Dear Parishioners,

"This is weird." Those were the words that I shared with Fr. George this past weekend, just minutes before pushing the button to begin live-streaming one of our Masses. I should be grateful. Knowing the

Except that is where we are today, with full knowledge of what we are capable of and that creeping feeling of what we ought to be doing as we enter into our holiest and most sacred time of the year. "Live via Facebook" is not exactly a show-stopper, now is it?

Please know that as much as I am grateful that we live in a time and place in history where the miracle of technology can connect us together electronically all over the globe, I can't help but long for something more. And that something is you!

Crouch that read: "Honestly hadn't planned on giving up quite this much for Lent." I had to wince as I found myself nodding in agreement. We have all made incredible sacrifices this Lenten Season, giving up many things that were never on the table when we considered what penance should be done on Ash Wednesday, which seems so long ago. We have closed down our schools, transitioning instead to "remote learning," we have shuttered so many of our places of business-grinding our once-strong economy to a halt, confined ourselves to our homes, have witnessed innocent strangers become suspected sources of contagion, we have lost needed jobs, we have suffered the agony of helplessly watching family, friends, and neighbors who became ill with a mysterious, invisible disease that threatens death and wreaks havoc on our healthcare system. We have been forced to let go of tens of thousands of precious souls-young and old alike-who have succumbed to the dreaded coronavirus. It is a darker and more robust storyline than anything ever found in an episode of Alfred Hitchcock's, The Twilight Zone.

And yet here we are, chastened to the bone, ready to enter into a week that has always been so richly filled with signs and symbols, smells and bells, tradition and pageantry...all reduced to a sometimes-pixelated video feed on a laptop. And we can't even give out Palms! I've got a garage full of

them, but we are forbidden from distributing them either now, or in the weeks ahead, so great is the fear of this pandemic.

Maybe God has a purpose in all of this. Not that God would intentionally cause any one of us to suffer in this world that's not the way that God works. But He doesn't prevent our suffering, sometimes, as there are greater things at stake, greater goods to be had despite them or, often, through our experience of them.

Anybody remember their first encounter with death? Maybe it was the passing of a beloved family pet at a tender age, or much more painfully of a cherished grandparent. Maybe it was the total devastation that comes from a tragic death or long, lingering illness that seems to drain every ounce of life from those who suffer vicariously with its victim. If we survive those moments even somewhat intact, we never look at the gift of life the same way again, do we? We realize that life is precious, fragile, and that each moment we have with those we love is sacred and to be savored to its fullness, because, we now know...painfully know...that it will not last. The lesson for us clear: don't take anything or anyone for granted, for one day we may not have them with us. Learn to enjoy and celebrate the present, because it will never be the same ever again.

What we also learn, from our encounters with suffering and death, with loss and grief, is that while things will never be the same as before, life can and will be good again in new and even unexpected ways.

On the other side of this pandemic, we may never look at a roll of toilet paper or bottle of Purell the same again! But more importantly, I hope we never look each other the same way either. I hope we see and understand in an ever greater way the need each of has to be connected with one another. Right now we are feeding that need with the internet and video chats, texts and emails, emojis and "likes." But when the air clears and this foul virus goes into remission, I hope we can appreciate what it means to truly be in communion with our sisters and brothers-at Mass certainly-but also in our neighborhoods, community, nation and world. As we are so painfully experiencing right now: we are all in this together. We always were. It was only an illusion to think that, "I can do my own thing and it won't affect anyone else." Lent is a time to shed our illusions and confront the truth of our real place before God. Individualism, selfishness, racism, division, xenophobia, greed and fear-these only seek to destroy the good and healthy bonds of being human and holy before our God. The connectedness we crave with one another pales in comparison to the inner longing we have for true union with our Creator. This desire has been etched into our very soul by the One who brought us forth in the divine image.

This Holy Week, we Christians celebrate the very heart of our faith in God: that while we're yet sinners, God held nothing back and sacrificed His only Son that we might not perish in our sins but have the well-founded hope and promise that we will rise from our graves and live with Him forever. It is through our Baptism in Jesus Christ that we are bonded with the Lord so completely that nothing can separate us from the Love of God. Absolutely nothing! It is a connection, a social-gathering, a closeness and intimacy beyond any other. All gifted to us by a God who loves us and calls us to new life.

So, for now, we stream and tweet and text. We work to "flatten the curve" and do our part to support those on the front line of this epic battle against something so small it cannot even be seen by the naked eye. We hunker down and self-isolate, that others might have the chance just to live. It is the right thing to do.

But let us take from this Lent a new appreciation of human life, the blessings of each day and a profound awareness of our own inter-relatedness with each other and in Christ Jesus. What a joyful day awaits us all, when we can share in true Communion, once again!

Community Service of Newburyport Donations

In addition to the Helping Our Homeless Care Pack program this Lent, we are piloting something new at IC. Community Service of Newburyport operates a pantry that provides household essentials like toilet paper, paper towels. toothpaste, toothbrushes, soap, shampoo. conditioner, body lotion, deodorant, laundry detergent, and dish detergent for people in need. Many people in our community, and in particular clients of our St. Vincent de Paul Society, rely on Community Service to make ends meet. When you shop for these items yourself, please consider picking up an extra and drop it off at church. Unlike the care packs these should be full size items.

Immaculate Conception School

Immaculate Conception School jumped right into online learning just one day after Newburyport schools closed for COVID-19. The faculty and administration started to actively prepare for a possible school closure in late February. Several

weeks worth of work was gathered and cued up to be ready to go at a moment's notice. The Technology Team scheduled additional training sessions with students and teachers for review sessions and introduced log on procedures for digital tools that would be beneficial for an at-home learning dynamic. Families were asked to think about the stress that home computers and devices would endure if everyone were at home working and learning. When the decision was made to close the IC, the teachers didn't miss a beat and rolled right into posting online assignments which included video messages of daily prayer. The first week was amazing, exhausting, impressive, and a total team effort by our entire IC community. We adjusted with every new day and supported each other through positive communication. The distance has pushed our school family together to be stronger and far more adept at online learning. Pelican Pride is powerful!


Work Begins!

The Gospel Reading.

Crucifixion was the method used by the Romans to execute people. Often, the vertical part of the cross stayed in the



ground. The prisoner carried the cross-beam to the place of execution. He might or might not be tied to the beam. At the place of execution he was nailed to cross-beam and the beam was slotted onto the upright. Then the victim's feet were nailed to the upright. In Jesus' case, a notice was fixed to the cross.

Crucifixion was a horrible and agonizing way in which to die.
