Almighty God, having decided from all eternity to make Mary the Mother of the Word Incarnate clothed her with the robe of holiness and made her soul a dwelling worthy of His Son. That complete Redemption which, from the moment of her conception, preserved our Lady from original sin, must not be considered apart from our own redemption by Christ. Occurring in Advent, this feast heralds the wonders of the Incarnation, by which Redemption came to the world. This feast was instituted by Bl. Pius IX when the dogma was defined on December 8, 1854; the solemn definition, spurred by our Lady's appearance at Lourdes, was an assertion of the constant faith of the Church and a statement of the Church's precise belief in this matter.

Mass Intentions are no longer being received at the present time due to a large backlog extending over a year. You will be informed via the bulletin when reception of Mass Intentions will resume.

Parish registration forms are available in the vestibule. Registration is encouraged as it assists the pastor to know to whom he is bound to provide pastoral care, enables him to baptize and witness marriages, as well as provide sacramental preparation for his parishioners. For this reason, and in justice and charity to the respective pastors, an individual or family should not be registered at two or more parishes, and should be attending their registered parish regularly. If address or status changes, please kindly inform the parish office.

A Final Thought

The *Rorate Caeli* Mass, celebrated here at All Saints this Saturday, December 7th at 7:00 AM as a High Mass, is a traditional Advent devotion honoring Our Lady offered just before dawn. The Mass takes its name from the opening words of the Introit, which comes to us from Isaiah 45:8:

"Rorate, caeli, desuper, et nubes plurant justum, aperiatur terra, et germinet Salvatorem." "Drop down dew, ye heavens, from above, and let the clouds rain the just: let the earth be opened and bud forth a Savior."

The *Rorate* Mass, also known as the *Golden Mass*, is lit only by candlelight. Because it is a votive Mass in the Blessed Virgin Mary's honor, white vestments are worn instead of Advent violet. In the dimly lit setting, priests and faithful prepare to honor the Light of the world, Who is soon to be born, and offer praise to God for the gift of Our Lady. As the Mass proceeds and sunrise approaches, the church becomes progressively brighter, illumined by the sun, just as our Faith is illuminated by Christ.

The readings and prayers of the Mass foretell the prophecy of the Virgin who would bear a Son called Emmanuel, and call on all to raise the gates of their hearts and their societies to let Christ the King enter: asking for the grace to receive eternal life by the merits of the Incarnation and saving Resurrection of Our Lord.

The *Rorate* Mass has a long tradition in the Church, especially in German-speaking countries. In Austria, Switzerland, and Germany, families walked in the dark of the early morning, carrying lamps and candles to the church, where Mass was celebrated and favorite Advent hymns were sung. The custom exists of singing the antiphon *Ecce, Dominus Veniet* three times at the conclusion of the Last Gospel. The priest goes to the center of the altar and intones the antiphon three times, each time progressively higher than the previous one, mirroring the practice of the three-fold *Ecce Lignum Crucis* on Good Friday and the three-fold *Alleluia* at the Easter Vigil. The text of the antiphon reads: "*Ecce Dominus veniet, et omnes sancti ejus cum eo: et erit in die illa lux magna, Alleluia. (Behold, the Lord will come, and with Him all His saints; and on that day there shall be a great light, Alleluia.)*

In Advent we live spiritually between the Annunciation and the birth of Christ. Our Blessed Mother teaches us the spirit of Advent in that, during the nine months of pregnancy, Our Lady lived a hidden life, in the spirit of silence and in intense intimacy with Christ, Whom she carried in her womb. This spirit of intimacy with God is what the faithful are called to cultivate during the season of Advent with great intensity by listening attentively to God's message and by obedience to His word.

With regards to the use of candles, what we see often in Church history is true here: candles originally had a practical purpose but over the course of time took on an added spiritual dimension and meaning, too. The symbolism of the candle matches very well with the spirt of Advent. Advent is dawn. It is still not the bright light of Christmas. Advent is a time of preparation for something exceedingly joyful that is going to happen. The Church and the soul are still struggling through the darkness toward the Light. There is longing and expectancy of Advent. The light of our candles is a symbol for our longing for the coming of our Savior whose light is already dawning.
