Bishop Hying has launched an initiative across the diocese that "is intended to light a fire within us that will not only change what we do but who we are." Go Make Disciples calls each of us to commit to four basic practices guaranteed to help us grow in our personal holiness:

1. Prioritize Sunday as the Lord's Day.
2. Commit to spending at least 15 minutes per day in prayer, ideally with the Sacred Scriptures.
3. Make voluntary practices of self-denial a regular part of our daily lives, beginning with at least the mandatory observance of Fridays as penitential days throughout the year.
4. Develop or strengthen a habit of going to confession regularly, ideally at least once per month.

**How is our parish responding to Bishop Hying's call?** We have gathered a team of eight parishioners who have been meeting monthly with Msgr. Larry and Ann O'Leary. This team ranges in age from 15 to 73. They come from Brodhead, Monticello, and Monroe. Our team includes men and women, bilingual members, parents of young children (including some in our parish school), and retired members. Some are familiar volunteers in our parish, and some have newly arrived from other parishes. This team is charged with growing in personal holiness for a time, and then crafting a plan to renew the call to discipleship for our entire parish. Please pray for this team as they grow and sacrifice together! Our school staff, parish staff, and members of our finance and pastoral councils have also been called to study together and pray together to become even more intentional disciples of Jesus in their work and personal commitments.

# FAITH FORMATION

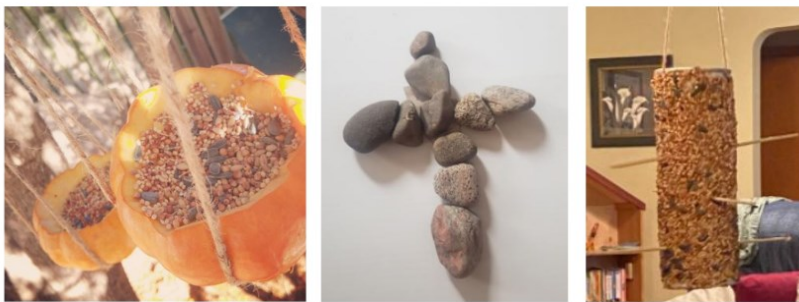


This year, our theme is Micah 6:8. Through the monthly activities, we want the kids to continue to reflect on these three questions:  
How can you... Act with justice? Love tenderly? Walk humbly?



**PRAYER** "A gift of grace & a determined response on our part."

Catechism of the Catholic Church, CCC 2558:  
"Great is the mystery of the faith!" The Church professes this mystery in the Apostles' Creed (Part One) and celebrates it in the sacramental liturgy (Part Two), so that the life of the faithful may be conformed to Christ in the Holy Spirit to the glory of God the Father (Part Three). This mystery, then, requires that the faithful believe in it, that they celebrate it, and that they live from it in a vital and personal relationship with the living and true God. This relationship is prayer.



Our program has been different this year, but it's been so fruitful. The Church teaches that parents are the primary catechists for their children. This year, we are holding that as the standard. Our Faith Formation program consists of packets we prepare for them, consisting of crafts, activities, games, video links, and more each month. Parents lead their own children through these activities as families are encouraged to participate in as much as they can. Each month, they can fill out an accountability form and turn it in to get points. At the end of the year, those points can be redeemed for fun prizes. It's been beautiful to see how God is moving in the lives of our families.

For the month of September, we focused on the theme of prayer. One of the activities the families were asked to do was to make a special prayer space in their homes. They were each given a candle that they could 'light' while enjoying time in prayer with God.



For the month of October, our theme was the saints! We learned that they are great leaders and examples to us on how to act justly, love tenderly, and walk humbly. One of the activities to celebrate Saint Francis was to use the birdseed we included in the packets and make a bird feeder. This month, our families got to make their own Litany of Saints prayer and to make saint posters to put in their prayer space. Families were encouraged to head to a pumpkin patch and celebrate St. Rose of Lima, who is the patron saint of gardeners. Many kids shared their pumpkins on our monthly Zoom chat.

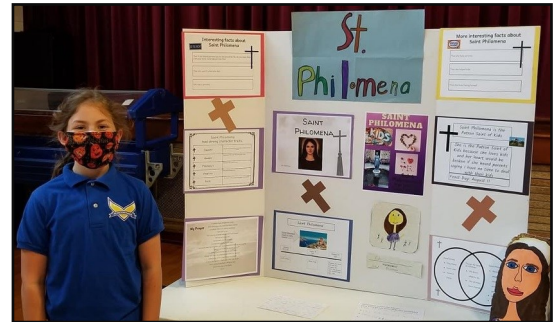

## Providing to the "Mass"es with Livestream Services

When an emergency order was declared to prohibit in-person Mass services last March, we were forced to think fast on our feet and figure out a way to bring Mass into the homes of our parishioners. Using an iPhone and a \$25 microphone, Fr. Tim Mergen started up our first series of daily Mass livestream services via Facebook, and using their professional equipment, the Tomasiewicz family provided our Sunday Masses. The response from those watching was so great that, by June, we were able to collect enough donations to purchase a professional streaming camera that tied directly into our sound system and allowed us to bring all of our in-church services to the online world. We now have a YouTube channel (with over 270 subscribers!) that features livestream video of both our daily and weekend Masses and a full library of past services and talks. It has been so rewarding to hear from both parishioners at home and people from across the country that enjoy our Mass.

