TODAY'S READINGS:

Ist Reading: Amos 8: 4-7 - The prophet Amos was a poor country shepherd from southern Palestine. Eight centuries before Christ, God called Amos to prophesy to the rich and sophisticated northern kingdom of Israel. Amos angrily cries out against social injustice.

2nd Reading: 1 Timothy 2: 1-8 - St. Paul urges us to pray for everyone, but especially those who are powerful. The powerful have more temptations to avarice and other vices. We must never be jealous of them, but must unselfishly and blamelessly pray for all.

Gospel: Luke 16: 1-13 - As we listen to the words of today's gospel, let us ask ourselves what our real values in life are. What it comes right down to is, our actions show what our goals are. If we show by action that we value the things money can buy more than we value our faith, we are serving a false master.

Today's Reflection: How Do We Treat The Poor?



When Pope Francis was elected, Catholics were inspired by his humility and simplicity. When he bowed before the people in St. Peter's Square and asked for their prayers, the little crowd gathered around the TV in the basement of the Catholic Center was moved to tears. When he announced that he would continue living in the guesthouse rather than the papal apartments and eat in the cafeteria, we cheered. But Pope Francis also challenged us. He wanted us to examine

how we treated the poor and marginalized of the world. In his encyclical **Laudato Si'**, he confronted us with the understanding that our misuse of the environment impacted the poor first of all and that we could no longer continue to consume our natural resources in a reckless and greedy fashion. The prophet Amos has some harsh words for those who exploit the poor. In the Old Testament, care for the widow, orphan, and stranger—the poorest of the poor—were among the most righteous things a person could do. Many prophets pointed to the failure to do so as a sign that the people had turned from the Lord and, in their sin, cared only for themselves. More recent figures who also have indicated that the measure of a society is the way they treat their poorest members include Ghandi, St. John Paul II, and Dietrich Bonhoeffer. Christ commanded us to love one another. Surely this includes seeing that all have the basic necessities of life, even if that means we don't get everything we want. +Mary Katharine Deeley
