**God bless our Advent efforts** as we journey through this new year of grace. Here are some thoughts to help guide us:

#### SECOND SUNDAY IN ADVENT— CYCLE A

#### THY KINGDOM COME

The Texts: Isaiah 11:1-10; Romans 15:4-9; Matthew 3:1-12

**Each time we gather for worship** and stand before the altar, hearing again the story of our Lord's life, death, and resurrection, we come to that moment when we pray the Lord's Prayer. Praying the "Our Father" both privately and publicly is central to Christian practice and has been for as long as the Christian faith has existed. In that beloved prayer, we say, "Thy Kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven." So poignant is that phrase, that to hear ourselves pray it again and again surely reminds us that our faith is all about God's Kingdom, not ours, God's agenda, not ours, and God's purpose for life, not ours.

Today's lessons marshal the genius of that profound phrase in three unique and powerful ways. So let's look at each of the lessons and ask ourselves what they are saying across the great chasm of time calling us to pray more fervently, "thy Kingdom come". Some 700 years before the birth of our Lord, a court prophet in the southern Kingdom of Judah envisioned a day when all the rancor and brokenness of our world would become a peaceable kingdom. We know him as the prophet Isaiah. His day was much like ours. The world he knew, much like ours, teetered on the edge of barbarity. Nations rose and fell, rulers came and went, and yes, most human beings knew a degree of suffering and inhumanity that most of us cannot even begin to imagine.

For Isaiah, God's Kingdom would be led by a person he called "A shoot out of the The Spirit of the Lord stump of Jesse." would rest on this sovereign in a way that informed every decision made. This coming ruler would not be hostage to capricious or selfish interests, nor would greed or grabbing for power color decisions made. Rather, this ruler, this monarch, this leader would be presence clothed with the of God. "Righteousness shall be the belt around his waist, and faithfulness the belt around his loins.

This Kingdom was Isaiah's holy and beautiful dream. In that land for which he longed millennia ago, the wolf would like down with the lamb, and the lion would eat straw like an ox. In that Kingdom, children would not be threatened or harmed by any malady, whether it be a poisonous snake or the killing machine of an invading army. Said Isaiah, "They will not hurt or destroy on all my holy mountain; for the earth will be full of the knowledge of the Lord as the waters cover the sea." The coming Kingdom, as Isaiah dreamed it, would be an existence when life in all its wonder would fully be lived and celebrated as God's good gift.

We fast forward seven plus centuries and meet there a burly, rough-hewn, spirited preacher we know as John the Baptist. Born to Elizabeth, the cousin of the Virgin Mary, John and Jesus were roughly the same age, John being a handful of months older. Much mystery surrounds John the Baptist. Scholars in recent years have tried to tie him to the monastic community that produced the Dead Sea Scrolls. There, on the western shore of the Dead Sea, the community of Qumran lived a simple, ascetic, deeply observant lifestyle in community. One of their tasks, by which they may have earned income for the community, was the hand copying of Holy Scripture.

Whether John the Baptist was part of that community at one time in his life begs the question. We do meet him in the desert. The texture of Matthew's portrait of him suggests a counter-cultural, in-your-face prophet. And most of all, John is looking for the coming of God's Messiah. For John, God's coming Kingdom was going to be a wholesale housecleaning of history. John's baptism was for repentance. The Gospels suggest thousands of people walked great distances to hear him preach and to experience his baptism in the muddy waters of

**In John's words, not even respectable religious folks** would get a pass when God came in all God's power and judgment. He called the religious leaders who came seeking his baptism a "brood of vipers" whose hearts' devotions did not square with their ritual observance. The Kingdom that was coming, in John's vision, would be violent, radical, revolutionary, and sudden. With one exception: One mightier, anointed of God, was coming after him who would do the heavy lifting required in this coming revolution. His work would use the winnowing fork of God's cleansing and "unquenchable fire" of God's judgment.

**Our third picture of God's Kingdom** comes from Paul's letter to the Romans. Paul describes to the Christians of the Imperial City a way of life infused with the values, character, and presence of Jesus Christ. He called them to live in the realm of "hope", breathing the rarified air of "steadfastness and encouragement" all of which has the power to grant "harmony with one another, in accordance with Christ Jesus."

For Christians, the Kingdom is a community of mutual affirmation and generous love showing the world a way of life that refuses to let anger lead to ruptured relationships or fear sabotage mercy. Our example, wrote Paul, is always Jesus Christ. At that time, Jews and Gentiles saw the life of faith from radically different perspectives. Paul reminds the Romans – who were mostly Gentiles – that our Lord, being a Jew, became a servant to bring the entire world – both Jews and Gentiles – into God's Kingdom. In a word, in God's Kingdom, there are no categories of being human. All humankind is loved equally and passionately by God.

