### From the Pastor

Dear Parishioners.

Many years ago, on a warm September evening, I had the window of my seminary dorm room wide open, the screen in place, of course, desperately trying to catch the faintest of breezes that might pass by. It was going to be a



late-night study session, so I had all the lights on, books spread all over the floor and bed. To fuel this endeavor, I decided at one point to get a soda and a snack—that my concentration might be strengthened for the task ahead. As sometimes happens, I got distracted by a few others doing the same thing, got lost in a longer conversation than I really could have afforded at that moment...and by the time I returned to my room: I had company!

Actually, lots of company. Company in the thousands, that is. Unbeknownst to me, while I was off snacking, thousands of tiny bugs had found their way through tiny holes in the screen and were now swarming around my overhead light, casting its 100-watt glow for all to see. It was really grotesque and disgusting. Did I mention that they were swarming?! "Now what do I do?" I thought. After spending what felt like hours trying to vacuum up each little critter (after I actually found a working vacuum, that is) I had to give up on the studying for the night and finally admit defeat, hoping I hadn't missed any of the little suckers, creeping in the corners. Note to self: Light attracts bugs! Do not leave light on and window open! Remembering that event more than 35 years ago still gives me the shudders.

Light attracts. Any one of us who have ever struggled through a power outage knows how much we rely on light to find our way around and live our lives. While it can be fun to sit outside at night and ponder the heavens, most of us prefer the convenience of electricity and all the clarity it brings to our daily tasks. If the rest of the house is darkened and the light is on in one room—it beckons to us, invites us to enter into its glow and warmth. It is there that we will find life!

It is in this same vein that Isaiah prophesied that Israel will be a beacon for the rest of the world to come and bask in God's light. As a servant of God, this attraction, this innate power to gather will extend far beyond the Tribes of Israel and will be for all peoples of all times and places.

Last week, we brought to a close the cycle of our Advent-Christmas Season, where we first unpacked the mystery of the two comings of Christ, then celebrated His Nativity, rejoiced in the simplicity of the Holy Family, proclaimed Christ's destiny to be a light for all nations at Epiphany and finally the empowerment of God's plan of salvation at the beginning of His earthly ministry in the Baptism of the Lord. When viewed from "30,000 feet," what God was, is and continues to do in Christ is magnificent in every way.

What is amazing, too, is that we are called to be part of this plan of Salvation through our own baptism. It is a sacrament that calls into action—to proclaim Christ risen from the dead and the hope in Jesus's Resurrection for all

of us to enjoy the life of Heaven forever. And we are to do this in such a way that we attract others to Christ, just like the light gathered the flying critters in my seminary room those decades ago.

If we stop and think about it, what attracts us to others? I suppose there is the natural, physical attraction that brings people together in relationship and marriage. OK, fair enough. But we are drawn to others for many different reasons, too. Think of those who are kind to us, those who are good listeners, those who seem to have the automatic ability to "get or understand" us. Then, there are those who are always ready to help us out, to encourage us when we are feeling down or the ones in life who always see the best in us. They are the ones who are ready to forgive us when we fail and challenge us to persevere when we are ready to give up. These precious people are our parents, siblings, family, friends, co-workers, classmates, and neighbors. They are like bright, shining lights that lift us up and illumine our days when we need it most. They love us unconditionally and model for us what we hope to embody and return back into our world. Could this be what Isaiah meant about being a light for others?

We are attracted to people who seem to have that consistent, inner ability to inspire and bring hope. We see peace in them, draw strength from their example and encouragement from their triumph over the struggles of life. If you have ever met someone who truly knows what it means to love in this world, you know that there is an inner part of you that says, "I want what they have!" This is what we hope to offer the world in Jesus Christ—that as His disciples in this present age we might embody His selfless love, His sacrificial example, His empathy, His compassion, His forgiveness, His mercy...so completely, that it will shine out into a world that is so often filled with darkness. According to God's plan of salvation, each of us will be called in a wide variety of ways to emulate this love, this light in our own unique circumstances, but it will all have as its ultimate source the same Jesus Christ who is Lord.

In the weeks ahead, we will begin to unpack and break open Jesus' teaching and parables so that we may have a greater understanding of our own baptismal call to holiness. Let us listen well that we, too, might shine brightly before others and draw in those who seek His loving presence.

Leadership Team organizes mitten, sock, and coat drives; Thanksgiving dinner baskets for the local food bank; and food collections at our monthly masses. In addition, individual grades support various non-profit organizations that support the sick, the elderly, adults with special needs, and endangered animals. Over the years, many of our students have organized their own initiatives. One that is near and dear to our hearts is "Cookies for Haiti" which was started by Margot Anderson-Song when she was a young student at the IC. A more recent example is "The Blueberry Club." Fourth grade students Brooke, Reece, and Anthony, pictured, have something in common—blue bands on their braces. Notably—IC blue. The trio has pooled their intellectual resources to raise money for national and local organizations. They also make bracelets and other craft items to sell as a way to raise money to donate. In these challenging times it is comforting to know that our children actively believe that they can and do make a difference. These lessons are an important part of an Immaculate Conception education.

## Call for Eucharistic Ministers and Lectors

We are seeking additional Lay Ministers to assist at Mass

What is an Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion? Often referred to as simply a "Eucharistic Minister" an EM is a lay person who assists the priest in distributing Holy Communion at Mass. While the priest or deacon is viewed by the Church as the "ordinary minister of Holy Communion," because of the large number of people attending Mass, it would be impractical or impossible for the clergy alone to offer Communion to so many. EMs are trained to help for precisely this reason. At most Masses at IC, we usually need 4 or 5 trained EMs to allow our Communion procession to go smoothly. It is an important role. EMs may also volunteer to take the Blessed Sacrament to those who are ill or otherwise unable to attend Mass i.e., nursing homes, hospital, in home, etc.

What is a Lector? A Lector is a lay person who assists at Mass by reading passages from the Old and New Testament and leading the Universal Prayer or "Prayers of the Faithful" at Sunday Mass when the Deacon is not present.

Both Lectors and EMs are baptized, confirmed, practicing Catholics in good standing with the Church and living a life of prayer and service within our community.
