### From the Pastor

Dear Parishioners.

This past week, all of us in the rectory wished Fr. George a hearty congratulations on his official retirement from full-time active ministry on January 1<sup>st</sup>. Jokingly, I suggested that he would



turn into a pumpkin at the stroke of midnight on New Year's Eve, but the sobering reality was that he was up on that Wednesday morning celebrating one of the Holy Day masses as he always did like the many decades that came before. Retirement and priesthood are often seen as mutually exclusive concepts...How are you retired, after all, if you keep doing the same things you did after as before? While the distinction between what is a vocation and a career is surely there, the reality of it all is unique to each priest and certainly evolves over times as different needs and situations suggest. Sometimes the difference can be subtle

We are very blessed to have now both Fr. George Morin and Fr. Bill McLaughlin as Senior Priests in Residence within our Collaborative. Both have been, and I anticipate will continue to be, very generous with their time and presence to our Collaborative's liturgies and a host of other pastoral activities. However, they have both made it clear: no meetings! In addition to enjoying a well-earned more relaxed schedule, each of them, of course, is free to engage in other pursuits or travel that may interest them. With a reduced schedule and a lifting of other pastoral responsibilities, they are empowered to simply be "priests," offering their time and help when and where they can.

That much being said, it is important for all of us to take note of some changes and realities that will affect our parishes in the months to come. To begin with, Fr. George is not going to be replaced by another full-time priest, at least not for the foreseeable future. The hard reality is that the number of full-time active priests serving in parishes across the Archdiocese continues to decline and will do so for the next 20 years or so before it settles to about 150 around the year 2040. Currently, there are 252 active priests serving in parishes within our Archdiocese. On average, we are losing approximately 13 priests a year right now due to retirement, illness, death, and occasional resignations from ministry. This is not unexpected, considering the significant demographic "bell-curve" of the large ordination classes from the 1950s and 1960s. (Fr. Bill was ordained in 1968, Fr. George in 1970). During that era, it was not uncommon to have 50 or more ordinations each year! By contrast, my ordination class of 1991 had only 13. Over the past 3 years, we have averaged 9 ordinations per year. All things being equal, there will come a time when the number of available priests will even out to a more consistent number, but not before we lose another 100 from our present ranks.

So what does all this mean for us in our Collaborative? I'd be filthy rich if I could accurately predict every twist and turn of the future (I'm not and I can't!), but here are a few challenges and realities that we will be facing and working

on together in the months ahead:

First, a reduced availability for "emergency sacramental coverage." To be honest, for guite some time now, most parishes have no longer been able to provide seamless "24 -hour-a-day / 7-days-a-week / 365-days-a-year" emergency coverage. I'd say that actually ended more than a decade ago. In praxis, we have all been doing our best to respond as generously as we can, as often as we can...and that has enabled us to meet most needs in a reasonably, timely fashion. Most of the time. Going forward, however, while we will certainly continue to do everything that we can, there will be times when people will experience a substantially delayed response if they call at the last minute looking for a priest. It is not reasonable to expect retired priests to be responsible for covering after-hours or overnight emergencies. Since my time here within our Collaborative, the number of active priests available to cover Anna Jacques Hospital has been reduced from 6 in 2011 to 3 at present in 2020. Three of us simply cannot do what 6 used to do. So, what can be done? Interestingly, a number of things!

The very best and most helpful response to this situation is for parishioners not to wait until the last moment before inviting myself or another priest to come visit a loved-one who is ill and not doing well. While there will always be unexpected moments and tragedies that can't be foreseen, in reality, most of the "emergency" calls we receive are for patients who have been sick for a long time and have been in the hospital or convalescent care for months, if not years. It would be such a joy to visit with them and offer the Sacrament of Anointing long before some medical extremus brings them to a point where they are "actively dying." There is a great richness in the Sacraments of the Sick that often gets minimalized when a priest is called in at the last minute. The Sacrament of Anointing, accompanied by Holy Communion and the opportunity for Confession are best celebrated when the person is alert and able to benefit the most from these moments of prayer, which often can be arranged within days on most weeks. When accompanied by the loving presence of family members, it can be an incredibly moving experience for all who are affected by the illness. Additionally, offering this sacrament more regularly at weekend liturgies will help those who may be anticipating hospitalization or surgery.

