

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PEACE BE WITH YOU

Dear friends, peace seems to be one of the biggest gifts that the Risen Christ sought to bring his apostles. His first gift to them in the resurrection appearances was peace. He gave them peace because he knew they needed it most. Having betrayed, denied, and abandoned him, they must have been at war within and peace must have eluded them. They were at war in their hearts, minds, and souls. Besides, fear of the Jews had so taken away their peace that they locked themselves up. They were troubled, they had doubts in their hearts, they failed to recognize him and took him for a ghost. Thus, in their stressful moments, when guilt from their betrayal, the fear of the Jews, and the dread of a haunt from a ghost depressed them and clouded their peace, Jesus brought them his own peace.

The Church knows right that today's Christian needs peace as much as the apostles did at the time of Jesus. She is fully aware that in a world beset with secularism, individualism, and relativism, one of the easiest things that can elude us is peace. It is thus not out of place that throughout the Easter season and beyond, the Paschal candle makes a prominent presence in our liturgies. Just as Jesus challenged his troubled disciples to take a peek at his hands and feet, to touch him and see that he was no ghost but a man, the Paschal candle loudly invites us to do the same. The incense bullets in the Paschal candle invite us to see the pierced hands and feet of Jesus, to appreciate his wounds; recall the marks of the nails, and set our feet on the way of his peace. The peace of Christ is the antidote for the stress, anxiety, and depression, which are very endemic in our secular environment of today. Through the Paschal candle, therefore, the Church invites us to grow deeper in our friendship with the resurrected Lord and so be gradually healed as he brings peace to our minds hearts, and souls.

As we behold his wounds, which he still bears in his glorified body, we are reassured of his everlasting forgiveness. Once he forgives our sins, we are truly forgiven and our conscience can be at rest. As we reflect on the spike marks in his hands and feet, we are certain that we are loved with an undying, unconditional, personal, determined love. This love of Christ, reigning in our hearts, kills the restlessness of our hearts and brings peace into our hearts. The Paschal candle also reminds us that Christ is alive, his light shines through the darkness of our souls and as he continues to rule and expand his everlasting Kingdom, he invites each one of us to join hands with him by witnessing to his resurrection and building up the Church. This invitation calls us to a task that really matters; a worthwhile task; a task that will satisfy our thirst for meaning. The peace of the resurrected Christ is what we really need. Without it, we feel troubled and alone, we are assailed by doubts and fears, sleep eludes us and there is no sense of security in our dwelling. Such, I believe, was the state of the disciples when Jesus made an appearance to them and uttered the words, "Peace be with you."

When Jesus brings us peace, his peace does not only heal our infirmities, it also liberates us and makes us instruments of peace. Thus, when we have peace from above, that peace has to flow through us like a river and spread into the deserts of people's lives, to set captives free. However, quite often, there exists a gap between Christ's peace with its attendant freedom and the natural flow of the same peace through us into the deserts of other people's lives. When St. Paul noticed this kind of gap in the Galatians, he told them, "Do not use your freedom as an opportunity for the flesh, but through love be servants of one another. For the whole law is fulfilled in one word: "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." But if you bite and devour one another, take heed that you are not consumed by one another (Galatians 5: 13-15)." In the "biting and devouring" mentioned above, Pope emeritus Benedict XVI saw a clear expression of a poorly understood freedom. Thus, the Galatians failed in understanding the proper use of the freedom peace brings. They failed in their freedom to make love their supreme priority. By the unkind and improper use of words, they bit and devoured one another. They thereby broke the commandment of love with their words.

Dear friends, we are no better than them. Whenever we have been careless with what we say to others - whether face to face, via cell phones, or through email, texting, and tweeting; whenever we have judged and criticized people harshly without any objectivity; whenever we have gone around talking carelessly about other people's struggles, failings, faults, and sins; if we have slandered others or have unnecessarily disclosed people's weaknesses or sins; if we, in effect, have fallen into the habit of using our words to hurt instead of help, we have widened the gap between Christ's peace-filled freedom and its deserving flow from us to into the lives of others. Whenever we spew our words to bite and devour others, we punch holes in our souls and a leak in our souls causes Christ's peace to spill out with no benefit to the other. The peace of Christ sets us free. The freedom of his peace makes us dispensers of peace. May our ill use of the freedom gained from his peace not deprive anyone of an equal peace. May our use of words this week then bring peace to those who receive them, and may our words build, rather than bite and devour others. May we speak peace into our own lives and the lives of others.
