In places of worship across this country, we gather to give praise to God.

## Cycle B -- Reflections on the Readings

### Fourteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Ezekiel 2:2-5; Psalm 123; 2 Corinthians 12:7-10; Mark 6:1-6

#### Theme: **Listen to the prophetic voice**

We all admire strength. The discovery that even our role models have weaknesses throws us for a loss. We value strength so greatly that we cope very poorly with weakness. Today's readings present three individuals who experienced significant weakness in the exercise of their mission. Ironically their achievements become a basis for hope. In weakness there can be strength.

#### **The Call of Ezekiel**

The first reading is part of Ezekiel's vocation scene. In the year 593 B.C. God appeared to this priest and called him to be a prophet in Babylon, the land of the Israelite's exile. Ezekiel felt the Lord's power but was also keenly aware of the hardheartedness of those around him. Nevertheless, he accepted. Ezekiel was often distraught, but he was also resilient -- weak yet strong.

#### **Paul acknowledges his weakness and strength.**

Paul says he was given "a messenger of Satan to torment me," to keep him from getting proud (2 Corinthians 12:7). Paul asks God to remove the affliction, "but he said to me, 'My grace is sufficient for you, for power is made perfect in weakness.' So, I will boast more gladly of my weaknesses, so that the power of Christ may dwell in me" (2 Corinthians 12:9). This experience helped Paul recognize the inter-relatedness of weakness and strength. The weaker the person, the greater the display of God's power.

We are basically people with limitation, our knowledge is limited, our abilities are limited, our virtues are limited. Our nature is touched by sin and therefore, we all have defects; we all fall short in one way or another. Yet sometimes we forget our limitations and vulnerability and begin to behave and boast about ourselves. Our weaknesses, our limitations do not call for despair, but faith in the power and grace of Christ. Jesus will give us a strength that is greater than problems we face. Let us remember that Paul's insufficiency was filled with Jesus' sufficiency.

We are told in the Gospel that, when Jesus returns to his hometown, the people reject him. They sense a glaring discrepancy between his family tree and his teaching and miracles. Jesus reacts with discouragement and astonishment. Apart from curing a few sick he works no miracles since the lack of faith is too distressing.

God can use our faults as well as our virtues. Weakness need not be the final word.

### **Using our prophetic voice**

One of the gifts we need to appreciate and respect in our brothers and sisters is the prophetic gift. A prophet is not necessarily one who foretells the future. He or she is the one who speaks for God, and speaks to us the truth, about ourselves, about the situation in our present society and about the changes we need to make in order that all may live in peace and harmony. "You are too selfish; You are arrogant; You are greedy; You are dishonest; Your following of Christ is mere lip-service". If someone were to say one or more of these things to us, how would we react? The fact is that none of us have any particular appetite for truth and hence, we tend to reject our own prophets and the truth they pass on to us in the name of God.

I pray that, the sufficiency of Jesus may fill our insufficiency; for when you are weak, then you are strong. Remain Blessed!

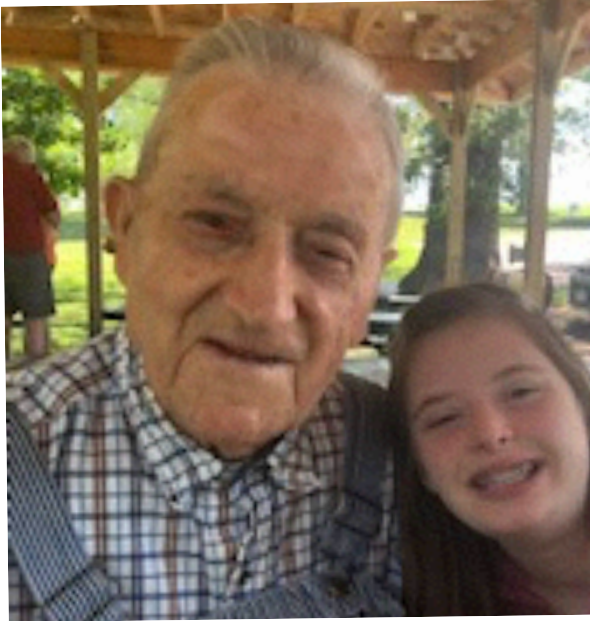
