### From the Pastor

#### Dear Parishioners,

Lazarus was dead. Stone-cold, dead as a doorknob, so to speak. We know this because the Gospel makes it a point for us to hear that he was dead for four days. Not three, not two, but four. Four is significant because in ancient times,



people were not as medically clear as to when death actually occurred or when the soul was known to leave the body. Sometimes it was the case that a person could be in a very deep coma, breathing only slightly and infrequently. Although rare, it might be the case that an individual could recover from this deep coma and be restored to health. But four days in, they were a corpse and the inevitable decay would have begun.

Jesus' raising of Lazarus was a crescendo of His earthly ministry-if Jesus of Nazareth could even raise a bona fide dead man to life, nothing could stop Him or His ministry to spread the Good News. For those of weak faith, there is no greater sign of hope that the earthly Jesus could have offered. For those who already believed, it was a confirmation of God's goodness and that God was fully blessing Jesus in everything that He did. For those who did not believe or obstinately refused to believe. . . well, it was the final straw in their quest to discredit and undermine Jesus' work. They walked away from this supposed miracle convinced that Jesus had to die. In one sense, it was the most polarizing of all miracles. When confronted with a resuscitated Lazarus, there was little room to debate: you either believed in God's complete power over life and death, or you walked away convinced of a hoax, steeled in your resolve to destroy the perpetrator.

Jesus' miracles were always divisive, unsettling the witnesses at the deepest levels. How disturbed must the mourners of Jairus' daughter have been when Jesus threw them out of the house and proclaimed that the little girl was merely sleeping. They even went so far as to ridicule Him, before being reduced to silence when the child would later appear, healthy and whole. Or what of the people of Nain, who accompanied the poor widow in the din of a funeral procession out of the city only to be stopped by Jesus. Touching the casket and commanding the young man to arise, he gave him back to his mother before a stunned crowd. And then, right after His Transfiguration on Mount Tabor, there was the father who brought his son, possessed by a demon. Casting the demon out, the boy lay dead before the frenzied crowd. Jesus simply took him by his hand, raised him up, and gave him back to his father.

Dead is dead. But again and again, with Jesus there is life. These most dramatic of all His miracles leave a potent question in the hearts and minds of all who witness or even hear of them: Did this really just happen, or is this some kind of profound misunderstanding? You really can't have it both ways. Lazarus was either really dead and Jesus brought him back to life again, or something else happened. Four days, though. . . . Nope. Really dead! It doesn't leave much room for questions, except the most important one: to believe that Jesus is the Son of God, or not.

These days we are being faced with a rising death toll and skyrocketing list of those who have been exposed to or become sick with the COVID-19 coronavirus. If there ever was a "shadow of death" that Psalm 23 references, this is it. We will experience great suffering in our community and beyond because of it. But the fundamental question is still asked, just as it was in Jesus' time: Do you believe? Do

you believe that Jesus has power over microbes and illness as He does over sin and death? Do you believe that Jesus is still present in our community despite our suffering and misfortune? Do you believe that we will find healing and wholeness in body, mind, and soul, just as Jesus promised us? Do you believe that through Jesus we all have the promise and pledge of eternal life? Do you believe in Jesus' power to heal and restore?

#### Do you believe?

Of all the questions we ask, this is the most fundamental. Because how we answer it will determine our path to the future—either to walk in faith and trust with the God through whom all things are possible, or to walk away, frustrated and empty. Believing means everything changes and life begins anew. A failure to believe means nothing changes and we are stuck with what we have. Dead is dead: an end, a failure, a senseless loss, a cruel joke—all wormwood and gall.

But with Jesus, dead is not dead, but rather there is new life and hope. Peace and joy will exist hand in hand, without "social distancing" or that vague sense of mistrust that has invaded our spirits, "six-foot rule" or not. With Jesus there is complete and total resurrection on such a scale that our mere human words fall apart in trying to describe the superlative of it all. In Jesus Christ there is life and hope. So, no matter how vexing life may appear in the days ahead, no matter what challenges we might face personally or globally, remember the answer you give to this one question: Do you believe?

For Lazarus there was only one answer. For Martha and Mary, there was only one answer. For Jesus' disciples there was only one answer. For the Martyrs and Saints there was only one answer. May our hearts be so convinced as well. Because when we believe, only then do we really begin to live!

## **Collaborative Update**

As of March 24, 2020

Dear Parishioners,

As the COVID-19 coronavirus crisis continues to unfold, we continue to get updates every day directing us to follow various policies and procedures as they affect our community life and worship. Frankly, it has been difficult to keep up with all of them, as things have been changing so rapidly.

As of this moment, in response to Governor Baker's latest advisory and orders, we have been asked to close all parish offices to the public. Many of our Collaborative staff will continue to work from their homes and be in communication through email and phone messages. I would direct your attention to the following:

- All public masses are suspended, however we will continue to livestream private masses on the weekends at 4pm on Saturday and 10am on Sunday through Facebook and our website. I would encourage all parishioners to "attend" Mass virtually until we are given the ability to gather in our churches once again. We have been notified today that this will likely affect our Holy Week and Easter celebrations this year. Plans are being made to celebrate these special moments virtually as well.
- Although we cannot take up a physical collection in church, the parishes of our Collaborative are very much in need of your continued financial support. Even though we are unable to offer public worship, many of our expenses continue through this time including utilities, vendor payments, employee salaries and fixed benefits. We are working to reduce these costs as much as possible. Nonetheless, if you are in a position to do so, I would encourage you to mail-in your regular contributions and / or utilize our on-line giving program.
- While we have been prohibited from celebrating funerals in the church buildings, we are allowed to be present to funeral home and graveside services as needed, provided the Governor's limits on the number of people gathered is respected. Currently this limit is 10 people or less. Our church buildings will remain closed to the public at this time.
- Priests may continue to minister individually to those who are ill, offering the Sacraments of the Sick as needed.
- Holy Redeemer Parish has suspended their sandwich program at the request of the shelter they served, as they are unable to take in donations made outside of the premises at this time. When it is able to resume, we will make everyone aware. The Tuesday night meal at IC continues, but for takeout only. Provisions are being made to deliver to those in need who cannot pick up the meals in person.

## **Immaculate Conception School**

Immaculate Conception School jumped right into online learning just one day after Newburyport schools closed for COVID-19. The faculty and administration started to actively prepare for a possible school closure in late February. Several

weeks worth of work was gathered and cued up to be ready to go at a moment's notice. The Technology Team scheduled additional training sessions with students and teachers for review sessions and introduced log on procedures for digital tools that would be beneficial for an at-home learning dynamic. Families were asked to think about the stress that home computers and devices would endure if everyone were at home working and learning. When the decision was made to close the IC, the teachers didn't miss a beat and rolled right into posting online assignments which included video messages of daily prayer.
