From the Pastor

Dear Parishioners,

A few weeks ago, I was up in New Hampshire enjoying a few days of leafpeeping with a friend. We decided one evening to enjoy a dinner at a local restaurant indoors, something neither of us have done much of for most of this



year. Like most places these days, the restaurant required us to wear face masks when moving to or from our table, but once seated, we, of course, could remove the masks in order to enjoy the meal. The restaurant was well laid out and the adjoining tables were at a good distance. The staff wore their masks religiously and the meal was carefully served. As far as I could tell, every effort was made to follow the safest practices of the industry. For a precious few moments, I was lulled into forgetting the pandemic and all of the contortions it has forced upon us. After an enjoyable and relaxing meal, we paid the bill and then headed for the door. I got about half way there, only to realize that I had forgotten to put my face mask back on. There was a moment, really a split second, when I considered trying to fish it out of one of my pockets (which one had I placed it into?) Then, seeing a clear path to the door with no one else around (waitstaff or other customers) I made a hasty dash for the door and was outside in the "safe" fresh air once again.

Following COVID19 safety procedures is frustrating. Everything we do, even when we are supposed to be relaxing or on our "down time" is affected by our need to be vigilant against the virus. Although my minor faux pas leaving the restaurant went unchallenged and probably unnoticed by anyone other than myself, it served as a reminder for me not to grow complacent or to give up our good efforts to stay healthy and keep each other safe. Without an effective treatment or vaccine, there is no one action that any of us can take that will be completely effective against spreading this disease. Rather, it is through the many layers of partial protection that we find a modicum of safety and hope.

Right now, it is very apparent that many of us are getting tired of living life under a pandemic. We long for the "before time" when things were easier and more carefree. Sometimes, like during my dinner out, we can momentarily forget the importance of remaining focused on preserving those layers of protection and why we do these things not only for ourselves but also for those around us and in our wider communities. One of the truly insidious aspects of this Coronavirus is the long incubation time before an infected person begins to show signs of illness and, even worse, the fact that so many can be infected, contagious, and yet show no signs of illness at all. That means that potentially any one of us could be either pre-symptomatic or asymptomatic at any given moment. That's scary! It's one thing to feel sick and stay home and away from people because you don't feel well. It's another thing altogether to constantly presume that you could be sick or be a carrier of disease and-always and at every moment-make adjustments to your life so that you minimize the possibility (Continued on page 4)

of spreading it to others. That's exhausting. But it is the reality of where we are at until an effective treatment or vaccine is made widely available. Left unchecked, the virus, combined with the "normal" rise in seasonal flu infections has the great potential to overwhelm our healthcare systems this fall and winter. Effectively, what that means is that when overrun with patients, our hospitals can no longer treat everyone who gets sick, but must "triage" the patients according to their likelihood of being able to benefit from treatment, devoting the precious care resources first to those most likely to respond to that care. In that nightmare scenario, heart-wrenching decisions would have to be made about who gets care and who will not. It is something that every healthcare worker dreads. It truly is apocalyptic.

Collectively, it is within our power to prevent this nightmare from occurring. Right now, infection rates are rising within our Collaborative as well as neighboring cities and towns. I want to take a moment to remind everyone about the basics of our defense against this modern-day plague and encourage your vigilance. These are:

- ⇒ **wearing a face mask** at all times when in public, inside buildings or when there is any chance of an encounter with others outside of your home
- ⇒ wearing the face mask **properly**—that is so that it <u>covers both nose and mouth</u>
- \Rightarrow maintaining a proper **6-foot social distance** from others
- ⇒ washing your hands religiously throughout the day
- \Rightarrow staying home if you feel sick

Now is the time for us to double-down on our efforts to keep each other safe. In the words of St. Paul, "Do not grow weary of doing what is right." (2Thes 3:13) Let us not grow complacent or weary about doing what we know is effective in helping to slow down this spread. This weekend, we celebrate the great feast of All Saints and our enduring hope that one day we might join in their number. Let's not hasten that moment for ourselves or anyone else by failing to engage our God-given gift of reason. Although we are numbingly sick of COVID protocols and procedures, please let us continue to make these small sacrifices for the greater good of our families, friends, neighbors and the many strangers they may benefit. I think God will bless us richly if we do.

Although I understand that many have already voted by mail or early in-person absentee ballots, I would most strongly encourage every registered voter to exercise their right to vote if you have not already done so. As your pastor, I will never tell you who to vote for. That is the realm of your individual, well-formed conscience. Here, the Holy Spirit speaks to you directly and, if we make ourselves docile to the Spirit's guidance, will help move our choices to the good that God calls us to. What I do ask is that you take the time to pray before entering the polling centers, thoughtfully consider each ballot question and candidate for public office, then vote according to your conscience. Afterwards, pray that the choices you have made along with those of your brothers and sisters, and always under God's providence, will bring about great blessings for our local communities, nation, and world. Please see that our careful, prayerful exercising of this right of citizenship is both a moral duty and obligation before the Lord.

Finally, I want to bring two small changes to your attention with regard to Masses. First, after consultation with our Collaborative Pastoral Council, we will be extending the registration times for weekend Masses to shortly before each begins. This is to give as many who would like to attend a Mass the chance to register and join us. Registration helps us in two important ways: it helps us to make sure that we don't have too many people trying to attend any one Mass so that we can maintain proper distancing in the pews, and it also gives us a convenient way to have an accurate list of those who attended a specific Mass should it be necessary for contact-tracers to reach out to parishioners in the case of an outbreak of COVID-19. Thankfully, we have not yet had any issues. Greeters will still be on-hand at church to take down the names of any who hadn't registered but still might like to attend that Mass provided there are seats still available. I encourage every parishioner who would like to attend a weekend Mass in person to either register ahead of time online through our website, or to call our office during business hours and we will register you over the phone.

