

THE TWO-FOLD MISSION TO EVANGELIZE

One of the darkest times in the history of the world was the era of World War I. At the end of this war, in the year 1919, Pope Benedict XV directed an Apostolic Letter, Maximum Illud, to all Catholics. The world had witnessed an unprecedented destructive force, and the Holy Father could not but call us to evangelize, to proclaim Jesus Christ as a source of mercy and unity. Hundred years down the line, the world continues to witness evils. Man's inhumanity to man prevails, and diverse attempts at sowing seeds of hatred and spreading division and violence abound. It is in the face of our present-day social evils that Pope Francis has called for the celebration of this October as Extraordinary Missionary Month. His invitation is for us all to pray, especially in the celebration of Mass during this month, for us all to make a personal encounter with Jesus Christ, Who is alive in the Church; that the Holy Spirit will guide our catechetical formation for mission, and that our love for the Church's mission, which is a passion for Jesus and a passion for His people will grow ever stronger. The Holy Father also encourages us to pray for the witness of missionary saints, especially patroness St. Thérèse of Lisieux and patron St. Francis Xavier; that they may intercede for the fervent missionary spirit of the faithful of our Universal Church. We are thus called to build ourselves for the mission to the nations (Missio ad Gentes) — human, spiritual, biblical, theological and catechetical, and to Missionary charity, where we live in solidarity and prayer with the universal Church, helping missionary Churches reach out. Ours is to gather and tell the story of our mission and so invite one another to appreciate our baptismal vocation to tell forth the Good News and thereby ginger and grow faith in our own selves and in others.

Such was the ministry of the servant girl in the story of Naaman's cleansing. Having been uprooted from her roots and planted in Syria, her migration was a vocation to be a missionary. It was an opportunity to plant the seed of faith in her master. Concerned about her master's predicament, she told him of the prophet Elisha in Israel. She encouraged him to pay the prophet a visit. When the master found the prophet's instruction offensive and questioned the prophet's judgment, she still encouraged and prevailed on him to comply. When the master did, he was not only cleansed, he was also poised to serve only the God of Israel. The fruit of mission is a total dedication to God. Such was the fruit that the servant girl's mission bore. Her master received the blessing of cleansing and belief in the one true God as his own testimony depicted, "Now I know that there is no God in all the earth, except in Israel... please let me, your servant, have two mule-loads of earth, for I will no longer offer holocaust or sacrifice to any other god except to the LORD."

Even though the slave girl was away from home, her mission was not to proclaim the God of Israel to the totality of Syria. Her's was to be a missionary primarily to the household to which she belonged. In her vocation, two dimensions of missionary activities come to the fore: being a missionary to the Nations and being one to one's immediate background. In as long as she left her homeland in Israel for Syria, she was a missionary to others. However, as she ministered to the master of the household in which she lived, her ministry was to her own as a slave, she had become an animate property of her master and she belonged to her master's household just as she would have belonged to her own father's house.

Like this servant girl, all of us Catholics, by virtue of our baptism, have a share in the two-fold mission of the new evangelization. Just as St. Paul was first sent to the Israelites and then to all the nations, we are sent, on the one hand, to our own people in our immediate surroundings and on the other, to all peoples. Therefore, we all have a primary mission to gather our families into the peace of God's kingdom, a mission to tell them of Jesus, to let his love show, a mission to grow the love of him and faith in him in the hearts of our own.

Like leprosy, sin separates and alienates many of our own brothers and sisters from God. There are many more who, out of some atheistic mindset have abandoned God's ways and there are many more who have grown lukewarm in matters of faith and morals. Present-day evils beset many who are known to us and rob them of their faith. We have the need to open our eyes to the present day leprosies in our own homes, those acts of commissions and omissions which isolate our dear ones from God and be courageous enough to attend to them.

Besides our mission to our own people, the dynamism of the love of Christ inherent in us pushes us to go out to build the structures of hope, faith, and love in others. Beyond our borders are peoples and lands that are lying follow, needing to be touched and transformed by God and his Word. As Vatican Council II, proposes, all of us are both subject and object of the mission of evangelization. We have the mandate to step into the world and make evident the unique point where proclamation and witness of life resound. Our call is to evangelize and are-evangelize today's spreading globalization. By means of social communications tools, we have the call to propagate Christ who is the way, the truth and the life to the world. Our mission is to work to satisfy the hunger and thirst for God; to correct the erroneous impression out there that there is civilization without God; to transform poverty as found in today's world and to assist our ecclesial communities to be missionary oriented. Our presence in the world and our witness to it should so cleanse and renew the face of the world that lives we touch cannot help but cry out loud and acknowledge that indeed there is no other God but the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ who alone deserves glory, honor, and praise.

October: A Missionary "Spring" in the Church

That the breath of the Holy Spirit engender a new missionary "spring" in the Church.



St John the Baptist Capital Funds Projects

As Father mentioned last weekend at Mass, we have many projects we are planning to accomplish.

Church Windows:

The current windows have not been replaced or fixed in many years. We feel we should not replace them, but fix them to last many more years. Windows would be re-leaded and new storm windows would be installed where needed. To repair each window, it will cost \$9,000 -\$10,000. We have estimated the total cost to be: \$120,000. To completely replace the large round window above the altar to match existing windows: \$7,500

Steeple:

The Steeple is leaking. It needed to be repaired and painted. The spires will be repaired on the north side of the Church and structurally rebuilt on the inside. All rotten wood will be replaced to replicate the existing wood. Screens inside the bell tower and louvres will be replaced. We need to do this to help take care of the dampness in the Church. The cost to fix interior and paint exterior steeple is \$41,000.

Painting of Interior of the Church:

We are currently collecting bids. So far, we have received 3 bids that range from \$95,000 to 150,000. The differences of these bids are things like having St. John the Baptist providing manpower to take down all statues, help with putting up and moving scaffolding, remove and replace pews, furnishing dumpsters and electricity, rather than having the contractor taking care of everything. For the low bid, trying to find parish men to be here every day to help may be a bit of a challenge. These bids are for painting only. No new carpet or refinishing of the pews has been estimated. Estimated cost: \$150,000.

Upgrade of Church heating vent/thermostat system:

Our heating vents have not been fixed or replaced in quite some time. The one in the main entrance of the Church is broken. We are going to fix this one and upgrade the system, and install new thermostats. Estimated cost: \$2,500.

Church organ repair:

Our organ is not working to its capacity. Estimated cost: \$25,000.

Miscellaneous items:

We have many smaller projects that also need to be worked on, such as landscaping, new church sign with electricity, new roof for BBQ pit and possible re-purpose of this area into picnic area. Estimated cost: \$4,000.

The total cost for all projects is \$350,000. Currently, we have \$18,500 remaining in window fund, and about \$139,000 in restoration and other savings accounts. This means we have to raise about \$192,500 to complete all of these projects. We have already completed many needed projects such as the Church Roof, Church Tuck Point, new Church Doors, concreate work/sidewalks on West side of church and in front of Rectory, as well as seal coat of the parking lot.

Yes, this does sound overwhelming and a large amount. All of it is needed to keep our Church going. It would really help us if we could get families to get together and donate towards one or more of the windows in honor of the ancestors that first put them there. Any funds that you can donate towards our restoration projects would be greatly appreciated and accepted. Fund raising projects will need to be held for the balance of funds needed.

May God bless you for all you do to keep our Parish vibrant; especially as we move towards our 150-year anniversary and beyond.
