## THE DESTRUCTION OF THE BODILY TEMPLE

All too soon, the liturgical year is coming to a close. Come next Sunday, we shall celebrate the solemnity of Christ our universal King. In moments like this, the Church bids us reflect on the last things. Scripture has it that it is appointed to each person to die and after death comes judgment. The Christian belief is that judgment leads to heaven or hell. Thus, in the eyes of the Church, the four last things are death, judgment, heaven and hell. Last week, we had the opportunity to reflect on the resurrection. It was consoling to hear Jesus tell the Sadducees that at the resurrection, we shall be different and be like angels as well as the Children of God. This week, we have the opportunity to reflect on that which brings us to the reality Jesus described to the Sadducees - death.

The book of Wisdom purports that God formed man to be imperishable. He made us in the image his own nature. However, through the envy of the devil, death entered the world and they who are in the devil's possession experience death. The sin in us, which we inherited from our progenitors, makes us susceptible to death. Death is thus a necessary end that comes to us every day. The irony is that, much as everyone wants to go to heaven and be like angels and become the children of God, none of us wants to die. Many a time, when the reality of death slaps us in the face, we play the ostrich and deny that reality. We get angry and frustrated at ourselves. We blame God and displace our anger on other people. As it dawns on us that there isn't much we could do, we begin to bargain and make concessions with God and neighbors. As some begin to pray more, be more charitable and try to right their wrongs, others get even more frustrated and angrier still. Many others end up in depressed situations. Yet there are some who, having gone through the various moments of grief regarding the eminence of the necessary end, begin to accept reality and embrace it with stoic calmness and charm. They do so, knowing that our time on earth is just a passage, that all the beauty we see, He has given to us to enjoy while it lasts, but that we have a home to go to and death is the only means to achieving that.

Last week, the world was greeted with the terrible news of about 75,000 people who took to the streets in Santiago as part of some ongoing antigovernment protests in Chile. Unfortunately, that which was meant to be mostly a peaceful demonstration turned violent and disastrous. In the news, hooded protesters could be seen looting a Catholic Church near the main site of the demonstration. They reportedly dragged statues of Jesus and furniture out onto the street and burned them. As the protesters gathered in their thousands and chanted and held banners, smoke billowed from the campus of a nearby university, where protesters started a fire. The police did what they could to set up barricades to limit the damages but not much could be done to save the house of God. The only good thing was that the building itself was not razed to the ground. That beautiful Church building, which stands in the neighborhood of Plaza Italia Square and attracted both tourists and worshippers was vandalized, brutalized and robbed of its past beauty and the glories it used to enjoy.

In this Sunday's gospel, some people were speaking about the temple and how it was adorned with costly stones and votive offerings. To them, Jesus said, "All that you see here - the days will come when there will not be left a stone upon another stone that will not be thrown down." History has it that in 70 AD, this Jerusalem temple, unlike that of Santiago, was not only sacked, it was completely destroyed and in the end, there was indeed no stone left on the other as predicted. It is even purported that when one of the most despised emperors, Julian, in his apostasy tried to undo this Jesus' prophecy by ordering the rebuilding of this sacred structure, it was only at the foundation level that fearful balls of fire burst forth from the earth and scorched the workmen and made it impossible to get near the place (see Msgr. A. Tonne). A structure, as beautiful and as well adorned as the Jerusalem Temple came tumbling down and no attempt at restoring it was possible.

Whenever we think of temples, we remember our very selves. For, St. Paul refers to us as temples of the Holy Spirit. As he once queried, "Do you not know that your bodies are temples of the Holy Spirit, who is in you, whom you received from God?" Our bodies are therefore temples akin to the Santiago Church and the Jerusalem Temple. A time comes when we are either sacked or vandalized. A time comes when we are brutalized and completely destroyed, and that which leaves us desolate is death. It robs us of our mortal bodies and deprives us of the material beauty which was once admired by all and sundry. It burns our energies into ashes the way no life support can restore. It lays its icy hands on us and gives us no room for further warm. It strikes and our admirers are left broken to weep and mourn. Yet, one may ask, is that the end of life? Is there anything more to expect beyond the grave? What goes on in heaven?

A story is told of a man who was told he had some few hours to live. He tried to figure out how best he could use the time at his disposal. Try as he would, nothing meaningful came to mind. He took counsel with a bosom friend who suggested he went for confession. He called the rectory and arranged with the priest for a good confession. They both entered the confessional. Whiles there, he asked the priest what goes on in heaven. When the priest told him he did not know, the gentleman got mad at him and yelled, "You're a priest and you do not know what goes on in heaven?" The priest still declined to tell him what goes on in heaven. Though the gentleman was very displeased, the priest still gave him absolution and dismissed him. Just as they opened the door to the confessional, the priest's little dog who had followed the duo into Church, hopped in and started wailing its tail and jumping happily at the sight of the priest. This was when the priest turned to the gentleman and said, "Have you seen this dog of mine, it has never been into this confessional before, neither does it know what goes on here. All it knows is that his father is in here and so he enters here with joy and cheer. In the same vein, I have never been to heaven before, neither do I know what goes on there. However, I am certain that my Father is there and that alone makes my going home to heaven a thing of beauty, and a thing of beauty is a joy forever. At my death, I am certain, that if I did well to live justly, cooperating with God's grace, my soul will be in His hand and no torment shall touch me. St. Paul was right when he said that when our earthly tent we live in is destroyed, we have a building from God, an eternal house in heaven, not built by human hands.

Friends, as we begin another week, let's pray Jesus to grant us to stay ever in his heart and abide in his wounded side. Should death come to us some day, may Jesus not cast us from him. In dying, may he let us still abide in his heart and wounded side and may the joy of the Father's house be our portion and cup.
