# PARISH PASTORAL COUNCIL ELECTION IN 2021

FATHER SUGU In the coming weeks, you will be hearing



a lot about the Parish Pastoral Council. In short, the Parish Pastoral Council is a consultative body responsible to the pastor who is the administrator of the


parish and, as such, is responsible to the Bishop. The Council assists the pastor by its vision of what the parish is called to become in its life (Canon 536, §2).

Council members perform a work of service to the parish, acting as representatives of the St. Joseph community and as consultants to the pastor/parochial administrator. The Pastoral Council should be a reflection of our parish community itself representing the voice of our varied demographics—youth & adults, men & women, moms & dads, married & single persons, life-long & more newly initiated Catholics, 4:00 pm/8:00am &10:30 am Mass attendees, parishioners from local communities-Billings, Republic, Marionville, Clever, Crane, etc.

Every three years, an election is held for three members for a three-year term. Elected members and a representative from each of the nine standing parish committees form the council, which reviews goals, objectives and priorities on a monthly basis.

An election of new members will take place in September. In August, we will seek nominations for the voting ballot. But first, today and in the coming weeks, I ask you to prayerfully consider your participation in this process by discerning who among our parish community would be good representatives to serve. Who do you believe will help our parish start afresh as outlined in the new *Norms for Parish Pastoral Councils?* Who can bring new ideas, new attitudes, and move us forward from "maintenance to mission" focusing on our spiritual growth?

## FIRST SACRAMENTS

The time of First Sacraments is a beautiful and special moment for each family and child, as for the first time they find forgiveness in the **sacrament of Reconciliation** and are fed in the **sacrament of the Eucharist**. We prepare these young members of the faith in their first two years of grade school faith formation. The **sacrament of Baptism** is a pre-requisite for receiving these sacraments.

Each fall, sacramental registration information is given to the second grade students of our grade school faith formation programs and registered parishioners with second graders at Catholic schools. NOTE: Parents of Catholic school children should participate in the PSR/Sacramental Registration day or contact the PSR Office to ensure that we have their name(s).

### EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP Recognize God In Your Ordinary Moments

Touching the Cloak of Christ

Look to today's Gospel and you'll find one of the most arresting images in all of Scripture. Christ in a crowd, everyone clamoring for his attention, pressing against him. Several feet away, is a chronically ill woman, weak and desperate for help. She knows she doesn't have a chance of getting his attention. She has no connections. She has no strength. All she can do is lift up her hand.

So that's what she does. She reaches out.

There comes a time, or maybe several times, in each of our lives when we become this woman. We're tired and we're sick. Is it with sin? With fear? With anger? It doesn't matter. Whatever it is, it's made us weak, and we feel like we've run out of options. We've looked for help and come up empty. We've consulted friends and gotten nowhere. We're lost in the crowd of life, unable to stick our heads above the pressing throng to wave for help.

And there is Christ, always passing by us. The hem of his cloak is never far from our grasp. We have no hope of a big miracle like the synagogue leader. We don't even bother asking for that. But that cloak ... we can touch that cloak. That's something we can do.

Do we do it, though? Do we have the confidence of that sick, beaten-down woman who knew so totally that healing was there for the taking? Or do we retreat back into the crowd, stumbling back home with our pain and our sinfulness? Reach out, friends. However, whatever, whenever — reach out. Christ will not fail you.

#### WHY DO WE DO THAT? Catholic Life Explained:

Sacrame

#### Question:

What do the colors of the priest's and deacon's vestments mean?

#### Answer:

In the Roman Rite of the Catholic Church, the colors of the vestments evolved over the course of several centuries and there was wide variation both in the colors used, and in the feasts and seasons associated with particular colors. It was Pope Innocent III (d. 1216) who gave us the basic outline that was later prescribed by Pope Saint Pius V in 1570. The various colors remind us of the dominant themes of a particular season or celebration.

• White: Used for the seasons of Christmas and Easter and in celebrations of the Lord, of Mary, the angels, and saints who were not martyrs. This color is also used in Masses for the dead, at baptisms, weddings and other festive celebrations.

• Red: As the color of both blood and fire, red is used on Palm Sunday and Good Friday, as well as Pentecost and special celebrations of the Holy Spirit. Moreover, red is used on the feasts and memorials of the Apostles and those saints who died as martyrs.

• Violet: The color for Advent and Lent. Violet may also be used in Masses for the dead and on All Souls Day (November 2).

• Green: A color of life and hope, green is used throughout Ordinary Time.

Other colors: Rose may be used on the Third Sunday of Advent and the Fourth Sunday of Lent, black may be used in Masses of the dead and on All Souls Day, gold or silver may be used on solemn occasions in place of white, red, or green.
