From the Pastor

Dear Parishioners,

"Murmuring." What a great word from our Gospel reading this weekend! How descriptive of our human condition. How often have we ever murmured among ourselves?! I think it goes right up there with "grumbled."



Something new is offered to us. . .we murmur, "What is it? What do we do with it? Is it good? Should we try it? I'm not sure about it. . .Maybe we should just wait and see. . . ."

There was a great commercial on TV many years ago for Life cereal. It had a little boy named "Mikey" sitting at the end of the breakfast table. His older brother had a new box of cereal that he hadn't tried yet. "Hey, let's get Mikey to try it," he says, "He hates everything." Of course, Mikey dives right into the bowl of Life cereal with a big smile on his face, his brother exclaiming, "Hey, he likes it! Mikey likes it!" So, the moral of the story, or rather, the commercial, is, Life cereal must be awesome. Everybody go buy some!

Murmuring. We're not sure about new things. We don't want to be the first to try them. We don't want to make a mistake and commit ourselves to something new in case it turns out awful. Maybe there's a "Mikey" around who we can ploy with the new potential poison, but not I, O Lord. I'm not gonna be THAT guy who chooses poorly and has my breakfast ruined!

Jesus wasn't selling breakfast cereal, of course. He was simply inviting people into a new and life-giving relationship with the God of the Universe. Holy Communion in the Hand

Although many COVID-related restrictions at Mass have been lifted, one thing we are still being asked to do by the Archdiocese is to *receive Holy Communion only in the hand*. When Holy Communion is received on the tongue, it is very likely that the communicant will breathe on the hands of the priest or minister. It is very possible that small droplets of saliva or mucus from the mouth or lungs (which could contain COVID) could be transferred onto the hands of those distributing Communion and possibly passed on to others.

It is for this reason that those distributing Communion would be required to stop and sanitize their hands after every person whom they gave Communion to on the tongue. If we had to do this for everyone, the Communion procession would take an inordinate amount of time and become hopelessly cumbersome. So at this time everyone is being asked to only receive Communion in the hand. This is a temporary restriction that likely will be lifted in the months to come. Thank you for your patience and cooperation as we continue to recover from the pandemic.

considering getting involved in a new ministry or service opportunity? More murmuring. . . .Ok, Okay. How about trying a new way of praying? Maybe give the Rosary a shot or perhaps spend some quiet time before the Blessed Sacrament? Murmur. Murmur. What about volunteering to go visit the sick or bring Holy Communion to those in the hospital? M U R M U R! Step up and possibly join our Pastoral Council this coming year? (More murmurs. . . murmur, murmur.)

A dictionary definition of a murmur is: "a soft, indistinct sound made by a person or group of people speaking quietly or at a distance." The idea is that in a murmur, things get said, but no commitment is made. Conversations happen, but no real voice is heard. There is no unity in a murmur, other than not to come together with one voice, to remain indifferent, unattached.

I think murmuring must have driven Jesus crazy. He could deal with the zealots, with their one-minded passions. He could deal with those who hated Him. At least He knew where they stood. He could handle the misplaced loyalty and misunderstandings of those who loved Him. He knew they would come around and eventually get it right. But those who were murmuring. . .they were tough nuts to crack! It was hard to break through their low static to make a connection, engage them in dialogue or challenge them to see beyond the status quo. Murmuring kept them from truly hearing Christ's voice calling to them, inviting them to more. Murmuring filled in the silence in which God so often speaks to us. Murmuring keeps us from hearing the tiny whisper of God's Word that has the power to reshape our hearts and world. If only we would listen and respond.

We've heard the Scripture, "If today you hear His voice, harden not your hearts." (from Psalm 95). Well, I'd like to add my own addendum, "If today you hear His voice, stop murmuring so you can better listen to what He has to say!" Whether your experience of murmuring is tied up in a group conversation or simply an echo of other's voices in your heart, consider stepping outside this mind-numbing din and dare to tune-in the one Word that has the power to truly bring new life and love to even the most cynical among us.

His name is Jesus. He is the Bread of Life, the Living Bread that comes down from Heaven and gives life to the world. His voice is clear and distinct. Let us listen to Him today! After all, a lot more is at stake than what to have for breakfast...

History of Immaculate Conception Church

On the weekend of August 15, we celebrate the Feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary. From her Immaculate Conception to her Assumption into heaven, the Blessed Virgin Mary lived her life as an obedient, humble, and faithful servant of our Lord. On the weekend of the Assumption, Immaculate Conception Church will honor its patron saint, Mary.

For nearly 170 years, Immaculate Conception Church and Parish has served the residents of Newbury and Newburyport. In 2002, Immaculate Conception welcomed into its congregation the parishioners of Newburyport's St. Louis de Gonzague Church and Plum Island's St. James Chapel. In 2015, Immaculate Conception Parish and Holy Redeemer Parish and its two churches, St. Ann in West Newbury, and The Church of the Nativity in Merrimac formed the Holy Redeemer Immaculate Conception (HRIC) Collaborative which shares resources to serve the needs of the faith communities across its wide geographic span.

Please enjoy looking back at a brief history of the town of Newbury and the city of Newburyport and the history of our beloved Immaculate Conception Parish.

