

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#### All Life Is Precious

We are all aware that 'ISIS' is a real danger to all people everywhere. They plot mass murders and kill with abandon anyone who gets in their way, beheading their captives whether they are men, women or children.

Are we any better than them? In 1973, our U.S. Supreme Court legalized abortion. Since then, more than 62 million babies in the womb have been brutally murdered here in the United Sates alone.

How in the world have we ever let this atrocity continue? As the saying goes,

'evil happens when good people do nothing.'

It is normal practice for Catholics to bless objects such as medals, statues, pictures and other religious articles. Such a pious practice sets these objects apart and point us, in a small

way, towards our Lord.

But, most of us never *record* when these objects were blessed. Nor do we keep them in any separate container marking them as such. You may wonder, what is the point of that? We've been raised to handle blessed objects reverently ever since we joined the Church. We must remember that these objects are blessed, which separates them from being an ordinary object, and should be treated with more care.

We never know exactly what happens to our blessed objects after our deaths. Suppose we die and leave no will. Suppose our estates are handled by a non-Catholic who has no idea about the sin of simony. It is then likely that these blessed items will be given to thrift stores or put in a yard sale, which will then sell them to the general public. All without knowing that that object is blessed and therefore, shouldn't be sold, but given.

We can hope that a Catholic will come along and give the item in question a good home. If there is a case where the item is purchased from either a thrift store or a yard sale, the Catholic will most likely give the benefit of the doubt and have the object blessed themselves.

But we cannot count on such a sentiment, nor should we - if we can avoid it - leave any opportunity for the devil to do his work. Especially when it comes to grave sins like simony.

Simony is the sale of Church offices, indulgences, and sacred objects. It is a serious sin, as the sale not only negates the blessing, but also incurs sacrilege. To knowingly sell a sacramental with a blessing attached to it falls under this

particular sin.

To avoid potential sacrilege, it may be prudent (especially in the case of statuary), to label the object with the date on which the item was blessed. This can be easily done by pen or marker on the bottom of the statue. If there is room, add "do not sell." In doing this, it also puts an identification on the object in case it gets lost or stolen.

Also, especially for those older folks who are working on wills, it would be prudent that the blessed objects of your home be well documented and be definitively bequeathed to a specific person or that specific instructions be left to donate them to a Catholic church. It would also be wise to add a clause in which clarifies that the blessed items MUST be given away and never sold. By law, this must be followed to the letter, so be specific.

For the purchasing side of the question—as we know that thrift stores and yard sales can turn up wonderful pieces for pretty low prices. In the case for yard sales, ask the person who is selling the item the history of the piece and specifically if it was blessed or not before buying. Chances are, they don't know themselves, but it is worth checking.

As for the question of whether it is moral or not to pick up religious articles from a thrift store because of the risk of simony, in most cases, the articles are sold cheaply, with no distinction of having being blessed or not. This latter point would be the indicator for simony. Since those items are donated, it's almost impossible to trace it, so it is not worth asking the sales clerk.

In conclusion, this information is not intended to stir up any scruples concerning the buying of religious articles. Many of us have likely purchased religious items from thrift stores in the past and have had them blessed without issue. With this new knowledge, though, we can make sure that they are not sold again.
