

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MARANATHA - COME LORD JESUS

Dear friends in Christ, since the first Sunday of Advent is the first day of the liturgical year, it is the Church's new year day, so to speak. it is thus with great pleasure that I say Happy New Year to you all. From this day forward, we open a fresh page on our liturgical calendar. Our Sunday liturgical cycle has transitioned from Year C to Year A; and the Gospel of St. Matthew shall be our preferred choice in our Sunday liturgies. The weekday cycle has also transitioned from cycle one to cycle two.

The word *Advent* derives from the Latin *adventus*, which literally means coming. In this season therefore, we traditionally reflect on the comings of Jesus. Our prayer is Maranatha, come Lord Jesus. Jesus came in history. He will come again to judge the living and the dead; and he comes to us today and always in Word, in sacrament and in one another.

Advent therefore brings to sharp focus the coming of Christ in history. It's a time to reflect on the love of God which so moved him to give His only Son, who was born in Bethlehem as the Savior of the world. We prepare to celebrate that moment which has so impacted the world as has become the fulcrum around which all times turn. Christ came in history and the moment of his incarnation became the point of departure for calling times before and times after. Advent, thus, invites us to reflect on the Incalculable effect of Christ, the Christ event and Christianity on all times, people and cultures.

Christ will also come in glory at the end of time. This is His return to the earth on the last day. Advent thus calls us to reflect on these events and look for ways to have them direct and impact our daily lives and actions. In Advent then, we prepare ourselves to encounter the Lord and welcome the day when his justice, compassion, and joy will reign in all its fullness on earth. We await in silence, we await in hope, we await in prayer for the full blossoming of his grace. We watch and pray that the day of the "LORD our justice" will not dawn on us unprepared.

In between the first and the second coming of Christ, He comes again in the sacraments and the life of the Church. Thus, through the living action of Christ today in the life of the Church, in the life of Christians, in the Eucharist, in the other sacraments, in the Christian life; in the vocations we receive through our baptism; in the magnificent charity of Christian individuals and communities; in the living traditions of the Church, and in the power of Christianity in our times, Christ stages a coming into the many facets of human life.

Of significant importance to me is the coming Christ stages in other people's lives through you and me; the hope of glory in Christ which our simple acts of love and charity instill in others, making them want to hang on him in spite of all odds.

Once upon a time, a teacher was detailed by her Principal to visit a young student who had been hospitalized. Not knowing the cause of the student's hospitalization, the teacher walked into the hospital. To her dismay she found the student badly burnt all over from a gas explosion. The student's condition elicited nothing but compassion and a confused state of mind in the teacher. Not knowing what to say to the little boy, the teacher said, "The principal sent me to come help you with algebra and surds." She then opened her bag, brought out sheets of paper and pieces of pencils and started slowly to work some samples with him. Though in pain, the student followed the teacher with keen interest and rapt attention. When the teacher left, all in the hospital wondered what she did to have changed the boy's life so significantly. He who had nearly given up in hope had all of a sudden developed an interest in life. He no longer talked of wanting to die. His appetite returned, he cooperated with caregivers, he looked enthusiastic and above all, he cultivated a special interest in prayer and begged his mother to read the word of God to him every night as she used to do when he was a kid. One day, seeing the tremendous transformation in him, one of the nurses dared to ask what his secret was. His answer? "If they sent a teacher to teach a dying boy algebra, then they had hope that I would live. So, I chose to live for the glory of God." Though he eventually died, he died in hopes to live for the glory of God.

Friends, Christ constantly comes into people's lives through us. The hope which Advent brings can come to many through the simple and the ordinary little acts of care and kindness we show. Our prayer lives, our dedication to our vocations, the special presence we make in people's lives, the cost-less smiles we give, our humble service, the heart with which we render service, our positive optimistic outlook on life, our kind words, the candles we light in the darkness of people's lives, all these could constitute Christ's coming into other people's lives. In our own simple lives of holiness and kindness, we either bring Christ into the hearts and lives of others or we set the stage for Christ to stage a day-to-day coming into their lives.

Friends, in this Advent season, let us shout the Gospel with our lives as we say with say with Charles de Foucauld that we would be so sufficiently good that people would say, "If such is the servant, what must the Master be like?" If we would for instance be as careful as would not allow our hearts to be weighed down with dissipation, drunkenness, and the anxieties of life, but would rather watch and pray and live lives of selfless charity, our conduct as Christians might ginger others to desirously say Maranatha, Come Lord Jesus and Christ would make a glorious presence in their lives.

IN CHURCH

Watch as the 1st candle on the Advent wreath is lit. Notice how the Church is preparing to celebrate Jesus' coming at Christmas!



The word 'Advent' is from the Latin adventus for "coming" and is associated with the four weeks of preparation for Christmas.

Advent begins on the Sunday after the Solemnity of Christ the King and continues for four weeks until Christmas Vigil Mass.

RCIA FOCUS: THE SECOND COMING

GOSPEL REFLECTION

Sunday's Gospel is where many Christian Churches get their ideas about the "rapture." The correct understanding of this reading is that Jesus is the Just Judge; He will come again, and our bodies and souls will be reunited after the Last Judgement. Many who look to these "rapture" predictions ignore that Christ explicitly states that "you do not know on which day your Lord will come" (24:42). Catholic teaching cautions against any type of behavior that would detract from trusting God with our future (horoscopes, fortunetelling, tarot cards, etc.). It is far more important to work daily on our own journey with Christ and trust God to take care of how and when that future plays out.
