

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## IN PROSPERITY FORGET NOT THE CREATOR

A man and his wife were happily married. They were successful businessmen who excelled in all they laid their hands on. Their neighbors envied their love and success. Whiles some found shelter in their home, some others left their kids with them as they went about their daily ventures. They were simply a sweet couple to have around and many vied to be in their company. They had a two year old son called Adeodatus, who was equally a darling to all. One day as the wife worked around the compound, she complained of some severe chest pains and asked to be sent to the hospital. At the hospital, doctors tried the best they could to save her life but to no avail. Destroyed, the man mourned his wife extensively and vowed never to marry anew. He channeled his energies and resources into catering for his son and provided all his needs. Adeodatus grew into a handsomely beautiful young man. His father simply gave him the best of everything and he lacked nothing. When he came of age, he left his father's house to begin his own life. His father gave him half his fortune and willed the rest of his properties to him. In no time he was rich and affluent. Life was good for him, his wife and his three kids. Time flew by and Adeodatus' father grew old, lonely, sick and weak. As he couldn't do much for himself any longer, he moved in to live with his son and his family in a house he himself had built and bequeathed to his son. Life there in the beginning was fun as the kids were excited to have grandpa's love with them. However, the joy was short lived as taking care of an elderly sick man gradually became a burden for Adeodatus and his wife most especially. Treatment meted out to the old man was not the best. Adeodatus's wife seemed to have no sense of appreciation for her father-in-law's special presence in her husband's life. Neither did Adeodatus himself show any sign of recollection of his father's toils and sacrifices which made him who he had come to be. The couple objectified the old man and treated him as a good for nothing non-entity. When out of his lack of firm grips on things he broke a couple of plates and drinking glasses, they resorted to serving his meals in wooden plates and cups. The old man was miserable and unhappy in his only son's home. However, since he had no where to go, he quietly endured his plight. One day the youngest son of Adeodatus was found busily working in the backyard. He was working on a school project. Curiously Adeodatus asked to know what he was up to. The little boy told him was trying to make some wooden cups, plates and spoons for his mom and dad to use when they grew as old as grandpa. It then dawned on Adeodatus how forgetful and ungrateful he had been to his father. Tears in his eyes, he vowed to give his all for the comfort of his loving father who was all he had had in the land of the living.

Friends in Christ, it is commonplace for human beings to forget their past and the people who pushed them as they climbed the ladder of life. It is especially so in times of prosperity. In prosperity, man easily forgets where he has come from. Such was the fear of Moses when the people of Israel were about to enter the Land of Promise. He knew too well that he would not enter the Promised Land with them. He also knew that human as they were, they could enter the Land flowing with milk and honey and easily forget the God who led them dry shod through the Red Sea and carried them through the desert, provided for them and led them successfully home. Thus, just as they were about to cross the Jordan, Moses said to them, "Fear the LORD, your God, and keep, throughout the days of your lives, all his statutes and commandments which I enjoin on you, and thus have long life". He seemed to be warning them against the temptation of grabbing the goodies of the land of promise whiles forgetting the God of the Promise. He therefore urged them not only to fear God and observe his ordinances but also to love him with all their heart, with all their soul and with all their strength (Deut. 6:2-6).

Friends, the 21st century man is no different from man in Moses' time. Neither are we different from the proverbial Adeodatus in the story above. We all either tend to willfully forget God and His ordinances when life is good; or we tend to be so engrossed in created things as to forget the God of creation. Many are they who have placed so much premium on and trust in themselves and their achievements that they give little thought to God and his command. Many have placed God on the index and reach out to him only when they are in dire need of some supernatural assistance. Contemporary man has even taken calculated steps to subtract God and religious values from the equation of life. Moses' injunction to the people of old is thus our own injunction as well. Our world would be a better place to live in if we all would begin to fear the Lord and in the midst of plenty, comfort, or even in want, love him and acknowledge him with the totality of our being. God is our creator, we are his and we belong to him. Fearing him is the beginning of wisdom, obeying his will and loving him with all our heart, soul and strength even in prosperity is the essence of our lives.

# Safety Inspection

On August 30,2018 our Insurance Company, Catholic Mutual Group, completed a safety inspection of the Church, the Rectory, and all storage buildings. The St. Joseph's Pastoral & Finance Council is addressing each of these items. Not addressing or completing these them makes St. Joseph's non-compliant and puts the liability portion of our insurance at risk.

The following observations were made and have been addressed:

- The emergency light in Church basement needed a new battery.
- A fire extinguisher needed to be installed in the choir loft.
- The carpet by the podium in the Church was loose & bubbling.
- The handrail near the Altar was loose.
- The fire extinguisher in the Rectory needed to be serviced.
- A smoke detector in the Rectory needed new batteries.

The following instances were also observed during the inspection:

- The furnace in the Church is leaking oil. We are in the process of obtaining several bids to replace the furnace.
- The roof on the rectory is deteriorated and needs to be addressed in the very near future.
