

NO OUTCAST IN THE NEW COMMUNITY OF LIFE

Beloved in Christ, in every human circumstance, that which causes a person to be considered an outcast is that which is inimical to the entire principles of the community. What the society frowns upon, when breached, becomes the confirming grounds to assess somebody as an outcast. To issue sanctions to a person who commits such an offense usually comes with little or no pain because there are enough reasons to conclude that the person is wrong.

In the old Jewish community, which was so keen on social, religious, physical, and ritual laws, there were several grounds on which a person was considered an outcast. Once a person was so pronounced, it would be ensured that he also endured the prescribed penalties without any reserve. As part of the physical laws, a leper was automatically an outcast. And as the first reading depicts, the home of the leper is at the peripheries of society and their abode was outside of the camp until the leprosy left them.

In our advanced and technologically sophisticated human society where there seems to be a cure for almost every human ailment, leprosy may not be viewed with the same eye as was done of old. Nonetheless, the whole idea of leprosy can be viewed from a new perspective in the new age of Christ.

Firstly, leprosy was considered an unclean disease. Due to its uncleanness, the one who suffered from it was cast out. From the Old Testament, we see the Lord through Moses telling Aaron and his children; that as part of their principal duties as priests, they were responsible for examining every person who was suspected to be suffering from leprosy. The priests were supposed to make this pronouncement and the leper was to wear torn clothes, to let his hair loose, cover his upper lips, ring a bell, and cry repeatedly, "unclean, unclean." The wearing of torn clothes and the letting of his hair loose are symbolic of wretchedness and a state of unhappiness respectively.

This brings our attention to that which casts us of our community and also from God, that which makes us unclean – sin. Sin is the only thing that makes us spiritually unworthy, drawing us away from the presence of God, and making us spiritually unfit for that community called *the people of God*. It makes us wretched and unhappy in life and may cause us to think that there is nothing good we can proclaim with our lips of the Lord, except to cry "unclean, unclean."

As Lent draws near, the Church wants us to be aware of the state in which sin places us – a state of uncleanness with its attendant separation of us from God and neighbor.

The good news is that Jesus brings relief not only to the skin of the leper, but he also restores to the leper, joy, happiness, and a sense of belongingness. Jesus cleanses the lips of the "leper" that he may speak of the goodness of the Lord. No wonder the psalmist calls "blessed" he whose offense is forgiven; that is, the one whose spiritual leprosy – sin, has been cleansed. Though Jesus is capable of doing this, it demands the willingness and the courage of the spiritual leper; the sinner – you and I to dare to take the initiative. In the Gospel reading, the leper came to Jesus and said to him while kneeling: "if you will you can make me clean." He made the initial move. And Jesus, the accounts records, was moved with pity and he healed him.

The priest of the old dispensation only examined the leper and pronounced judgment on him. Jesus, the Priest of the new covenant does not only examine, but also cleanses with a single command. This same power, Christ gives to all his priests of the new covenant to cleanse every leprosy found among those he has won for the Father so that none will be cast out; none will be lost and all will be kept intact until he hands them over to the Father. This is evident in the sacrament of the sick and the sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation.

Our God is not like men – a hard-hearted creature. He is a God who does not cast out. He is a God who gathers the scattered and the outcast. If we approach his throne of grace as the leper did, and ask him to make us clean, we shall surely be cleansed and restored. As we seek to be raised up and restored in Christ, St. Paul reminds us that since our God does not cast out, we should likewise not cast out. We should therefore endeavor all the more to seek not our interest, but the interest of our fellow brothers and sisters who struggle with the leprosy of sin and bring them home to the healing gate of the Saviour.

May God from whom all good things come and who has called us to the fount that cleanses all our spiritual leprosy grant us the humility of heart to approach him without fear. May he help us also to be moved with pity for brothers and sisters who might be wallowing in a similar quagmire of confusion, and may he bring home all the lost and those that the world has declared unworthy. May He bless and keep us.