As we go forward the roles of Deacons and trained lay ministers will also be able to engage some of these needs. The official "last rites" of the Church include what is known as "Viaticum," which features special prayers for the last time a person receives Holy Communion (if they are able) and also what is called "The Commendation of the Dying"—the final prayers before death. Any Deacon, Priest, or trained layperson may offer "The Last Rites" in a time of need.

Another helpful response in addressing this new reality is to better utilize the Collaborative's office staff during scheduled business hours. Most weeks, Monday through Friday from 8 until 3:30 p.m., our very dedicated, experienced staff are in the Pastoral Center Office building and ready to help anyone who calls. They are amazing at

arranging all sorts of help for parishioners who are in need, including scheduling priestly visitation, appointments, connecting people to available resources, etc....But all that ends once the office is closed for the day. While it is still possible most days (but not necessarily all) to reach a priest through our answering service after-hours, I am considerably more limited in what I can accomplish without the staff present. So, as much as humanly possible, I urge you to anticipate what needs might be there for you and your family and plan ahead to work through our wonderful staff when they are present.

Yet another aspect of priestly retirement and a reduction in the number of assigned priests in our Collaborative will be simply how many Masses we will be able to offer on given days. So far, we have been working very hard to maintain the weekend schedule as we have become accustomed to it, but there will be moments due to illness or vacation periods when we will not be able to schedule mass every day within our Collaborative. This might even require a reduced weekend schedule in the future, but we are not "there" yet. It is important to keep this in mind when considering some of these possible changes—that just before we formed our Collaborative in 2015, Immaculate Conception and Holy Redeemer parishes enjoyed, collectively, the services of 3 full-time priests, a Permanent Deacon and two retired priests in-residence. Now we have 1 full-time priest, a Permanent Deacon and two retired priests in-residence. I am actively working to see if a third retired priest might be able to come live with us in the near future as well as working with the Archdiocese to try and bring a second Permanent Deacon to serve our Collaborative. If successful in both of these endeavors, they will be a tremendous help to us all as well as providing for a "deeper bench" for those moments when an illness or emergency comes up. As one priest recently said over dinner, "We are just one bad cold or slip and fall away from a priest-less Sunday" in one of our area parishes.

So, I want you to know that these things are being discussed and considered among the priests, our staff, and will be part of upcoming conversations at Collaborative Pastoral Council meetings as well. I am hopeful that we will discover graceful and substantial solutions to these and other issues we will face in the years to come. After all, it is Christ's Church, and the Lord has promised to remain with us until the end of time, no matter how many priests are wandering the streets at any given moment. So, there is great hope to be had by all! Our continued prayers for vocations are also essential, that anyone who might be considering priesthood or religious life will find the support and encouragement from all of us to properly discern what path in life that God has opened for them.

As always, I would certainly welcome your thoughts and ideas. Let us keep one another in prayer and please know that I, along with all who serve the people of our parishes are committed in ministry to doing everything we can to share the Gospel and the Lord's Saving Presence with you and your families in both times of joy and sorrow. May God bless the good work we have begun and bring it to completion according to His will.



# Call for Eucharistic Ministers and Lectors

We are seeking additional Lay Ministers to assist at Mass

What is an Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion? Often referred to as simply a "Eucharistic Minister" an EM is a lay person who assists the priest in distributing Holy Communion at Mass. While the priest or deacon is viewed by the Church as the "ordinary minister of Holy Communion," because of the large number of people attending Mass, it would be impractical or impossible for the clergy alone to offer Communion to so many. EMs are trained to help for precisely this reason. At most Masses at IC, we usually need 4 or 5 trained EMs to allow our Communion procession to go smoothly. It is an important role. EMs may also volunteer to take the Blessed Sacrament to those who are ill or otherwise unable to attend Mass i.e., nursing homes, hospital, in home, etc.

What is a **Lector**? A Lector is a lay person who assists at Mass by reading passages from the Old and New Testament and leading the Universal Prayer or "Prayers of the Faithful" at Sunday Mass when the Deacon is not present.

Both Lectors and EMs are baptized, confirmed, practicing Catholics in good standing with the Church and living a life of prayer and service within our community.

If you or someone you know might be interested in serving in either of these two ministries or have any questions about what it means to serve, please contact Mary Zerigian or Mary Ann Lawler. Training will be provided.
