

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THE PARABLE OF DIVERSE "SINNERS"

Dear friends in Christ, it is Laetare Sunday and we all rejoice that midway with Lent, our Lenten observances have been good so far. We have done our best to do the ordinary things of Lent extraordinarily well and we pray that God will make good our defects so we endure the rigors of the season to the end. As we do so, the Church bids us reflect on one of Jesus' masterpieces, the Parable of the Prodigal Son. Permit me to call it the parable of diverse "sinners". As the parable depicts, sin has many heads and many faces: in the sinner younger son, there is the sinner father, the sinner servant, and the sinner elder son.

The younger son's sins are many. Not only did he wish his father dead before his time had come, he also extracted family property and squandered it. He joined himself to foreigners and if he was an Israelite, he soiled himself by living with the unclean. As if the details of his sins were not bad enough, his main sin was not so much what he had done, but where he ended up. Jesus called it "in a distant land." This describes the son's "spiritual condition." The wayward son had separated himself from where he truly belonged and when he got close to home, he found a gracious father, looking and longing and running out to meet him. His rehearsed "apology" speech: "Father, I have sinned against heaven and you," was stifled in the embrace of his waiting father (see G. Rink). Sin is that which separates us from God, that which keeps us in a distant land. It is that which pushes a wedge between us and God. Such was the situation in which the younger son found himself.

We also find the sinner of the father and for that matter the parent who graciously forgave the one son, but forgot to hug his other son whom he had "taken for granted" all those years. It was not clear when he last praised his older son. Obviously, he never told him how much he meant to him, that he was proud of him, or that he loved him and thanked God every day for him. It never happened, no. Not even once! How easy it is for a kindhearted father or mother to sin by taking the goodness of their kids for granted! In a house of formation, the superior was fond of scolding students for the wrongs they did. Quite often, in their conferences, he would refer to laws they had flouted or things left undone or things wrongly done. In one of their conferences, a student queried as to why he hardly found or appreciated any good in them. His answer? By virtue of what you are, you are good and goodness must necessarily exude from your conduct. So when you display any good conduct, you are living according to your nature and I need not comment. I worry and have cause to do so when you act contrary to your true nature. Such was the philosophy, which seemingly took for granted the many good inherent in some hardworking young men who needed a pat sometimes in doing the right. Not reinforcing the good and the strengths in others could lead to bitterness, resentment, apathy, and even a division in an otherwise well and closely knitted family. No wonder the elder son refused to show up at his brother's homecoming party. Sin does not only separate man from God, it also breaks the bond between God's people.

There was also the servant whom the older son accosted at his return to hear the sound of the music and the joy of the party. Listen to him again: 'Your brother has returned and your father has slaughtered the fattened calf because he has him back safe and sound.' Would it have been enough for his servant to have been brief in his description? Could he have spared the older brother some of the details he spewed? Was it necessary to mention the fattened calf? Did he lead the elder son to the temptation of rage? Sometimes we sin by leading others to sin. We sin by the choice of words we make in our discourses and by being gossipy. If the party that night was ruffled by the elder brother's mood and attitude, it was also because this servant threw the elder brother into it. He cunningly elicited his anger and succeeded in getting the elder brother to squander all the rights he had done with the sin of anger and resentment.

There was also the decent, faithful, hard working, obedient older son. His was the sin of bad attitude toward life. He was deeply hurt, bitter, and angry at his father for seemingly taking him for granted. He thought it was grossly unfair for his father to throw a big party for the son who had squandered his inheritance on a life of dissipation. He could not even bring himself to call his sibling "brother." Rather, he referred to him as, "your son." He also pitied himself and acted selfishly because he cared less if his "bad" attitude would ruffle the party, which he refused to attend. In his anger and bitterness, he multiplied his sins and fell into calumny. Nowhere in the story was it mentioned that his younger brother partied with prostitutes, yet he managed to rope that into his bitter complaint. All he wanted to achieve was to be sure everyone knew how badly he had been treated. Perhaps worst of all, he could not joyfully celebrate that something truly wonderful happened in the family, the spontaneous gift of grace his brother had received and the generous outpouring of his father's forgiveness and that a sinner had come home and was redeemed. He refused to celebrate that his brother was dead, and had come to life again; that his brother was lost and had then been found (see G. Rink).

Friends, I believe all the characters of sin outlined sound very familiar to us. We see them in our families, in the Church, at our workplaces and social gatherings. We can even identify them in our very selves. Times are when we have separated ourselves and lived poles away from God. Other times we have been that parent or that relative who has taken the good in others for granted. Many other times we have been that servant who led another to sin and yet many more occasions, we have been that selfish unforgiving son whose bitterness blinds him from seeing and celebrating the father's gracious forgiveness. May our Lenten observances lead us to master our sinfulness and conquer our pride. May it lead us to discover the antidote for sin in its diverse ramifications, make good our defects and get the party going when at last the Lamb is slain and his blood would wash away our sins. May we rejoice when at last the resurrection of Christ is here because we have thrown away the dough of sin from our system and have clothed ourselves in the festive robes of the returning sons and daughters of God from the exile of sin.


Reception to Follow in the School Basement

ATTENTION CONFIRMATION STUDENTS


