From the Pastor

Dear Parishioners,

As I am writing this, the heads of all the episcopal conferences from around the world are still meeting with the Pope in Rome to discuss the ongoing sexual abuse crisis within the Church. It is such a volatile topic that few headlines in the media are without explosive titles and an air of deep gravitas. Perhaps, finally, this deadly cancer within the life of the Church is being addressed with the seriousness that it merits. Perhaps....

It is hard to know what the outcome or eventual fallout from this much-hyped meeting will be. I hope and pray that it will lead to serious reforms and the necessary structural changes to prevent these crimes from re-occurring and especially to eliminate any possible cover-up of any future abuse, if it were to occur. Those who enabled and actively participated in past cover-ups must be held accountable for their crimes. It is beyond time that this be rectified. As a Church, we cannot be complicit with these crimes; we cannot allow deficient laws or structures to exist which enable such criminal behavior nor can we tolerate those in office who do. It is time for change.

One of the most difficult challenges that the Pope and bishops face in their meetings will be coming to universal agreement of the scope of this problem on a worldwide basis. What seems to us here in the United States as the most preeminent issue concerning our parishioners might be barely a blip on the radar to a bishop in Africa or the developing world, as they wrestle with war, poverty, famine, and genocide. That is not to say that abuse does not occur in every culture and every nation, it is only to say that there are different priorities and needs that demand attention and their own proper accountability and effort to resolve them. For some, this issue of clergy sexual abuse and its subsequent enablement and cover-up has been looked at as only a Western or first-world problem.

On a recent pilgrimage to Italy, it was barely talked about by the few priests or people with whom I had an opportunity to engage in conversation. No one seemed all that concerned about it or particularly interested in making it a top priority for change or action. That was a purely anecdotal experience, however, as I am sure there are powerful advocates for change who are working relentlessly behind the scenes to promote needed reform. In fact, multiple victim-advocate groups have received quite prominent news coverage during this week's summit at the Vatican compared to years past. So there is hope. But there is still so much work to do. Maybe the greatest thing that could come out of this meeting, in addition to raising much-needed awareness, are some universal norms that would apply to everyone everywhere without exception. while making any needed changes to Canon Law and episcopal policies along the way. Even this, however, may take time and more patience than most of us in this part of the world are willing to offer.

Back in December, I invited parishioners to attend a series of listening sessions in response to the ongoing sexual abuse crisis in the wider Church. These were held in each church in our Collaborative and led by outside facilitators. I was present in a listening posture, not commenting on what was said nor sharing my own thoughts and ideas. I really wanted and needed to hear what concerns people were harboring. In each

session, after a moment of song and prayer, it did not take long for some very vocal, passionate, and thoughtful responses to surface. Over the past few months I have spent many moments praying over and reflecting on the comments that were shared. Several common themes were repeated and echoed from all three sessions. These included: 1. A substantial loss of credibility of those in leadership along with a profound disappointment in the bishops' failure to protect the most vulnerable in our Church, 2. A very focused concern on how our young people today might be experiencing this crisis and what future they might possibly have in the life of the Church as a result, and 3. A repeated concern among parents of how they might talk about the present crisis with their children.

I heard, too, a great love for the Church expressed in sadness and lament over her failures. There was deep compassion expressed for those who had suffered the unthinkable. There was an awareness that this issue affects many people in their own families and among those in our wider communities. There was strength that was found in our common prayer. I think I also heard a resolve to push forward in our Church, fighting for necessary changes and improved accountability along the way. It was clear that no one could stomach a "business as usual" approach if we are to grow and thrive as the Body of Christ. Something has to give. Maybe many somethings....

So, I don't yet know how the meeting in Rome will end or what the spin on it will be in the worldwide media or how it will resonate in our own hearts. There's just too many variables at play in this moment to be certain of any particular outcome. But what I would like to invite you to consider are several things that are within our power as parishioners and faithful Catholics to bring about.

First, let's make sure that we are doing everything possible to support and care for those who have suffered either from an instance of abuse or as a result of a failure of proper leadership. Our communities need to welcome the wounded and despairing, the "bruised-reeds and smoldering wicks" of our day. Do we have room in our hearts to believe their stories, walk with them as they may allow us, and cheer for them when God brings about the many small miracles of hope and healing in their lives? Have we made it crystal clear that we care, and are we resolved to put that care into action and advocacy on their behalf?

Second, believe in the power of prayer. Not in a trite or sentimental kind of way, but with a raw, graphic, and brutal resolve to bare before the Lord our wounded hearts and battered spirits. Be unafraid to bring every ounce of anger and frustration that you may feel over the colossal failures of our Church to care for our young to your daily conversations with God. Again, again and again, share your hurt and pain with the Lord who loves you more than you will ever know. God can take it. God demands your honesty. God delights in your bluntness. It is the only way to deepen your relationship with the One who really can reshape the face of the Church and world.

Next, work forthrightly for our local churches and communities to be safe, supportive environments for everyone to flourish in—the young and old alike. The laity do not need to wait to be invited by the clergy to take on active roles to redirect and

reimagine the Church. Together, it is our Church—we are the Body of Christ! With the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, we can make of it whatever God will bless, whatever God will cause to grow, whatever God will bring to fruition. This is not a later-on thing. Now is the time. Now is an acceptable time before the Lord to call one another to holiness and new life.

I have to tell you a little secret: although as a priest and pastor I am called to exercise certain leadership roles within our parish communities, the vast majority of the most successful ministries and outreach have not come from my own ideas or efforts, but from yours! Over and again, my greatest achievements often are found in the wisdom of blessing, supporting, and then getting out of the way of the good and holy initiatives that you put into motion. The passion, zeal, and sheer enthusiasm that you bring for following the Lord in all of the various forms of ministry and action in our Collaborative are breathtaking and awesome. How God will work through the simplest of gestures is truly inspiring. Be the good people that you are. Do the good work that you do. Follow the Lord's voice wherever it leads. Be unafraid to exercise your rightful role in our Church that comes from your Baptism. Don't stop until we all get to Heaven.

Finally, but not lastly, let us work to better support families who are struggling to make sense of their faith in the midst of crushing media reports, the never-ending challenges of raising children, and the sometimes overwhelming difficulties of daily life. How can we do this more effectively? Who might you know who is having a really hard time dealing with all of these needs? How can you connect with them to share your concerns? How might you affirm their goodness and encourage their faith? What compassion and understanding can you bring to their trials and doubts?

From the listening sessions, the Archdiocese has offered a number of links to resources that may be helpful to parishioners who continue to struggle with the vexing issues. These are published on page 5 of this bulletin. None of these are complete in and of themselves, but utilize them if you find them to be helpful. Let us keep each other in prayer in the days ahead. As always, please do not hesitate to approach me if I can help you in any way.

May God bless us and the Church we love with healing and hope in the months ahead.


