Jesus promised to give us His peace. But it is not peace as the world gives it. If we stand up for what is right and true, we shall be opposed just as the Lord was. In spite of opposition, we shall have peace of soul in knowing that we are doing what the Lord wants us to do. Let us pray for the courage to be loyal witnesses for Christ, and for the peace which passes all understanding.

TODAY'S READINGS:

First Reading: Jeremiah 38: 4-6, 8-10 - God called Jeremiah to be a prophet. Jeremiah's message was not a popular one; he was accused of treason. The truth often hurts, but we must always be loyal to the truth of God.

Second Reading: Hebrews 12: 1-4

Last Sunday's second reading gave us examples of the strong faith of Abraham and Sarah. Today's reading continues that theme, and reminds us of Jesus Who endured the cross for our sake.

Gospel: Luke 12: 49-53

Although Jesus came to bring justice, peace and love, many people are opposed to the gospel. Fidelity to the way of Christ may bring upon us ridicule and persecution; the gospel may even divide families. As we listen to the gospel, let us pray that we may follow the truth of Christ in spite of every difficulty.



Today's Reflection: Jesus as Disrupter

When I was young, one of my favorite pictures of Jesus was one of him blessing little children. How calm and peaceful Jesus seemed, and his eyes were full of love. In later years, I have been drawn to other images and art of Jesus holding, healing, and granting mercy to his beloved children. The image of Jesus as a nurturer is so comforting that I tend to forget that Jesus also disturbed the peace, questioned authority, and demanded complete obedience and loyalty.

For first-century Christians, following Jesus often meant leaving family and friends, civil disobedience (not considering Caesar as a god), and reimagining religious traditions. The Christ who sows division is uncomfortable, but Christians in every century have had to speak out against evil and sin, especially when their culture's or country's practices lead people away from rather than toward God. Even here in the United States, Catholics have found themselves defending the dignity of all human life and economic and social justice for the poor, even when it meant challenging the prevailing attitudes and political climate. It's rarely easy to speak truth to power or popularity, and we have to guard against those who think they are always right or somehow above God. Jesus himself recognized that he would not always be popular, so he lifted up the two great commandments to love God and neighbor as the measure of how we should act even when those actions divide us. + Mary Katharine Deeley

Looking for a greater purpose in Life?






RCIA: Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults

“Love God with all your heart, your mind and your soul AND Love your neighbor as yourself”

Benedict XVI, in his first encyclical *Deus Caritas Est* (nn.16-18), “left us a beautiful commentary.” “Only if I serve my neighbor can my eyes be opened to what God does for me and how much he loves me.”

Pope Francis reiterated the words of his predecessor that it is in serving others that Christians can give a visible sign of love to the world. “The commandment of love to God and neighbor is the first not because it is the first in the list of commandments. Jesus does not place it in the top, but at the center because it is the heart from which everything has to start and from which everyone must return to and reference,” Caring for the most vulnerable is at the center of the law of the covenant and has been fulfilled by Christ, who united in His flesh, “divinity and humanity into one single mystery of love.” “Love is the measure of faith, and faith is the soul of love. In the ‘dense forest of rules and regulations’, Jesus allows us to see not a Law but two faces that become one: the face of God that can be seen in others.
