

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HE IS OUR KING

Dear friends in Christ, the saying is true, that man proposes but God disposes. As I wrote to you last week, there was no shade of doubt on my mind that I would celebrate Thanksgiving with you this week and crown it all with the solemnity of Christ the King. I was doubly sure that my days were numbered. So certain was I that when a very good childhood friend of mine lost her mother and learnt I was returning to the US prior to the burial and came to ask how much it would cost to change my flight, I coolly told her it was not about the money, neither was it about the flight. It was all about my service to God's people, who were waiting eagerly to have their shepherd back as stipulated. Indeed so determined was I to travel back to Plum City that I was going to miss my own aunt's funeral which had been scheduled for the 23rd of November. However God knows best and he directs all things to work for good for those who love him.

I believe a word on what's going on will alley your fears and calm your nerves. The R1 visa we use is rather unique. It has to be granted by the Home Office. Then a petition is sent to you to be brought to the Consulate in your home country for the visa. On my petition, my visa was to be good till December 14, 2018. However in the passport, the visa was given to last till the September 12. At the port of entry the officer gave me up to December 14 to stay and the I-94 I printed out gave me till April 2019. In as long as I remained in the US, I was fine. However if left the US after September 12, I would need a new visa. Then my Mom's accident happened. Since I needed to come home as the accident was rather grave, I began a conversation with the attorney in the hope that a new petition could be obtained by the end of September so I could take a new visa whiles home. From all indications this was going to be possible as I was assured by the attorney. So I eventually made my mind to travel home as waiting too long after my mother's accident was making rather anxious. Incidentally the new visa petition did not go through and I was out of the US after the 12th of September anyway. It currently demands that I either petition the consulate to correct the old visa and add the months they took off the petition or wait for the new visa to be granted and claim it once and for all. The first option would bring me back immediately to the US if it works. However, I would have to return to Ghana when the new visa is ready for reception. The second option seems best as it will save me the trouble of having to travel back to Ghana twice within a short while. With the help of the attorney and the clergy personnel office, I hope the way out will soon be clear to enable me return to post. At the moment, securing an appointment with the embassy is the hurdle I have got. Maybe this is an occasion for us all to pray to Christ the King for his will to be done.

This Sunday, we celebrate the solemnity of Christ the universal King. Once upon a time, when Jesus had multiplied five loaves and two fish to feed the multitude, the crowd turned round to seize him and make him king. Jesus however slipped through them and went up the mountain to pray. He clearly demonstrated his disinterestedness in the kind of king they meant him to be. His kingdom was not of this world, his kingdom was not a political kingdom, his kingdom was not of violence, his kingdom was not a material one. Rather his was a kingdom of peace, a kingdom of justice, a spiritual kingdom, a kingdom of love, a kingdom of truth.

In our first reading, the prophet Daniel foretells the power of a special person, set between heaven and earth: "Behold, with the clouds of heaven there came one like a son of man, and he came to the Ancient of Days and was presented before him. To him was given dominion and glory and kingdom, that all peoples, nations and languages should serve him; his dominion is an everlasting dominion, which shall not pass away, and his kingdom one that shall not be destroyed" (7:13-14). In these words, we find a king who reigns from sea to sea, to the very ends of the earth, possessed of an absolute power which will never be destroyed. According to Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI, this messianic prophecy finds its clarity and fulfillment in Christ. Christ is the true Messiah, whose power will never pass away or be destroyed. Unlike the powers of the kingdoms of the earth which rise and fall, the power of Christ is truth and love, the one which gives all things their light and grandeur.

In the Gospel reading, Jesus Himself affirms his kingship to Pilate when he responded to the procurator saying: "You say that I am a king. For this I was born, and for this I have come into the world, to bear witness to the truth. Every one who is of the truth hears my voice" (John 18:37). Thus Jesus here defines his kind of kingship as one of Truth. Earlier on he said to Pilate, "My kingdom does not belong to this world. If my kingdom did belong to this world, my attendants would be fighting to keep me from being handed over to the Jews. But as it is, my kingdom is not here." So Jesus is a King. His kingdom is secured not by armed conflict, neither is it defended by arms. His kingdom is established by doing the will of the Father through a life-giving love. His kingdom is utterly different from earthly kingdoms.

Our second reading situates us in the kingdom of Christ, making us sharers in his kingdom. The author states that Christ loves us and has freed us from our sins by his blood, he has also made us a kingdom, priests to his God and Father (Rev. 1:5-6). According to Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI, the kingdom referred to here is not a political kingdom, it is rather one based on a relationship with God, and with truth. Jesus' sacrifice has opened for us the path to that profound relationship with God: in him we have become true adopted children and thus sharers in his kingship over the world. Jesus thus is King. His kingship is not political. His kingship is not violent. His kingship is neither secured by armed conflict nor defended by arms. His kinship is of peace, of self-giving love and of truth. It is obtained in the accomplishing of God's will. We, by virtue of his blood that poured on Calvary, have been made partakers and sharers in his kingdom. We are citizens of his kingdom, by virtue of his blood. Our call therefore is strive not to let the logic of earthly kingdoms hold sway on our lives. Ours is the call to champion peace and promote love, self-sacrificing love. Ours is the call to stand for the truth and champion its cause. It is in this that we will make fine citizens for the kingdom of God.
