### From the Pastor

Dear Parishioners,

When all is right with the world, when everything is going our way, when we have no cares to keep us up and awake at night, when peace and goodness just ooze from our pores...it can seem easy



to follow the ways of God. Attend a worship service, say a prayer for someone less fortunate than ourselves, give to charity, help out with some volunteering...and do it all with a smile that exudes our inner joy.

Sounds nice, doesn't it? If any of us actually have a day like that above, well...good for you! I guess we all need one or two of them here and there to keep us going. But most of life is not lived in the saccharine technicolor of a classic movie, but in the midst of pain and disappointment, indignation and frustration. We are called to engage our relationship with God whether we are feeling particularly cheerful on a given day or not. Our friendship with the Lord is not something that we can reserve only for days when we are reasonably certain that we are in a state of Grace, but it must be put into action when we are unhappy, confused, or wounded. It has to be something that is real enough that it can dwell and coexist within our souls on the bleakest of days, not just in the fair weather and sunshine. Even when we sin and persist in sinning, God's love is there for us, unchanged. Can we love God back in those dark moments, even if it is imperfect, even if our contrition needs improvement, our love purifying, and our humility a much-needed increase? In other words, do we need to completely get our act together in order to follow Christ, or can we work on it along the way?

The Scriptures we encounter this weekend give us some hints that ongoing conversion is the name of the game for us disciples. Starting with the example of Jonah, we see how God can work through our greatest prejudices and hatred. Jonah, plain and simple, hated the Ninevites. Rather than embrace an apostolic zeal for their repentance and conversion, Jonah would have liked nothing better than to see the Ninevites be destroyed and consumed in divine fire and brimstone. So much so, being the prophetic instrument of their conversion was the last thing he wanted to see happen. So he travelled in the opposite direction away from Nineveh, and when he reached the edge of the sea and could walk no more, he boarded a boat to go farther, when he was cast into the sea, swallowed by a fish and spat up upon the shore. Only then did he resign (Continued on page 4)

himself to the fact that he had to do what God had in store for him. And even then, can you imagine a more halfhearted prophet than Jonah? His actual preaching must have been far from the enthusiastic and passionate proclamation of God's Word that we expect of someone on a divine mission. And yet, because Jonah actually went ahead and did what God asked of him, God's Word was effective. And the Ninevites repented. And Jonah was left to sort out his anger and frustration. God's care for Jonah was constant, however, as was God's care for the Ninevites who were lost in their sins and confusion. That Jonah's personal holiness needed some sprucing up did not deter God's Word from working powerfully through him, despite his own misunderstandings and indignation. Read the whole Book of Jonah sometime. It is short-only 4 chapters. And see if you don't recognize yourself in some of its many-colored characters. The line about the King decreeing that every man and beast shall be covered in sackcloth as a sign of repentance surely underscores the hyperbole of it all! Can you imagine trying that with your cat?

And then we have the encounter of Christ calling the fishermen: Simon and Andrew, James and John. Now, lest we think of these 4 as angelic souls just waiting for someone to ask them to go do something good for some unfortunate other....Let's take a reality check here. They were fishermen. They had what is arguably one of the most difficult and dangerous jobs on the planet both in Jesus' time as well as ours. They fished in all weather-heat and cold, rain and snow, wind and chill. And the occasional pleasant day, too, I guess. Many of them couldn't swim, so staying in the boat was critical to their survival. They had little "gear" to assist them-just some nets that were always in need of mending. They hauled the fish ashore by the raw strength of their backs, fighting with all their might against the billion-year-old survival instincts of the fish to get free of the net and as far away from these guys as they could. Some days the fish were more plentiful than others. Some

days there were no fish anywhere to be found. Some days they had to question whether it was all worth it. I don't know what the Hebrew version of a four-letter word might be, but you can be guaranteed that these guys knew them all. They were scrappy, salt-of-the-earth survivalists who eked out a living at the waters' edge. Paradigms of holiness? Radiating God's unconditional love? Epitomes of mercy and forgiveness? Well, not yet.

But that didn't stop Jesus from calling to them and inviting them on the journey of a lifetime, to discover, along the way, the joys and secrets of God's Kingdom that was already unfolding in their midst. You see, that is the great secret that we have been immersed in: that God's Kingdom begins in the here and now, even if it will come to its completeness later on. The point here is simple: come as you are, with all of your imperfections, sins, and shortfalls. God will not be deterred by them. God will always call us to more, but always love us as we are. And that love of God is enough to transform the most hardened of hearts and penetrate every toughened and crusty exterior. God cared for the hated Ninevites and the unwilling prophet with equal measure. God's mercy was poured out on Saul who persecuted the early Church as well as on the wealthy Corinthians whom he would one day preach to. God chose earthy fishermen to become a living testimony to the sublime and eloquent outpouring of God's love through Jesus Christ. And not one of them ever reached perfection in word or deed before beginning what would be the long pilgrimage home to their Creator.

So, wherever you are on this day, saint or sinner or somewhere in between...let us continue to seek and follow the One who transforms hearts, forgives sins, and calls us all to share in the Good News. In Jesus' Name may we have new life, and have it in abundance.

### Live-streamed Ecumenical **Candlelight** Taizé **Meditation Service**

On Sunday evening, January 31, at 7:00 p.m., you are cordially invited to attend a candlelight meditation service which will be live-streamed on the Groveland Congregational Church Facebook page, and also available afterward for viewing. The program will also be available for printing on the Facebook page.

The theme of this month's service is "Behold, I make all things new!" As we begin a new year, we hope and pray for justice, peace, respect, and kindness. We pray for the guidance of God's spirit. The service is modeled after those held at the Taizé community in France, with prayer, song, scripture, petitions, and silence.

Taizé prayer is a simple form of ecumenical Christian prayer centered on scripture, silence and song. It involves singing and listening to the word of God in an atmosphere of silence and peace. The worship space will be illuminated with a multitude of candles: the music will consist of simple repeated refrains, enabling the worshippers to enter into prayer. There will be readings from scripture, petitions, and a time of silent prayer.

Why not give yourself the gift of these few moments of calm and peace in God's presence!
