Today we may wonder, when we hear these readings about the coming end-times, if we should take them to heart, if we really believe that Christ still may come upon us as a "thief at night" (1 Thessalonians 5:2). Does this mean that we are to stop our long-range goalsetting, get rid of our yearly calendars and planners, or stop putting money in the college education fund? Of course not. What it does mean is that we need to change our lives, living like children of the light and illuminating the world around us with the light of the gospel. Dear Sisters and Brothers of Saint Therese Parish Community,

Thank you once again for your warm welcome at my Installation as your Pastor last weekend. There are very few things more heartening than to be made to feel welcomed in a new place that over time becomes "home". In the well travelled wisdom our brothers and sisters in AA offer us in their Big Book: "Beginnings are important, even if we have to begin over and over and over again."

Speaking of feeling welcomed and of "new beginnings", we as a Church are fast approaching the season of Advent, the four week beginning of the Church year followed by Christmas and the Epiphany. It is that "most wonderful time of the year" and after all that has happened this past year, couldn't we all use a time of hope and healing? I have seen again and again in my forty-three years as a priest that when people feel safe and wanted, welcomed and loved, no matter where they are on their life's journey, they begin to deepen and heal in amazing ways. And that's who we are as a Catholic parish community here in Montauk - a place of safety and welcome, of love and forgiveness, of hope and promise. And that is what Advent and Christmas and Epiphany are all about.

So I have been pondering how we might re-create a safe, prayerful and welcoming environment, particularly in the church and at our weekend liturgies, especially at a time when more and more people are telling me that they want to come back to church again after some time away because of personal reasons or because of Covid. How do we both socially distance and gather? How do we lift up our voices when we are asked not to sing indoors? And how do we tell the story of our parish to newcomers, or to those who think the church will fall down if they show up, if we can't have social activities until we have a vaccine?

So let's find a way with the new season of Advent and Christmastide as a perfect opportunity. With Louise Carman, our Director of Religious Education, and Kyle McCann, our Music Director, we asked a small group of parishioners to watch some online courses on liturgy and church architecture, then to meet and offer suggestions. We asked them to pay particular attention as to how the narthex of the church, our welcoming space, the place where the parish tells it's story as soon as someone enters the door, might be arranged for that purpose during the season of Advent. How someone is welcomed, how they feel when they enter that space, may make all the difference in their choice to "come home for Christmas". I also asked them to take a look at our Reconciliation Room. Is it inviting, safe, comfortable? One of our young men who is receiving Confirmation this weekend has made his service project to move the music books stored in the Reconciliation Room up to the choir loft. His grandmother is helping him. It is a huge job. So thank you to Noah and his grandma!

We also have a great carillon put in by Father Tom and some very generous parishioners. So maybe we can choose some warming Advent and Christmas carols to ring out in the village along with those of the Community Church up the hill.

Let me know what you think.

What's new from the desk of the Religious Education office...

Today we are so blessed to join with our teenagers and celebrate the Sacrament of Confirmation as a parish community. What a special time this is for all of us!

In fact it prompts me to remember my own confirmation years ago in Ireland – not so much the celebration itself unfortunately, but more of what my classmates and I had to wear...our green school uniform with yellow collared shirt, striped yellow and green tie, dark colored shoes and white knee high socks! Where was the red in all of this – the red we see today that reminds us of the tongues of fire (the Holy Spirit) that came upon the apostles in the Upper Room, empowering them to go out into the world to spread the good news through their words and through their actions.

So let us take this opportunity to be reminded of what the Sacrament of Confirmation is really about. Not the green back then or the red today but the actual *effects* of Confirmation. When we are baptized we receive sanctifying grace; the gift of God's Spirit that enables us to live and love as a child of God through His Son Jesus Christ. The Sacrament of Confirmation then seals this gift within with special graces that help empower and strengthen us to put our faith into words and actions in our everyday lives. And so these special graces, i.e. the gifts of the Holy Spirit, help us to answer God's call to holiness. It is up to us however as individuals to *open up* these gifts and use them!

We are also reminded that living in a society that can pose great challenges, particularly for teenagers and young adults, we need to remember that it is so important to keep God close to our hearts and to know that we can always trust in Him to guide us <u>no matter what</u>.

Freedom of Religious Expression in the Founding of America

In November, Americans prepare for the holidays and think about how our country came to be and why it is unique among all the nations of the world.

Freedom of religious expression is a key to understanding early American history and the founding of our nation. The British colonies that eventually formed the United States of America were settled in the 17th century by men & women who, in the face of European persecution, refused to compromise passionately held religious convictions and fled Europe. Although some settlers came for secular motives, the great majority left Europe to worship God in the way they believed to be correct. They enthusiastically supported the efforts of their leaders to create "a city on a hill" or a "holy experiment."

In the founding documents, our founders quoted thousands of Bible scriptures, opened and closed sessions with prayer to God, and openly stated that they used the Ten Commandments in writing the laws. "There are more than 4,500 recorded, public quotes by our Founding Fathers about the Bible, God, and the importance of ethics based on Christian principles," wrote author Randall Niles.(1)"History is clear: Judeo-Christian ethics are at the foundation of the United States of America. Morality was never seen as relative - it was always based on Natural Law and the authority of Scripture."(2)

Happening Now: 1776 Commission Established to Restore Patriotic Education

On Nov. 2, 2020, Pres. Trump signed an Executive Order to form the 1776 Commission with the goal "to better enable a rising generation to understand the history and principles of the founding of the United States in 1776, and, through this, form a more perfect Union..." The order further states: "The formation of a republic around these principles (Laws of Nature & Nature's God) marked a clear departure from previous forms of government, securing rights through a form of government that derives its legitimate power from the consent of the governed.

Throughout its national life, our Republic's exploration of the full meaning of these principles has led it through the ratification of a Constitution, civil war, abolition of slavery, Reconstruction, and a series of domestic crises and world conflicts. Those events establish a clear historical record of an exceptional Nation dedicated to the ideas and ideals of its founding."

"Against this history, in recent years a series of polemics grounded in poor scholarship has vilified our Founders and our founding. Despite the virtues and accomplishments of this Nation, many students are now taught in school to hate our own country, and to believe that the men and women who built it were not heroes, but rather villains. This radicalized view of American history lacks perspective, obscures virtues, twists motives, ignores or distorts facts, and magnifies flaws, resulting in the truth being concealed and history disfigured."
