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TO BE DIFFERENT IS NOT TO BE INDIFFERENT

Dear friends, the Season of Lent is here with us again. Like all other important moments in the Church's life it is a moment of grace. One grave danger with us is to be consciously or unconsciously indifferent to the motions of the season and let its fruits slip past us as smoke vanishes into thin air. Let us therefore take time this week to examine the canker of indifference in our global village. Literally speaking, indifference simply means no difference. It is generally described as a strange and unnatural state in which the lines blur between light and darkness, dusk and dawn, crime and punishment, cruelty and compassion, good and evil. The indifferent person is perceived as one whose neighbors are of no consequence and their lives meaningless. He considers the hidden or even visible anguish of the other to be of no interest, thereby reducing the other to a mere abstraction.

In his 2015 Lenten Message, Pope Francis took time to reflect on the sin of indifference. Playing on the words difference and indifference, the Holy Father intimated that there is the tendency for us to be indifferent when we realize our differences. In other words, our differences in life, many a time, make us indifferent. When we realize we are different from others, when things and situations actually differ from how we anticipated them to be, there is the tendency of misconstruing the difference as an occasion to grow insensitive to the different people or the different things and situations.

Incidentally, this is Something that cannot not be found in God's nature. God is love and His love does not allow him to be indifferent to us. Though He is to a large extent different than us, God out of love for us sent his Son. So while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us. God saw the difference between his holiness and our sinfulness, yet he did not stay indifferent to our plight. In His holiness he still took interest in us sinners as we stood in need of redemption.

On the contrary, we, in our fallen nature, realize our differences and remain indifferent and insensitive to situations and the plight of those who are not like us and more so are less fortunate. Often times, those in precarious situations and suffer injustices are easily forgotten. These are left to their plight and are made to suffer the consequences of their difference alone. Think of how we easily call for the sinner's head and rejoice to see them brought down, all in the name of justice today. This is something God the Father never does. This selfishness of man has assumed such great proportions that today we can talk about a globalization of indifference. In fact, it is one of the easiest ways that Satan tempts and seduces us to sin. The very first temptation of Jesus in the desert points to this. St. Luke tells us that Jesus was led by the Spirit into the desert for forty days, to be tempted by the devil. He ate nothing during those days, and when they were over he was hungry. The devil said to him, "If you are the Son of God, command this stone to become bread." By asking Jesus to use his power to transform stone into bread, Satan launched a call on Jesus to indifference. Jesus' power was meant not for his own selfish gains. It was rather for the gains of the poor of the Lord. By virtue of his power he had been made a steward to see to the needs and the redemption of others. Employing his power arbitrarily to supply his own need was tantamount to forgetting the needs of those who are in most need of it. By his refusal then, Jesus refused to be seduced and swayed to be indifferent.

Like Jesus, one of our Biggest Temptations today is to be indifferent. Indifference rears its head in us in different dimensions. It could be personal, interpersonal, cultural and metaphysical.

Sometimes, unmet aspirations and disappointments can make us indifferent to the self. Realizing how different we have become from what we esteem ourselves to be, we begin caring less about the self and about and our health. It is common sight to spot people who overindulge in alcohol and drugs use. Others overeat without any exercise; many more seek solace at the wrong places and yet many more care less about our dressing and personal hygiene. They do all these to the detriment of the self. Other times, realized dreams and aspirations also make a person indifferent to the self. Imagine someone who has secured his/her dream job and is making strides in life. They work themselves out to the extent of hardly finding time to rest. Even when the time is available, they have not got the courage to take a rest. It takes no time to realize how such persons overworked themselves to jeopardize their health. Many burn out, break down and their position is left for another to assume. If such people could detect the blurry lines between good and evil, darkness and light, they would take care of themselves and without giving up on the self, would rescue themselves from mis-judgment, harm and danger.

There is an indifference which goes beyond the self. When life is good for us we are indifferent to others and their plight. Like the proverbial Cain, we do not think we are our brother's keeper in good times. Do we not enjoy our comforts and care less about our brother or sister in crisis? Where is the priest in crisis? Where is the nun in crisis? Where is the Religious in crisis? Have we written them off? Haven't you given up on your sister or brother who is struggling to be good? Writing anybody off who needs our help and encouragement is being indifference to them.

Indifference can also take a socio-cultural dimension. Cultural indifference happens in the lack of awareness of values and in the lack of judgment on values. Today, people make free choices with very little or no assessment between good and evil. There is for instance a blurry line between mode and immodesty today. What used to be judged immodest by society yesterday, is considered fashionable today and many fall into it without qualms. In the trend to unify values, people no longer have the courage to point out what is evil in an apparent value. The end result is the fallen standards in values today. Sad to say that those of us who are supposed to be the conscience of society have become indifferent. We don't want to be bothered. Our lips are sealed when good is exchanged for evil. Social indifference also comes to the fore when societies sit unconcerned and unperturbed as others suffer. According to Pope Francis, we are a communion of saints. When one member suffers all suffer. It is thus important that we open our eyes to the plight of other communities and lift a finger to help or at least raise our voices in prayer through the saints for the needs of theses struggling communities. In our benefits, God makes us stewards of His graces so that through us he can reach out to the poor, the needy, and the less fortunate communities. May we not fall to the seduction of indifference and so fail in our call to be each other's keeper.

There is also the indifference towards God. This is a pretense to be self-sufficient. It is a metaphysical indifference. We are the present day deists. God has created us but he is not interested in our affairs so we have either shelved him or killed him. We are in charge and at the helm of affairs, acting like the supermen of Nietzsche. We have taken our will and destiny into our own hands. God therefore, means either very little or nothing to us. We have lost the sense of sin and are busy subtracting God from the equation in order to solve our own problems. Remember King David after he sinned. Sin for him became a project to execute, a problem standing in need of solution. He thereby acted in his authority, putting God aside. He eventually became a murderer, advised Uriah to sin, commanded Joab to sin and profited from Joab's sin. All he did was to plant himself in further sins. The picture is better painted in the episode of the bad thief and the good thief in Scripture. Whiles the former lost the sense of sin and saw Jesus merely as a possible solution to his problem, asking Jesus to save himself and save them; the latter had a sense of sin. He acknowledged his own sinfulness and Jesus' innocence. He begged to be remembered in Paradise. Though he knew the difference between Jesus and himself, he never got indifference to daily prayer life, indifference to the scriptures, Indifference to the needs of God's people, indifference to holy objects, indifference to annual Lenten observances, all stem from metaphysical indifference. When we stay connected to God, he infects us with his love and mercy; he spurs us on to not only see the difference but also to gather the courage to fast and abstain; may he instruct us to govern our urges and instincts, to master our passions and not be their slaves. May he enable us to be free to give ourselves to him and to our neighbors in spite of our differences. May we learn to make loving sacrifices as much a part of our lives as would make the world a better place to live in.