The second small change is that we will be expanding our Daily Masses at 9:00 a.m. from Monday through Friday at Immaculate Conception Church beginning Monday, Nov. 2. It is my hope to eventually move the Monday and Friday Masses to St. Ann Church in West Newbury and Nativity Church in Merrimac respectively, but we have not yet received enough volunteers to assist at these Masses as Greeters, Lectors, Extraordinary Ministers of the Eucharist, or Cleaners in those worship spaces. We continue to welcome people to volunteer in these capacities, and once we have sufficient numbers, we will plan to move the Monday and Friday Masses to these Holy Redeemer Churches. In the meantime, we will celebrate Daily Mass at IC. Monday through Friday at 9:00 a.m. Due to the smaller numbers involved, it is not necessary to register ahead of time for Daily Mass, however, a greeter will be present to take down your name for contact-tracing purposes.

As we move into November, let us invoke the prayers of the Saints and remember those who have gone before us into the mystery of death. May the Lord one day reunite us with all of our loved ones at the great banquet table in the Heavenly Kingdom.

If you are a volunteer you must fill out a \underline{C} riminal \underline{O} ffender \underline{R} ecord Information Form every year.

The Archdiocese of Boston requires all clergy, all parish staff (full and part-time), and all volunteers (18 years of age and older) who minister to or have the potential for unmonitored access to children, youth, elderly, or the disabled will undergo an annual CORI check.

No matter what you volunteer to do, if your duties are carried out on parish property, or under the parish name, you must be CORI-ed every year.

IC Haiti Update

We are blessed to report that the impacts of the COVID-19 virus in Haiti have been minimal compared to other regions of the world, including the United States. We received an update from Puit Chacha earlier this month that the school is up and running.

Like schools here, the Fr. Marc Piché elementary school in Chacha closed for classes back in March. St. Boniface Hospital's community health team immediately began to conduct education sessions around Chacha, with participants that included the school staff. In July, the students started returning once each week to pick up nutrition assistance kits as well as homework packets to complete. Fortunately, now that students are back for inperson learning, the school's classrooms have the space to accommodate social distancing. It should be noted the school staff worked diligently to source masks, additional chairs, disinfecting supplies, and materials for additional handwashing stations throughout the space.

Throughout the time of the pandemic, the hospital health team has been consulting with the school on effective distancing measures, proper hygiene, and infection control protocols, including a process for referring symptomatic students to the hospital for testing. Thus far, there haven't been any infections at the school. The hospital's community outreach program will continue to monitor the Chacha community for symptoms of an outbreak.

There are 164 students attending school at Chacha this semester. 176 children are enrolled but 12 did not return after the COVID-19 closure. It's anticipated that they will return for the spring semester in November. In addition, there are graduates of the Fr. Marc elementary school who are attending secondary school in Fond des Blanc. The move up to secondary school has been made possible by tuition scholarships provided by IC Haiti.

As a community of faith, let us continue to keep the community of Puit Chacha, Haiti, in our thoughts and prayers. Our parish's financial support, even during a time of pandemic when parishioners' own financial situations have been sorely strained, has kept hope alive in the Chacha community by continuing to make education and health services available. Thanks be to God for sustaining us in this ministry.

Since last March, educators across the country have worried about the impact of remote learning on student achievement due to COVID. Last spring, public schools limited learning to the review of previously taught concepts, which was predictably going to limit growth in student achievement. Educators pondered whether

or not to test students immediately upon their arrival back in school in September to measure the deficit in the learning gap, with concern about imparting additional emotional stress on students. Our state's vision of a full return to school for all children is not where we landed in September, and thus the administering of standardized tests to determine the gap in learning was off the table.

Immaculate Conception School has had an advantage over large public school districts throughout the pandemic. From March through June, we continued to deliver instruction of new material in all grades. In September, we started school on September 2, as planned, offering 5 full days a week of in-person instruction to our working families, and a hybrid or fully remote schedule to others. We tested our students in September to determine if a learning gap had occurred since last spring and were delighted with what we found.

The IC administers NWEA MAP Tests three times a year in September, January, and May to students in grades 2-8. MAP tests measure student growth as well as achievement against national norms for Math, Reading and Language Usage, and Science for grades 5-8. The computerized tests are adaptive in that students answer an individualized series of questions based on success. An analysis of Immaculate Conception School students' scores from Winter 2020 to Fall 2020 shows an increase in national achievement level across all areas. Grade 3-8 students who maintained or increased in Math: 63%, Reading: 79%, Language Usage: 75% and Science (Gr 6-8) 71%. Individual grade breakdowns for Math, Reading, Language Usage, and Science reveals students maintained or increased in all areas for all grades, with the exception of only one area—Gr 6 Math where 48% increased their score while 52% dropped.

Again this year, the IC will subscribe to a digital tool called Edmentum "Exact Path," which pairs directly with students' MAP test scores, to challenge students in skills that their MAP test results identified as areas for improvement. The challenges are delivered skill-by-skill in Math, Reading, and Language Usage, which students tackle at their own speed. Exact Path is personalized for students and provides teachers with detailed information about student growth and success.

The IC will measure student achievement again in January, if the COVID impacted learning environment permits it. MAP tests or not, the IC will continue to deliver instruction to students on new material for the duration of the school year. We are dedicated to and focused on our students' academic success and growth, which is at the core of our mission.