So what do we do with these three sketches of God's coming Kingdom? Without distinction, all three tell us God's Kingdom will be unlike anything humankind can imagine or create. None of us have the power or persuasion to bring God's Kingdom into being. It is God who establishes the high mountain of worship, God who overturns our selfish understandings of faith, and God who creates a community rooted in harmony and grace.

**But let us hasten to add that while God's Kingdom is God's doing**, God calls all of us to live in ways that anticipate and reveal the Kingdom to others. Here is a picture of grace unlike any other. We do not bring God's Kingdom; but by our lives, we reveal God's Kingdom values and presence. So how we speak, the integrity with which we live, the compassion we demonstrate in the face of human suffering, and the love we give without expectation of anything in return reveal God's Kingdom, offering a glimpse of what is surely coming in all its fullness. Such is the Kingdom coming in this One who draws near and meets us at Bethlehem. Amen.

The God Who is Revealed in Christmas from Fr. Ron Rolheiser, OMI

**Christmas is God's answer to human longing**, God's response to the centuries of prayers that lay hidden in our groaning, in our sighs, our frustrations, and our religious efforts, each of them a plea, mostly silent, for a divine intervention, all of them asking God to come and rid the world of injustice and our hearts of loneliness and heartache.

But God's answer didn't exactly meet our expectations even as it surpassed them. What was born with Jesus' birth and what still lies seemingly helpless in mangers all around the world wasn't exactly what the world expected.

What the world expected was a superstar, someone with the talent, sharpness, and raw musclepower to out-gun everything that's bad on this planet, someone charismatic enough to make everyone who opposes him slink away in defeat. God's answer to that: A baby lying helpless in the straw! Why? Why would God choose to be born into the world in this way?

**Because you can't argue with a baby!** Babies don't try to compete, don't stand up to you, don't try to best you in an argument, and don't try to impress you with their answers. Indeed, they can't speak at all. You, on your part, have to coax everything out of them, be it a smile or a word, and that effort, which demands great patience, usually draws out what's best in you. Moreover, you can't push at a baby too hard, it will begin to cry and the session is over.

And that is the Savior who was born in Bethlehem, and that is how God is still basically in the world. Like a baby. God does not outgun anyone, out-muscle anyone, threaten anyone, or overpower anyone. The power of God revealed in Christmas is the power of a baby, nothing more, nothing less: innocence, gentleness, helplessness, a vulnerability that can soften hearts, invite in, have us hush our voices, teach us patience, and call forth what's best in us. We watch our language around a baby in the same way as we watch our language in a church, with good reason.

The power of Christmas is like the power of a baby, it underwhelms in such a way as to eventually overwhelm. There is a greater power than muscle, speed, charism, unstoppable force: if you were to put a baby into a room with the heavy-weight boxing champion of the world, who ultimately would be the stronger? The boxer could kill the baby, but, no doubt, wouldn't, precisely because something inside the baby's powerlessness would overwhelm the boxer. Such is the way of God, the message of Christmas.

But we have always been slow to understand this. We want our messiahs to possess more immediate power. And we are in good company here. The messiah that people longed for during all those centuries leading up to Jesus and Bethlehem was precisely conceived as a human superhero, someone with the earthly muscle to bang heads together and purge the world of evil by morally superior muscles.

Even John the Baptist expected the messiah to come with that kind of power. His concern was justice, repentance, asceticism. He warned people of an approaching time of reckoning and expected the longed-for messiah to come precisely as a violent fire, a winnowing fan that would separate the bad from the good and burn up the former with a righteousness that came straight from God.

#### When he heard reports of Jesus gently inviting sinners in rather than casting them off, John was

**scandalized.** That kind of a messiah didn't fit his expectations, or his preaching. That's why Jesus, in sending a response to him, invited John not to be scandalized in him. John hadn't wanted a gentle, vulnerable, peace-preaching messiah. He wanted bad people punished, not converted. But, to his credit, once he saw how Jesus' power worked, he understood, accepted a deeper truth, stepped back in self-effacement, and pointed people in Jesus' direction with the words: He must increase and I must decrease. I'm not even worthy to untie his scandal strap!

#### We too are slow to understand.

Like John the Baptist, our impatience for truth and justice makes us want and expect a messiah who comes in earthly terms, all talent and muscle, banging heads together so as to rid the planet of falsehood and evil. We want the kind of messiah we see at the end of every Hollywood thriller: Mother Theresa turned into Sylvester Stallone or Bruce Willis as I write this, beating up the bad guys with a violence they can only envy.

#### But that's not the Christmas story,

nor the power revealed in it. An infant lying in the straw in Bethlehem didn't outgun anyone. He just lay there, waiting for anyone good or bad to come to him, see his helplessness, feel a tug at his or her heart strings, and then gently try to coax a smile or a word out of him.

That's still how God meets us.

Don't forget our adult ed sessions. And plan on our communal penance service on December  $18^{th}$  at 7pm. It's a great gift to give to yourself.




## Year End Charitable Giving and Tax Documentation
