the family in favor of the person, is also service rendered to the society.

Intrinsic link between family and community

Family life and community life go together. Family life is not just the intimate; private relationship we sometimes imagine. The joys and sorrows, the successes and failures of family relate directly to the achievements and disasters of society at large. Today's Scripture sees the smaller unit of family as having a vital impact on the larger unit of community. The activity within the home transcends the environs of family to embrace all humankind.

Love binds others and brings them to perfection.

Our second reading from Colossians presents general principles for life in Christ and specific applications for the Christian home. To Page 3.....

Love is the quality that binds all the others together and brings them to perfection. Christians are members of the one body that is Christ himself (see 1 Corinthians 12:12-31) and that applies to the Christian home as well.

In the Gospel, Luke presents Mary and Joseph as the latter-day Hannah and Elkanah, who presented their son Samuel in the Temple in Shiloh (see 1 Samuel 1 and 2). Luke singles out Mary as the one who will suffer pain when Israel fails to respond. Mary's destiny is bound with the destiny of her people.

Walking in the footsteps of the Holy Family

Celebrating the Holy Family is important for all of us, as we live in a world that is becoming increasingly selfish, self-seeking, and self-centered. The ideals and values of Christians marriage and family life are becoming more and more difficult for the men and women of our age. Our secular society often considers the pains and sacrifices that go with marriage and family an unnecessary burden that must be rejected. The men and women of our generation often want to have their pleasures, and they are often not ready to make any serious sacrifices for the sake of the spouse or the child. They often not ready to forgive the spouse for hurts done them. They often expect too much from their spouse, while they themselves are not ready to give much.

We live in a time where trial marriages and divorce have become an everyday occurrence; a generation where the unfortunate phenomenon of single parenthood is becoming prevalent; it is within the context of an exaggerated secularism, where traditional family values are disapproved along with their spiritual and moral counterparts that we reflect upon the Holy Family.

Task of Christian Family and Marriage

For whereas the world runs away from suffering and pain, the Christian has the cross as the means of his or her salvation, for we know that nothing good comes easy. Christian marriage is a task, an enormous task. It may be a bed of roses, but it must be recognized that roses have thorns.

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The attempt by many people to enjoy the rose and yet reject the thorns is the root of the crisis in marriage and family life in our age. Christian marriage is a life of love. It takes time to grow and mature. It entails sacrifice raising children, and the sacrifice involved in forgiving an offending spouse and child.

In imitation of the Holy Family, a Christian family ought to be a praying family. Daily family prayer will send forth its members to their daily task with cheerful hearts; it will give them strength to meet the discouragements. Prayer must be the very core of the life of a family.

Let us pray for the family to be a model in our society and community. It is our first school and domestic church where we acquire knowledge. Let us imitate the Holy Family to be a model for others. Shalom!

LOOK forward to the FUTURE with CONFIDENCE


May the year 2021 bring us closer to our inner nature as social being who needs one another. May your dream and aspiration for the new year be achieved in Jesus name.
