

HOLY WEEK - THE WEEK OF ALL WEEKS

Friends in Christ, permit me to register my sincerest gratitudes to all of you for making our 40 hour devotion a great success. For the first time after my return from Ghana, I slept like a baby the night after and it was all because your love for Jesus in the Eucharist and your dedication to the hours we voted to stay with him blew me away. The growth and the success of every parish depends to a large extent on the attitude of parishioners towards Eucharistic adoration. You have all demonstrated that our twin parishes have the potential for growth and success; and it is my wish that we would keep that flame burning. Thank you to all of you who worked behind the scenes to ensure the success of the program and to all of you who made time to be with Jesus. May you all be blessed abundantly.

This is Palm Sunday. It is Passion Sunday. It is also the Sunday of the Holy Week (Call it Holy Sunday). This is the Week of all weeks. All too soon, we are putting the days of Lent behind us and if we have lived our Lenten observances to the letter, we should begin experiencing the peace which Palm Sunday brings. Palm Sunday gives us the opportunity to reflect on the final week of Jesus on earth. It is a time for us to remind ourselves that it was Christ who conquered evil and triumphed over sin and death. He is the one who comes in the name of the Lord. The Messiah who rode the donkey instead of a horse as a king of Peace. In him is our peace. In him is our victory. In him is our salvation and we are proud to shout Hosanna with the masses of yesterday.

This also Passion Sunday. It is the only Sunday in the liturgical year that an aspect of the passion narrative is read at Mass. Our next encounter with the Passion Narrative will be on Good Friday. No wonder the entire week is called the Passion Week. It is invitation for us to unite ourselves to the passion of Christ so as to enjoy the glory of his resurrection. One way we can share in Christ's passion is to know what it entails. Such details are made available to us in all the four Gospels: Matthew chapter 26ff, Mark chapter 14ff, Luke Chapter 22ff and John chapter 18ff. In the great silence of the Passion Week, our greatest achievement would reside in reading and meditating on one or more of these accounts and living the passion in our various lives. Our next great achievement is in taking up our individual crosses and journeying with Jesus to Calvary. Ours is the cross of inconvenience, the cross of witness and the cross of martyrdom (see W. J. Bausch). The cross of inconvenience is the burden we bear when we go the extra mile to inconvenience ourselves so as to save a soul. Supposing I have put a sick person on my prayer list, asking God to bring about healing and relief. If all I do is to pray, without making any effort to put myself out in trying to help bring about what I have been asking God to do, I would fail in my call to carry the cross of inconvenience. Sometimes we need to inconvenience ourselves so as to become effective instruments in God's hands. Holy Week is that time. The week also invites us to bear the cross of witness under pressure. This is about being different in the world of conformity. In our world, tyrannies abound and they all aim at forcing us to conform to worldly standards. Yet St. Paul advises us not to conform ourselves to this age. Since it is seemingly insane to be sane when the whole world is insane, the pressure of bearing a nonconforming cross in witness to a conforming society is heavy. As Jesus goes under the weight of the cross this week, he gives us the stamina to carry our own cross in solidarity with him and in witness to the world. There is also the cross of martyrdom. This comes in wet or dry. Wet martyrdom resides in shedding one's blood for Jesus and for the truth. This was the lot of the many, who over the years were persecuted and executed for the sake of righteousness. There is also the dry martyrdom, which involves no bloodshed. This martyrdom involves wounding one's spirit for Christ's sake. It is about surrendering one's security for Christ, the martyrdom of grace under pressure (Bausch). It is about holding fast to God and keeping one's composure in spite of the ills meted out to you. Knowing what people did to Jesus on his way to the cross and how he held fast, we dare to put everything into Jesus' hands and allow him to be our rock in the midst of worldly pressures.

This is also the Holy Week. Technically all the days of the week are holy. Some people would thus call this Sunday Holy Sunday, just as they would describe the rest of the days of the week. This week is thus sacred for all and as we go through the holiness of its days our greatest desire must be to be Holy ourselves. It is as if to say that the Lenten Season was a call on us all to journey into perfection and that even if we blew our opportunities, the last Week of Lent still presents itself for us to pick up our pieces together and make strides toward sanctity. Holiness according to Pope Benedict XVI, implies perfecting oneself in worship. It is about purifying the self. It is a call to sanctification and an invitation to righteousness. This week therefore, we top our reflection on the passion up with acts of piety. We take time to go to confession, to create a room in our lives for prayer, mental prayer, vocal prayer, prayer of adoration, contrition, thanksgiving and petition; we seek to help the poor and the needy. It is good at this time to practice some random act of kindness. A random act of kindness is that act of charity which takes no aim at success nor seeks recognition. Aiming at no reputation, it is simply an unrecognized deed of kindness. It is an act which we perform just because it is within our power to do so, just because we can. It is an act of humility. We get kind not to draw attention to our selves but do so in acknowledgment of the fact that just as we are and in spite of our sinful selves, God in his mercy has counted us worthy to be instruments of his own Kindness. An act of random kindness is one which we perform purely out of love. We are kind because there is nothing to gain in return. It is a thankless act with unrewarded efforts (see R. S. Hurd). The whole passion, death, and resurrection of Christ is an epitome of a random act of kindness. Jesus who was in the form of God did not count equality with God something to grasp. He took the form of a servant, humbled himself, and was obedient unto death, death on the cross. He did all this not for pure gain, neither did he do so for any recognition; he did so just so his blood that poured on Calvary would cleanse us of our sins and bring us salvation. We were his focus and his supreme interest is for us to have life and have it to the full. Our call to sanctity this week is thus a call to be another Christ for others, making the mystery of the passion alive in their lives not for our own gains but for the glory of God.


We would like to thank everyone who helped organize and those who participated in the 40 Hours of Devotion at St. John the Baptist this past weekend. It was beautiful!
