

## From the Pastor

Dear Parishioners,

The empty tomb has been a source of confusion and head-scratching from the very beginning of our Church. When something (or someone) is NOT there, it presents more questions than answers. It would have been one thing to have a crowd of witnesses gathered around the sealed tomb, holding vigil, and praying, when, low and behold... an angel appears and rolls back the stone and the newly-resurrected Jesus walks out all glorious and such! *tah dah!*


Woulda' been nice, wouldn't it?

But that is not the sign we were given. The tomb was empty. Jesus' body, dead or resurrected or whatever, was nowhere in sight. Nobody saw what had happened. It was almost anti-climactic. We had all of the drama of the triumphal entry into Jerusalem, the poignant profundity of the Last Supper, then the unforeseen turnaround of the betrayal, the trial before the Sanhedrin and Pontius Pilate, the scourging, the crucifixion itself, earthquakes, the tearing of the sanctuary curtain in the Temple, and finally Jesus' death on the cross, then a hasty burial before sundown on that fateful Good Friday. And then....And then....Just an empty tomb with nobody knowing nothing about what might have occurred.

Well, almost. Some Gospel accounts do tell of an angel almost chastising the grieving Mary of Magdala for not remembering what Jesus had said: that He told them He was to rise from the dead after three days. One might think that this kind of detail was something that someone would have remembered. But betrayal and grief and a struggle to believe all conspire to cloud a person's mind, don't they? Which one of us, after all, hasn't struggled with our own faith when we have lost a loved one? The fog of grief clouds the spirit as well as the mind.

But resurrection is a completely new concept and experience for the disciples in the early Church. It was not a mere resuscitation. It involved re-thinking, re-imagining and re-setting everything that the disciples knew about who Jesus is and what His true mission on Earth is all about. The resurrection of Jesus made clear a number of things that were perhaps a bit fuzzy in the minds of the disciples. First, Jesus wasn't the author of a political movement. Although all human enterprise involves interactions with one another—something we might call "politics"—Jesus wasn't trying to become king. He already is the King of Kings. He doesn't need any perishable, earthly crown to add to His trophy case. That vision falls grotesquely short of His true pedigree.

Jesus' mission was to save those who were lost, to restore what had fallen, to redeem all of creation, to heal that which is broken...to fulfill His Father's will that the harmony that once was present from the beginning be made whole again. One of the Christological titles that we often

celebrate at Christmastime is Jesus as the Prince of Peace. But peace, here, is not understood as merely a lack of conflict or a welcome interlude between war and division, but rather, as a right-relationship between God and one another. In it's truest sense, this kind of peace goes far beyond what politics and diplomacy could ever broker. It is a re-creation of Creation.

Looked at from this perspective, Jesus' Resurrection is not simply about a man coming back to life. It is about redefining in every way possible what real, true life is. And so, the signs of the Resurrection were cryptic and confusing to those who had not yet understood what Jesus meant when He said that He had to "rise from the dead." Only with the eyes of faith can the believer begin, what really will be a lifelong journey, to understand what it means to follow in Christ's footsteps.

Resurrection, then, moves the Lord beyond the limits of time and space. It places the Risen Christ squarely in the midst of the gathered disciples, whenever two or three are together in His name. It instills hope and courage even in the darkest of valleys. It enables joy to exist where it never should be. It calls-forth courage from even the weakest among us. And it shows beyond doubt that love always triumphs over evil, hatred, and death. To experience it, we cannot look to limited human categories of how or what we think God will do. To live it, we must open our hearts to receive the gift of faith from the One who earnestly desires us to have it. We must pine for it, long for it, beg for it. We must plead with God to fill us with His love.

And then, when the gift is given, the journey begins!

For the disciples, it began with an early morning trek to what would be found as an empty tomb. And then, things got really interesting!

What will our journey of faith lead us to discover in our time and place?


