# August 23, 2020 ~ Twenty-First Sunday in Ordinary Time





The only way to know God is to love God. Our minds will never fully grasp the mystery of God, but our hearts and souls can learn to love the mystery. Years ago, when life had a more innocent quality to it, we believed what we were told or witnessed, unless there was direct evidence otherwise. This was especially true if the information came from someone in authority. In a sense, we were a bit more

gullible on one hand but also more trusting on the other. The latter is an admirable quality that sadly can be eroded when we realize we have been duped. With education and technological advances, we find ourselves more skeptical and less likely to too quickly accept and believe what we see and hear.

For all of the good that social media can do, it can also easily distort reality and truth. Photoshop and a myriad other technological truths can add to, fabricate, and make even the non-existent seem real. It is amazing. How far do we allow this obviously justifiable skepticism to take us? Questioning and doubting are healthy elements of any good relationship as long as we don't allow them to turn us away from a deeper experience of love and encounter. If we cannot get our minds around something or empirically justify or prove it, we tend to declare it a hoax, untrue, or unauthentic and walk away. The very same trust that can quickly be eroded is exactly what is essential for all of our relationships, especially our relationship with God. With all things and people that make a profound claim on us, we have to trust in the absence of knowledge. Full self-investment involves plunging completely into the unknown!

Simon Peter said to Jesus, "You are the Christ, the Son of the Living God." Peter came to this knowledge, which is not "head knowledge" because of the relationship he shared with Jesus and what God was able to reveal in and through that relationship. Peter simply "knew" because of love that this is who Jesus really is. The silent exchange of love between friends, and not an intellectual exercise of the mind, brought Peter to this place. When we stop and think about it, there are many things in life that we simply know but do not completely understand. When someone sacrifices their own well-being for another, it may not make intellectual sense when examined. But it makes a world of sense when it is carried out. The vastness of reality and an encounter with incomprehensible mystery all lead us to profound silence where we simply know something to be true. Have you trusted enough to allow your relationship with God to bring you to this place or are you still too skeptical?





# **Fundamental Right and Elections**

As the election draws near, we are hearing more and more about health care, education, the war on terrorism, and other important topics. All of these are, to be sure, very important. However, the most important topic is the one that few people (particularly politicians) want to talk about: abortion.

One might ask, "But how is abortion more important than quality education?" Easy. A child cannot receive a quality education once he/she is aborted. It is certainly a noble goal to ensure that every child receives a quality education, but when one-third of children die before they reach kindergarten, we have failed in providing them with a quality education.

The same is true for other issues. Certainly children should have access to proper health care, but why is health care important? Health care is important because we value human life and seek to protect it from harm. Abortion, conversely, says that the purpose of health care is to destroy life, not to nurture it.

In short, every humanitarian goal (and there are many of them) rests on the premise of the value and protection of human life.

not mandated by law. If you have a usable old Bible, you might want to contact a religious supply store—not just Catholic—as they will sometimes take them and share them with the less fortunate.

# The following is required to be published in all parish bulletins twice annually:

Any suspected or known abuse of a minor must first be immediately reported to the Missouri Child Abuse and Neglect Hotline at 800-392-3738 or for suspected or known abuse of adults to the Missouri Adult Abuse and Neglect Hotline 800-392-0210, and may also be reported to law enforcement agencies.

All diocesan personnel are required to also report violations of The Code of Conduct for Clergy, Employees and Adult Volunteers of the Diocese, Parishes, and Schools to the Diocese Director of the Office of Child and Youth Protection at 417-866-0841 or childandyouthprotection@dioscg.org.

Concerns may be discussed with your supervisor, the Diocese Director of the Office of Child and Youth Protection, or a Victim Assistance Coordinator. Violations and concerns may also be reported using the TIPS online reporting system, accessible through the Diocese webpage, <a href="https://www.dioscg.org">www.dioscg.org</a>.

Failure to Report is a Class A Misdemeanor for a person who is required under the law to report. Filing a False Report is also a Class A Misdemeanor.

# Plan to Reopen Parish School of Religion (PSR)

The primary focus of the PSR program is to assist parents in their role as the primary religious educators of their children while supporting the emotional, spiritual, social, and physical needs of all of the children in our community of faith. To fulfill this mission, we have developed a plan to both share the Good News of Jesus and protect the health safety of our students and volunteers.

