### MISSION STATEMENT

We are citizens of heaven; but we are also citizens of earth. We live in a secular world. There will always be tension between this world and the kingdom of God. We shall never completely solve these tensions. Yet in every aspect of our public life we must seek to serve God. Let us pray for wisdom to be good citizens of this world while we serve the Lord in all things.

### TODAY'S READINGS

1st Reading: Isaiah 45: 1, 4-6 - Six centuries before Christ, a pagan king, Cyrus the Great of Persia, freed the Jews from the Babylonian Captivity. Cyrus did not know the true God. But he did such good things that he is even called "the Lord's Anointed." People of good will are not always found in the church pews.

RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION 2nd Reading: 1 Thessalonians 1: 1-5b -Even when we do not see God's plans for us and for our world, we must keep up our hope and our faith. Let us pray that we shall always be faithful to our convictions in our public life.

Gospel: Matthew 22: 15-21 - Today's gospel is an attempt to entrap Jesus by mandatory for parents and godparents asking about tribute to Caesar. Jesus' reply is classic: Give to Caesar what belongs to him, and to God what belongs to God. But in faith, we know that all things belong to God. Pastor at least six months prior to wedding Let us never fear to stand up for principles of justice and religion in all areas of our life.

### **Today's Reflection: Our Divine Mark**

Have you ever wondered why so many ancient busts of emperors and gods still exist? In any major museum around the world, you'll see rows of these masterful sculptures. The Vatican Museums have one of the best of these collections. Thousands of busts and statues of the emperors and gods were produced for civil use in ancient times. Just like the American president's portrait is in every US embassy, so Caesar's sculpted form was all over the Roman Empire. For example, a bust would be placed in the town squares of the outlying territories to indicate that a border population belonged to the Roman Empire. The sculptures of Roman gods were also set up in public places around town so that a certain religious unity was preserved. Being within the empire obliged citizens to pay tributes and taxes, and it assured them of protection. Once the Caesars declared themselves divine, their statue also required sacrifice and worship. The image of the Caesar marked what belonged to him: from land, to money, to people, to prayer. If you were under his image, you belonged to him. We also carry the mark of a divine image that indicates to whom we belong. Each human being is made in the image of God, to be his reflection. We are sculpted and formed to reflect the artist who made us. God gives humans dignity because we are an eternal reflection of God's free, intelligent, artful, and beautiful nature. Our inalienable rights, rooted in our spiritual and rational nature, come from our Creator, as do our duties. No one can take them away. It is proper to render unto Caesar what is his, but both Caesar and his subjects must render to God what belongs to God. + ~ Fr. Mark Haydu, LC

### Reflections from the Word of God to Prepare for the 2020 Elections

[Scripture quotes from the New American Bible, Revised Edition]

As faithful citizens of the United States, the State of Hawaii, and the local regions to which we belong, we not only enjoy the right to vote, but we have a civic duty to do so to make our democracy a government "of the people, by the people, and for the people." The following are offered as an invitation to prayer and discernment about some of the issues facing our community to help all discern God's will regarding the persons we elect for public office. We urge you to pray over them in this time leading up to our November 3 elections.

### One Nation under God - Religious Liberty

Our nation was founded on "the laws of nature and nature's God." Do we still share this fundamental belief? For those who do believe, is that belief fostered or threatened by our culture and its leaders? "Hear, O Israel! The LORD is our God, the LORD alone! Therefore, you shall love the LORD, your God, with your whole heart, and with your whole being, and with your whole strength." (Deuteronomy 6:4-5)

### The Sanctity of Life from Conception until Natural Death

Pope Francis has said that without the right to life, no other right has meaning. What can we do to halt and reverse the hidden Holocaust of abortion that is so accepted that it is protected by law? How can we assure that our leaders will work for a greater respect for life in all its stages, including the lives of convicted criminals, of the frail elderly, of the poor, and of other vulnerable persons?

"I call heaven and earth today to witness against you. I have set before you life and death, the blessing and the curse. Choose life, then, that you and your descendants may live." (Deuteronomy 30:19-20)
