I shall be charged with caring for your health in both body and soul. I will willingly come to your aid. I offer myself indeed on divine help, I have decided to spare no labors or dangers in order to fulfill my pastoral office and to serve the flock committed to me in any way I can for their salvation."

We can find creative ways to express and share our faith and never lose hope. For, in the Resurrection on the last day, we Hope for the greatest of joyful reunions, the most majestic banquets, and the infinitely marvelous fun of eternal beatitude. ALLELUIA!



This is why Saints Joachim and Anne, church & school, has continued to nourish souls in creative ways, to educate children with the most resilient and brilliant of determination of any school I know, to serve and show our gratitude to our healthcare worker community by taking care of their kids during the day at SJA-SACS and praying for their safety daily. We've found ways to feed the hungry with Matterboxes from Matter.ngo and with school lunches delivered to families, while feeding souls with a curbside Confessival that made the Star Tribune, and a drive-in Eucharistic Procession with Archbishop Hebda that filled the old St. Francis (Scott County) parking lot.

In the First Reading for Easter Sunday (Acts 10), St. Peter describes Jesus after the Resurrection: "...God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and power. He went about doing good and healing all those oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. We are witnesses of all that he did..." May our spiritual family continue to be witnesses of Christ in such beautiful ways, ancient and new. For the glory of God and the salvation of souls, confidently and joyfully under the banner of our Triumphant Resurrected Lord Jesus Christ!

Our school, while closed per the Governor's order, remains open to care for children of essential workers. Each day we serve up to 26 students from 6:30 am until 5 pm. It is an honor to spend the day with these children, while their parents serve the needs of the community. We have many parents who work in the nursing field. These parents are very thankful for the consistent good care for their children in this uncertain time.

At this time, I must also give a shout out to our amazing teachers. This dedicated bunch of professionals has been putting in some long hours changing the way we deliver education to our students and families. This has been no easy task, but our teachers met it with great enthusiasm. They got right to work learning new technologies to be able to teach from a distance, and also to find ways to keep the personal connection to students and families. I am happy to report that just a week after our school closed due to the governor's order, each SACS family had received a phone call from their teacher(s) to check in and help transition to distance learning. Our teachers are doing amazing work. We have a great plan in place, and we are adjusting the plan weekly, as this is new to us, too.

I have had great support from other Catholic School principals as we all work to meet the needs of our families. We share ideas, resources, and prayer. I am proud to be part of the great group of 79 Catholic elementary school principals in the archdiocese.

Finally, today, I was scheduled to help care for the children of essential workers, and after my shift, I took time to pray the Rosary at school. I started in the school chapel, but because the sun was shining, I moved my prayer to the courtyard under the gaze of Mary. While I was there praying, another woman, whom I did not recognize, walked into the courtyard with her Rosary beads in hand. We shared just a glance and a smile as we united in this powerful form of prayer.

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

First Reading


Peter's speech about the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus offers us a glimpse into the Church's earliest kerygma (oral proclamation) about Jesus. How is Peter's speech persuasive to you?

Second Reading

Using the metaphors of yeast and unleavened bread, Paul viewed the death and resurrection of Jesus as bringing a new life of "sincerity and truth" to the community of believers. How does the celebration of Easter unite your faith community?

Gospel Reading

Mary Magdalene is the first to realize that Jesus had risen from dead, and twice is told, "Do not be afraid." What fears are alleviated in you knowing that Jesus rose from the dead?



GOSPEL MEDITATION Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

When we awoke this morning, we found ourselves blessed with another day. It is Easter Sunday. As that thought crossed our minds, did we find ourselves saying "so what" or "alleluia"? For many, today is truly a day of alleluia. For others, it is just another day of "so what." Faith makes a huge difference. It not only makes a difference in how we understand today and the significance of what we celebrate, it also makes a huge difference in terms of how we understand ourselves.

Succeed, live well, be productive, find your niche, follow your dreams, make money, protect your social status, be politically correct, and keep your preferences to yourself are pretty good examples of the messages our secular life wants us to hear. In and of themselves, they don't sound all that harmful. But when really examined, they are. The life of resurrection embodied in the Gospel tells us a much different story.

Life keeps us busy. We are always connected, distracted, occupied, and working. For many of us, an agenda awaits us before we even start our day, and unfinished stuff is brought with us when we retire at night. Make the best of life and "find your own road to happiness are messages we all too easily believe. The "so what" response to the new life of resurrection is often the result of believing that life is only what I make it. What God has to say isn't important to me securing my next raise.

Sadly, we live as if the grave is the end. While we may give the wonder of heaven a blink now and then, its glory really doesn't impress us or matter all that much. It's all about the here and now and what I need to do today to get where I want to be tomorrow. We tend to put off considering the one significant "tomorrow" that will come the millisecond after we take our last breath. When that happens, will we want to be thinking "so what?" or "alleluia"?

There is only one Jesus, one mission, and one resurrection. There is also only one of us. Have you ever pondered what one solitary, humble human life can do? Faith, not our world, tells us how special we are. We are not robots. We are not replaceable. We have one shot. There are no do-overs. Love is at our core and unites us together as one with the God of love who so desperately wants us to be with Him forever. This may not match our secular agenda, but it ought to make our true inner agenda leap for joy. There doesn't need to be an end. I can live forever. Alleluia!



WHY DO WE DO THAT? Catholic Life Explained: Confessing Sins

Question:

If I go to the Sacrament of Penance and end up repeating the same sins, does that mean I do not have a strong enough intention to amend my life?

Answer:

There is a popular expression that says, "Be patient. God isn't finished with me yet!" Growing in faith and holiness is an ongoing, life-long project, and our struggle with sin is at the heart of it. As St. Paul says, the good he intends to do, he does not do. The evil he does not intend, he does! It is not always a lack of intention, but more often the allure of evil that makes it difficult to change.

When we confess our sins, we are to come with a fully contrite heart. You need to reflect on your true feelings toward your actions before approaching the sacrament. After confession, there are strategies you can make to avoid falling into the same traps of sin. First, pray for and seek out strength and perseverance through multiple sacraments, charitable work, and personal sacrifice. Second, avoid occasions of sin when you might fail or be sorely tempted. In doing these things, remind yourself daily that it is a spiritual war we wage, and with God's grace, we will succeed.

Nevertheless, the reality and results still show a stark decrease in revenue. **The past few weekends, our Sunday collection has been under 50% of our normal Sunday collection**.

The most difficult decisions made thus far have been to reduce hours and pay for some employees, and we have had to furlough a few employees. If we do not see an increase in giving in the near future, we will need start dipping into our cash reserves or make further cuts to our expenses. We will continue to monitor our financial situation and prayerfully make the best decisions for the long-term financial health of our parish.


