Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord

HOLY WEEK

For the Palm Sunday Gospel, we return to the Gospel according to Mark. The account of the Passion takes up nearly one-third of Mark's entire Gospel and, of all the evangelists, he is the one who presents the details most graphically. He depicts the humanity of Jesus most intensely, describing his sufferings thoroughly. Mark portrays Jesus as a complete fulfillment of the "Suffering Servant" of Isaiah, the obedient, humble slave dying on a cross of whom Paul speaks in Philippians. But it is important to remember that we call this "Holy Week" and not "sad week" or "suffering week," for each of the readings today, even the lamentations of the psalm, end in the promise of the strength and hope that is granted by God to those who faithfully give of themselves in love. As we enter into this week through these readings, we must reflect deeply on the sufferings of Jesus, but still be confident in the joy of risen, eternal life that awaits all of us who faithfully walk with him through these days.

Dear Sisters and Brothers of Saint Therese Parish,

I have missed writing these bulletin letters to you while we were in quarantine these last couple of weeks. But here we are back again and I hope you are all well. This year has certainly been full of ups and downs, and we are not out of the woods of the pandemic yet. As far as the church and our services go, we will continue to do everything we can to keep things simple, safe and prayerful. Hopefully we will soon all be fully vaccinated and able to greet one another in peace.

Next Sunday is Palm Sunday and the beginning of Holy Week. Of course this holiest of weeks in the church calendar is always special, but perhaps more so this year because of all that we have been through individually and as a community. There are some restrictions on what we can do liturgically during these days - no palms, washing of feet, live outdoor Passion, or Easter sunrise service - but we also have the wonderful opportunity for simple, shortened services this week that truly reflect both our pain and our hope. I encourage you to enter as fully as you can, in whatever way you are able.

On Palm Sunday we will have four Masses - two Vigil Masses on Saturday evening, (as usual one in English and one in Spanish), and two Sunday Masses in English, one at 8:30 and the other at 10:30. In place of palms we will be offering each person a beautiful pocket cross to carry with them during Holy Week and beyond.

On Holy Thursday the Mass of the Lord's Supper will be offered at 7 P.M. with a very special "washing of the feet". We have invited 12 "essential workers" who have "given their lives for their friends" to stand barefoot in the sanctuary while we the assembled community, with outstretched arms, bless their feet. These will include representatives of police, fire, medical, school, grocery, delivery, ambulance workers and others who have served us unselfishly throughout this pandemic.

On Good Friday we will gather in the church at 3 P.M. to commemorate the Lord's Passion with prayers of intercession, a reading of the Passion from the Gospel, veneration of the Cross and Holy Communion.

The Easter Vigil will begin at 8 P.M. on Holy Saturday evening with a lighting of the new fire and the new Paschal Candle; then our own individually held candles in the darkness of the church. We will renew our own baptismal commitment with the newly blessed Easter water with two members of our Saint Therese faith community receiving Confirmation. All the lights of the church will then be lit and the bells inside and out will ring out that Christ is Risen as we continue with our Mass.

We are planning that each of these services will last only an hour (perhaps the Vigil slightly more because of the lighting of the fire) and will include both Spanish and English languages. Easter morning Masses will be at 8:30 and 10:30.

Let us look forward in hope as together we celebrate new life in Christ.



Abstinence and Fasting

All Catholics who have reached their fourteenth year are bound to abstain entirely from meat/ poultry on Ash Wednesday and all the Fridays of Lent. All Catholics between the age of eighteen and fifty-nine inclusive are also bound to observe the law of fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. This means limiting yourself to a single full meal and avoiding food between meals. Two other light meals, which together do not equal a full meal may be taken during the day. Those whose work or health would be impaired are excused from fast and abstinence. Individual conscience should decide proper cause for excuse. A more serious reason is required to excuse oneself from Ash Wednesday and Good Friday fast and abstinence.

Many Churches Ease Restrictions for Holy Week & Easter 2021

Easter, 2020, found most churches in America unconstitutionally closed or restricted for in-person worship. Limiting, or outright prohibiting, in-person religious services was one of the most controversial directives that states made in 2020 in an attempt to slow the coronavirus pandemic. Ten states prohibited church gatherings altogether. Most states implemented guidelines with various levels of restrictions, and 15 states allowed religious gatherings to continue without any limits.

Churchgoers in several of these states fought against orders banning religious services and, in each case, achieved some level of success modifying the restrictions. CA Pastor Tim Thompson said, "The whole idea of separation of church and state is that the state can't run the church. The state can't tell the church what to do." ⁽¹⁾

"In the long history of the world, only a few generations have been granted the role of defending freedom in its hour of maximum danger. I do not shrink from this responsibility - I welcome it." President John F. Kennedy

As we begin Holy Week, 2021, and after many prayerful protests and court cases, the most onerous restrictions have been eased but not altogether rescinded. Each state has developed its own form of control. In Maine, Bishop Robert Deeley is not satisfied with the recently expanded gathering limits to 50 people. He said, "I think that not giving more latitude to people to be able to exercise their Constitutional right to worship is harming them." ⁽²⁾

The U.S. Supreme Court has struck down restrictions on some religious gatherings in New York and in California, the Court recently granted an appeal from a church that challenged the states restrictions on church services, singing and chanting.

Justice Neil Gorsuch wrote in the most recent case: "Government actors have been moving the goalposts on pandemic-related sacrifices for months, adopting new benchmarks that always seem to put restoration of liberty just around the corner." ⁽³⁾

Happening Now: Third-grader Forced to Remove "Jesus Loves Me" Mask

"Public schools have a duty to respect the free expression of students that the First Amendment guarantees to them," said Alliance Defending Freedom (ADF) attorney in a lawsuit defending a Mississippi 9-year-old ordered to remove her mask. ⁽⁴⁾ "Other students within the school district have freely worn masks with logos of local sports teams or even the words 'Black Lives Matter.' This student deserves an equal opportunity to peacefully express her beliefs." ⁽⁵⁾