We will be returning to in-seat instruction on Sunday mornings from 9:10 to 10:15 as before. We strongly recommend both students and volunteers to wear masks while in the building. We will be practicing social distancing to the best of our ability and also reassigning classrooms to best accomplish this goal. After registration is completed room assignments will be made and parents will be informed during the Family Gathered Session on August 30th.

# Protect the health safety of students and volunteers

- A. Masks strongly recommended
- Reassign classroom to provide maximum social distancing of all classes.
- C. Cover public water fountains
  - a. Small bottles of water will be available for students.
  - b. Small snacks will also be available for students
  - c. Individual (non-communal) school supplies
  - Each student will receive their own pencil box/pencil case with individual school supplies.
- D. Promote good hygiene
  - Students will be reminded to wash their hands often.
  - Students will be reminded to cover their coughs and sneezes.
  - c. Signs will be posted in each classroom and around the hall.
  - d. Hand sanitizer will be available in each classroom for student use.
- E. Disinfecting after class.
  - Volunteers will be asked to disinfect the tables, chairs, and door handles after class.
- F. Screening for symptoms
  - Parents are asked to screen for symptoms prior to bringing their children to class.
  - An infrared (non-touch) thermometer will be available in the PSR Coordinator's office for screening if a child begins feeling poorly after class begins.
    - Student(s) will be sent to the PSR Coordinator's office.
    - Parents will be contacted for pick up.
    - iii. Student(s) will remain separated from the other students until picked up by parents

# II. Religious Education

- A. September October
  - Seated classes
  - Teachers will also utilize Google Classroom to share resources
    - Parents will need a gmail account to enroll in Google Classroom
- B. Family Gathered Sessions
  - Students will be with teachers in classrooms for part of the lesson.
  - Parents will be learning together in the Hall Gathering Area.
- C. November December
  - Family Catechesis
    - Parents are the most influential people of religious education.
    - ii. Family-Gathered Sessions 1st and 3rd Sundays of the month
    - In-home lessons on 2nd and 4th Sundays of the month
    - Students enrolled in a sacramental preparation class will meet every Sunday.

- D. January May
  - a. Family Gathered Sessions once a month
  - Students will have seated classes.

# IV. COVID-19 Response

- A. Designated Point of Contact (POC): Sandra Crockett, PSR Coordinator 417-860-6947 Email: stjoebpsr@gmail.com
- B. When a child or volunteer is told to self-quarantine
  - a. Contact the POC to notify of the situation
  - b. Complete the lessons on Google Classroom
- C. When a child or member of the child's family tests positive for COVID-19
  - Contact the POC to notify of the situation
  - Students should complete lessons on Google classroom
  - POC will notify Fr. Shoby
  - If possible exposure occurred during PSR, all families and catechist will be notified of the possible exposure by the POC
  - e. If needed, effected classes with complete assignments virtually for 2 weeks.
- D. When a volunteer or catechist tests positive for COVID-19
  - Contact the POC to notify of the situation
  - b. POC will notify Fr. Shoby
  - If no threat for possible exposure occurred during PSR
    - Class will be held with a substitute
  - d. If possible exposure occurred during PSR
    - POC will inform all families
    - ii. Instruction will be held via Google Classroom for two weeks
      - Parents will be notified via Remind as situation changes

# V. Emotional Support in case of Stay at Home Order

- A. Keep the Lines of Communication Open
  - Catechist and PSR Coordinator will utilize Remind and Facebook to share resources
  - Family Clusters
    - Each catechist will be assigned a group of 5-6 families to support during the stay at home period
    - b) Parents will receive support with religious education materials.
    - c) Virtual meetings
      - Google Meets
      - (2) Zoom meeting
      - (3) Once a week, preferably during PSR time

We hope this plan will ease some of the anxiety that we know all parents are experiencing as we try to return to school. We understand that this is, as it has been, a very fluid situation and are in continued contact with state, county, and local agencies to make sure the decisions made safeguard the health of all those in our community.

We join you, in prayer, for a resolution to this situation and appreciate your support as we navigate through these uncertain times.
