ZACCHAEUS THE TAX COLLECTOR

One of the Bible stories I learned early in life was the story of the conversion of Zacchaeus. It was such a famous story that every child my age at the time could narrate it with cheer and win public admiration and applause easily.

This is a story about a man who was a publican. As a tax collector, he had hired himself out to the enemies of his compatriots and had turned a bedfellow and a collaborator with the Roman occupational forces in Palestine. He was deemed a thief and a scavenger, as his job made him an extortioner who enriched himself at the expense of his own people. That he was a chief tax collector made his situation worse. He raked in his wealth not only from his own people but also from the excesses of other subordinate tax-gatherers. More so, he was a chief tax-gatherer in no other place but Jericho, a very wealthy region in Palestine. Being a linkway with Jerusalem and a point of departure across the Jordan, Jericho was a fertile ground for any shrewd tax-gatherer to enrich himself and make it big in life. Thus, a chief tax collector in Jericho was nothing but a wealthy man. Zacchaeus was filthy rich.

Money, they say, can't buy happiness. So, rich though he was, Zacchaeus was lacking in happiness. There was an insatiable thirst and in incessant hunger in him which the wealth he had rapaciously gathered could not quench. He sought for a change and convinced himself that Jesus, who had been friends with tax collectors and sinners could be the answer. He thereby sought to see Jesus and took drastic steps to encounter him. In spite of himself and without regard to the crowd who would treat him with spite and pour scorn on him, he ran ahead of the way Jesus would go and climbed a sycamore tree, just so his stature would not hinder his bid to catch a glimpse of Jesus as he passed. It was while he was still perching up the sycamore tree that Jesus stopped, bade him descend and invited himself to Zacchaeus' home. Though the crowd murmured against Jesus' choice to be the guest of a sinner, yet Zacchaeus still acknowledged his past and showed sincere contrition as he promised to give half his property to the poor and do fourfold restitution to anyone he had defrauded. In the sight of his perfect contrition, Jesus responded and said, "Today salvation has come to this house because this man too is a descendant of Abraham. For the Son of Man has come to seek and to save what was lost."

Friends, this story speaks loads to us all. As I skim through it, what immediately strikes me is that no individual is too bad to be saved and no one is beyond the power of Christ's grace. If a public sinner like Zacchaeus could win God's favor in spite of himself, then there is an opportunity for salvation for anyone who seeks God with a sincere heart.

It is also clear from the storyline that little and insignificant are things on which our salvation often turns. Zacchaeus did not need to do extraordinary things to be visited by the Lord who saves. He only had to acknowledge his need for Christ and run up a sycamore tree to be found by Jesus. They were the simple and little steps that made him host Jesus in his house, an act that drew salvation right into his house. May we never despise the day of small things as they can lead to our own salvation as well (see Zech. 4:10).

From the story, we gather that those whom Christ calls must humble themselves and come down. Though it seemed uncomfortable for Zacchaeus to stay on top of the tree, he was in his comfort zone. There, he was safe from the troubles of the crowd. He was also positioned to overcome the obstacles that his stature brought between him and his encounter with Jesus. Nevertheless, at the call of Jesus, he had to forget his stature and the possible harsh treatment from the crowd and come down from the tree. His descent was therefore reminiscent of thinking of himself less and possibly swallowing his pride so as to lower himself to the level of all who stood in need of a Savior.

He also gave vent to the change his encounter with Jesus effected in him. As every genuinely converted sinner would do, he gave evidence to his conversion. He proved by his act of generosity to the poor and his extravagant restitution that conversion is not merely a lip service to pay but a call to positive action. From him, therefore, we learn that conversion is meaningless if it is not backed by genuine action.

Touched by the grace of God, we cannot help but be generous. By his fourfold restitution, Zacchaeus went beyond the confines of the law. He was making a voluntary confession at a time when he had not violently robbed anyone. So the expected legal restitution would have been to return an equal amount extorted or it's equivalent value to their rightful owners. However, having been touched by the grace and mercy of God, Zacchaeus went all out to be generous to the poor as well as gracious to his victims. Grace had snatched him from the domain of the law and planted a seed of countless charity in his heart. No wonder as he gave half of his property and acted generously toward his unsuspecting victims Jesus surprised him with more - Salvation.

Even though it was Zacchaeus who did the running and the climbing, it was Jesus who caught glimpse of him and took the initiative to invite himself to be his guest. Jesus took the first step in reaching out to Zacchaeus. He cut through the exclusivity of the Jews and approached this public sinner, an outcast. Very often, the first step in making a friend is quite difficult yet if we take the initiative we can get the best out of others.

Finally, it pays to avoid prejudgments on the basis of appearance or social status. Jesus never prejudged Zacchaeus according to the nature of his job, neither did he view him through the social lens. He gazed on the tree and saw a man who had to be brought down from the tree of weakness and be planted in the oasis of salvation. In the end, he made a son of Abraham out of a publican. Rather than prejudging Zacchaeus, Jesus offered him friendship, he spent time with him, listened to his story and shared himself with Zacchaeus.

This week, if we all would learn of our chances for salvation, if we would seize our little opportunities, and allow God's graces to spur us on to lives of charity, humbly acknowledging the dignity of all, if we would graciously offer genuine friendship to all we meet and spend time with people as we share in their dreams and aspirations, we will help build a better world and create a safe haven for many people. May God be our help.


