MISSION STATEMENT

St. George Parish in Waimanalo is a Community of many diverse people joined together to proclaim God's Word in Holy Scripture by celebrating the Liturgy and building a Faith Community. Uniquely embraced by the majestic Koolau and rolling seas we strive to be a Welcoming Parish and commit ourselves to serve the people of God through Outreach, Unity and Renewal.

In the ancient land of the Bible, the shepherd protected and provided for the needs of every sheep of the flock. The Lord is our Good Shepherd. He shares the care of the flock with others. Today, let us pray that God will raise up good shepherds to assist in leading the flock of Christ to salvation.

First Reading: Jeremiah 23: 1-6 - In ancient times, the word "shepherd" was used for kings, priests and prophets -- the leaders of the people. Jeremiah observes that all the shepherds of the Lord's flock were corrupt in his time. But God would raise up a new and righteous shoot from the family of David. He would be the Good Shepherd.

Second Reading: Ephesians 2: 13-18 - The Jews are God's Chosen People. We non-Jews or Gentiles are nothing. Yet God has called us to share with His people in His heritage. He has reconciled all people in Christ Jesus and made us heirs of heaven. Let us gracefully realize this profound dignity.

Gospel: Mark 6: 30-34 - When the disciples return from their first mission, Jesus urges them to "come aside and rest a while." If our lives are to have meaning and purpose, we must learn daily to rest with God in personal meditation and prayer. Through some meditation and prayer we will grow in fervor of faith and love.

Today's Reflection: The Source of All Forgiveness

In his 1622 painting The Penitent St. Mary Magdalene, Giovanni Francesco Barbieri, known as Guercino, portrays Mary Magdalene with shoulders uncovered and disheveled hair. These details remind us of her shameful past without defining her present. Rather, it is her humble, penitent spirit from which her heroic love for Jesus springs. The sinful Mary, who had been forgiven so much, is also one who has loved much. One angel holds out before her the symbols of the passion to remind Magdalene of the ransom her Beloved paid to set her free from sin. A second angel pointing to heaven

reminds her that these nails no longer bind him. Or as the angel would tell Mary Magdalene in the garden, "He is not here, for he has been raised" (Matthew 28:6). Many mistakenly conflate Mary Magdalene with the unknown woman from Luke 7:36–50. The woman offers an act of humility by breaking into the dinner party of Simon and sobbing over the feet of Jesus. She bathes his feet with tears of repentance and dries them with her lovely hair. Despite the confusion, we admire this woman's and Mary's humility. Neither were too proud to repent. The painting is called The Penitent St. Mary Magdalene because Mary looks purposely like a person kneeling in confession. Speaking with head downcast, she admits her failures. And as in confession, the representative of God sits on the other side encouraging her to consider Jesus' passion, love, and mercy. The angel in the center reminds Mary to whom she is really confessing. By pointing to heaven, we are all reminded of the source from whom all forgiveness comes. Fr. Feast of St. Camillus de Lellis Feast Day - July 18

St. Camillus didn't start out his life in dedication to good work and virtue. He lived a life of fighting and gambling. At an early age he was afflicted with a



leg wound that never healed. He became a Capuchin but was unable to stay in the Order because of his diseased leg. He devoted himself to caring for the sick and became director of St. Giacomo Hospital in Rome. He then got permission to be ordained and founded his own congregation, the Ministers of the Sick-The Camillians. He recruited both priests and laymen, who cared for the sick and dying on the street. They distinguished themselves by wearing a red cross on their clothing. Camillus' organization spread throughout Italy and by the time of his death in 1614, he had founded more than 30 hospitals. He was canonized in 1746 by Pope Benedict XIV. Today, the Order of St. Camillus is a devout group of Roman Catholic men who dedicate themselves to caring for the sick.

Their charism is to give complete service to the sick and dying and to teach others how to serve them. They concentrate on both spiritual and corporal needs of the sick.
