

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#### **GAUDETE!**

Dear friends in Christ, life generally presents us with three categories of people. In life, there is the person whose philosophy is to pursue pleasure as an end in itself. Such persons pursue a course simply because it brings them pleasure, it makes them feel good. As a matter of fact, their motto is: "Do it! If it feels good." They deify the belly and convince themselves into believing that man was made to eat and drink and die tomorrow. In the Epic of Gilgamesh, when Siduri, a female divinity associated with the fermentation of beer and wine, had the opportunity to offer a piece of advice, she reiterated this philosophy when she said, "Fill your belly. Day and night make merry. Let days be full of joy. Dance and make music day and night [...]. These things alone are the concern of men." Pleasure then to such people is an intrinsic good. It is an end beyond which there is no other. Pleasure is a good in itself; it is a god and is pursued without any cognizance to God. However, experience teaches us that seeking pleasure for its own sake is a canker to many cultures. Kingdoms have fallen, and monarchs have been disgraced and destroyed because they clung to the god of the hedonist. Seeking pleasure as an end breeds inordinate cravings and contorted addictions. Its end result is nothing but despair and despondency. It makes people lazy, lustful, and gluttonous (see M. Kelly). In the end, the happiness and joy they seek, simply elude them.

There is also the person whose philosophy in life is to seek happiness. To such a person, personal happiness is the chief good. It is the proper aim of every action. His happiness is conceived of in terms of well-being based on virtuous and rational self-realization. The self is at the center of such happiness and such happiness depends to a large extent on certain external conditions- good health, a good job, a good spouse, a happy family, brilliant kids, many toys and lots of possessions. Because happiness has everything to do with what is going on in the world, it is easily forfeited at the sight of any unforeseen eventualities. Let a calamity or misfortune strike, and the happy person has nothing to hold on to. Life becomes a bitter pill to swallow, happiness eludes them; and it is not uncommon for many such people to either commit suicide or entertain suicidal thoughts. Chasing happiness as an end in itself is thus as dangerous as seeking pleasure as an intrinsic good. They both lead to emptiness and despair, a sense of loss, of woes, and lack of meaning.

There is also the person who seeks to receive joy and is joyful in life. Because such persons receive joy, they also rejoice. W. J. Bausch clearly distinguishes between pleasure, fun and happiness on the one hand and joy on the other. In his thoughts, whereas pleasure, fun, and happiness depended on certain worldly material conditions, the presence of God is the only condition for joy. Happiness generally depends on the quality and quantity of material goods. It comes from the outside. Joy wells from within, it is not dependent on external stimuli. It flows from a union with God and it can thrive even in the midst of deprivation. For Bausch, joy can thus break forth in a depressed economy, in the midst of war, in an intensive care waiting room, in the slums; and I believe that it comes also at the loss of a job, in the abject poverty of life, and in the most miserable and deplorable situations of life.

On the 3rd Sunday of Advent, the Church invites us to rejoice. *Gaudete in Domino semper* which is the theme for this Sunday translates as Rejoice in the Lord always. This call comes to us in spite all the troubles we see in our global village, in various countries, in most families, and in many individual lives. In the many dangers and toils and snares that engulf us, it is somewhat unthinkable that one can rejoice always. Yet, come to think of it that when the Prophet Zephaniah called on Israel to shout for joy, to sing joyfully, to be glad and exult with all her heart, it was not just because the LORD had removed the judgment against her, and had turned away her enemies; it was more so because the King of Israel, the LORD, was in their midst. Their joy and lack of fear or discouragement, even in the midst of misfortune then, stemmed rather from the fact that God dwelt among them as a Mighty Savior; who rejoices over them with gladness, and renews them in his love, singing joyfully and festively because of them (see Zeph. 3:14-18).

When St. Paul bade the Philippians to rejoice in the Lord always (4:4), he was behind bars. At the time, he was not living in comfort, neither was he certain of the future. He had been cut off from his mission and the call to evangelize had fallen into the hands of some self seeking and self styled men of God. If he had a dream for his mission, his dream had been nearly truncated. Yet he could still find enough joy within as to encourage it in others. Because the Lord was close to him, he had no anxiety at all. Rather he prayed and petitioned in everything. He gave thanks and made his requests known to God; and the peace of God that surpasses all understanding therefore guarded his heart and mind in Christ Jesus. Certainly, he was a man of joy even in the roughest of circumstances.

The season of Advent thus invites us to a life of joy. It encourages in us the resolve to place God within our search for pleasure. It enjoins us to inject God into the center of our bid to find happiness so as to rejoice always in the Lord. When St. Augustine asked us to love God and do whatever we wanted, he knew quite well that when we loved God and made him the center of all we do and are, our choices would be inspired and permeated by the light of his spirit and his joy would be our strength. Let us therefore seek to

prepare our hearts this Advent in order to receive Christ, whose light will cast away those dreams of darkness which center our minds and hearts only on the transient pleasures and happiness Christmas brings. May Christ come to dwell in our midst and in our hearts so that on the great day of glory we may all see the light and rejoice with him in our hearts.