Newbury was founded when a group of immigrants landed at the mouth of the Parker River in May 1635. Among the first settlers were Mr. Dummer and Thomas Parker. This area had been designated as a "plantation" and became the Newbury Plantation. Many cattle, horses, and sheep arrived by ship in the same year, and stock raising was one of the first business enterprises on the plantation. Mr. Dummer petitioned the General Court to allow him to build the first grain mill in August 1638. The agreement stated that no other mill could exist on the plantation and all farmers on the plantation were to send their crops to this mill only. The boundaries of the town originally extended from the Merrimack River to the Parker River, and from Plum Island to the town of Bradford. Plum Island, a ninemile-long sandy barrier beach forming the eastern boundary of the town, was a great natural asset to the town from the beginning, an abundant source of salt hay and pasture for horses and cattle during the winter. In 1639, the town petitioned the General Court to be allowed sole use of Plum Island, but the Court divided the use of the island among Ipswich, Newbury, and Rowley. A century later, in 1739, the General Court was forced to enact a conservation measure, forbidding the use of Plum Island as pasture because grazing destroyed the grass roots, causing erosion. The size of the Newbury plantation remained the same until the new inhabitants of the area along the Merrimack petitioned for a new town to be established closer to the water. It took several petitions before their request was granted.

Newburyport was settled in 1635 as part of Newbury Plantation but was not established as a "new" town until January, 1764 and then given the name Newburyport. At that time, it was the smallest town in Massachusetts, measuring 647 acres and had a population of 2,800 people living in 357 houses. Situated near the mouth of the Merrimack River, it was once a fishing, shipbuilding, silverware manufacturing, and shipping center. In 1792, a bridge was built two miles above the town where the river contained an island. The captains of old Newburyport (as elsewhere in Massachusetts) imported West Indian molasses and then exported the rum they made from it. The distilleries were located around Market Square near the waterfront. Caldwell's Old Newburyport rum was manufactured locally until well into the 19th century. Newburyport prospered and became a "city" in 1851.

Immaculate Conception Church

In 1841, Rev. Patrick Canavan of Dover NH came monthly to Newburyport to celebrate Mass and administer the




sacraments of the Roman Catholic Church. Services were held for nearly two years at the residences of Hugh McGlew and others. In 1843, the vestry of the First Presbyterian Society was purchased and moved to a lot on Charles Street. It was

remodeled and repaired and served as a chapel until the church on Green Street was completed in 1853. The cornerstone for Immaculate Conception was laid on April 27, 1852, responding to Newburyport's rapidly growing Catholic population. The residents at that time were primarily Irish immigrants. The new church was dedicated to the Immaculate Conception on March 17, 1853, and the Rev. Henry Lennon was assigned its first pastor. Construction costs for this new church were \$22,000. When Rev. Lennon died, he was buried near the southwest corner of the church on Green Street.

A new pastor turned his attention to building a spire on the church; it was completed in March, 1874, and housed a bell. Later a convent was built at the corner of High and Green Streets for the Sisters of Charity. Now the Parish Center, it houses the Collaborative offices, dining rooms, kitchens, and meeting rooms.

St. Louis de Gonzague Church

French Canadians began to arrive in Newburyport in the 1880s. Most were farmers who came south by train from Quebec farms once their crops were harvested. They worked in the mills and shops in Newburyport during the winter months would return to and



Quebec in the spring. They spoke little, if any, English; eventually, some stayed and became citizens. Most of the French-Canadian immigrants were Roman Catholic. Immaculate Conception Parish provided social activities; however, it was difficult for these newcomers to participate because of the language barrier and cultural differences. In December, 1902, the 1,300 French Canadians, who for the most part had settled in the south end of the city, petitioned

for a church of their own. With the support of the pastor, they began holding French services in Washington Hall at the corner of State and Essex Streets. On February 27, 1903, Rev. J. L.M. Levesque was named pastor of the new French congregation, and named it St. Louis de Gonzague. The parish held fundraisers and by May 1904, plans to erect a church on Beck Street were announced. The cost to build the church was \$25,000.00. On February 26, 1905, the first Mass was celebrated. On May 30, 1905, the Church was dedicated. The parish consisted of a church, rectory, and school. The school opened in 1907 and had 150 students, and the parish flourished for 97 years.

In December 2002 with the celebration of the final Mass at St. Louis, the two churches were merged with Rev. Robert Connors named as the Pastor of both St. Louis and Immaculate Conception Parishes. The property was ultimately sold for residential use. Today, a stained glass window featuring St. Louis from the original church can be found in the Parish Center lobby.

St. James Chapel, Plum Island

In 1920, as the Catholic population on Plum Island began to increase, especially during the summer months, Immaculate Conception announced plans to build a church there. Four lots were acquired, two purchased by the church and two donated by the Plum Island Beach Company. It was two years before the church was completed and, in the interim, Mass was celebrated at the Pavilion. By summer 1922, St.



James Chapel was completed at a cost of \$18,000. The first Mass was celebrated on June 6, 1922 at this seasonal chapel. In 2003, the property was sold and the building was razed. The chapel in the Collaborative Parish Center now bears the name St. James Chapel.