Parishioner Joe Tomasiewicz continues to operate the now permanent livestream camera on Sunday mornings. We are looking for a few others that would like to help. # 2020-21 PARISH ANNUAL FISCAL REPORT

St. Clare of Assisi Parish has a long tradition of fiscal strength and responsibility. It is no surprise to us that, even in the face of a global pandemic that shut down our church services and

school, we continued at offertory levels that mirrored our prior year. To end the year 2019-20 fiscal year at only 1% below prior year levels is simply awesome!

Considering that our current fiscal year will continue to see uncertain times for many families and businesses within our parish, we are asking that our members maintain their current giving levels. We will not be asking for an increase in offertory this year, and we will be maintaining or cutting expenses to offset any offertory increase that would normally be requested. Please continue to support our parish by your presence, your service, and your generosity.

\*\*Net income Budgeted for 2020-21 includes the Paycheck Protection Loan forgiveness from the SBA, a temporary (non-operational) income of \$230,000. During shutdown this past year, we funded employee salaries with this loan.

# A LETTER FROM FR. TIM

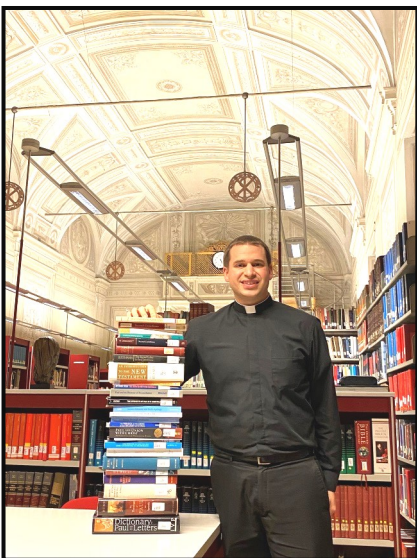
Dear St. Clare of Assisi Parishioners,

Greetings from the Eternal City! This note finds me healthy and doing well amid a beautiful fall Roman day! After finishing up last spring at the Pontifical North American College (the American Seminary in Rome) it has been great to move across town near the Trevi Fountain to the Casa Santa Maria which is the house for American priests who are asked by their Bishops to get advanced degrees in service of the Church. The “Casa” as it is usually called features small individual apartments within a community living facility that features a shared dining room, a spacious library, two beautiful courtyards, and several small Chapels for each priest to offer Mass. This year there are 45 other priests from all across the United States (and even a few from Australia) that live here so it truly is a great place to grow and learn from my brother priests what it means to live as a priest of Jesus Christ.

At this point I am just under halfway through the first semester (unlike the U.S. schedule the semester does not end until the beginning of February). It is a busier semester than usual with 8 full in person classes alongside initial research to prepare and defend a lengthy academic thesis next spring. My research proposal was just approved to write about the sufferings of St. Paul in the Letters to the Corinthians. Since the Cross is our only path to salvation and a part of each and every one of our lives, I am confident this research topic will be fruitful on many levels. Certainly, this year the cross struck Italy particularly hard and the people here are on edge with Covid-19 cases much higher than the spring (6,500 cases/day in March 2020 compared to 37,000+ cases/day and rising as I write) and greatly affecting the livelihoods of many in a largely tourist run economy. While many national restrictions are in place, my school has remained opened, our house has remained healthy, and I have even been able to regularly travel to northern Italy to offer Mass on various weekends for families stationed at the U.S. Air Force base in Aviano, Italy. The priests I live with are men of great faith and we have all entrusted ourselves to Our Lady for safety and protection this year, for which she has not disappointed.

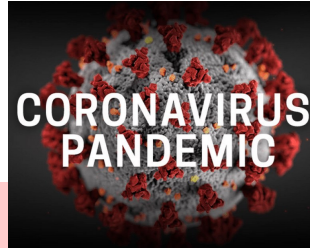
I will remain here over the Christmas season and plan to return to the U.S. at the end of June 2021. Though I am often occupied with my academic studies and unable to keep in touch as often I as I would like, I assure you that you are all thought of and prayed for daily from the heart of the Church in Rome.

## UNDERSTANDING BIAS AMIDST THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC

Many of us are frustrated in our attempt to become amateur public health officials or epidemiologists in order to make sense of the news avalanche related to Covid-19. We keep looking for definitive answers to help us decide if we can safely return to church, work, school, etc. The virus has taught us that few answers are definitive, and most answers will change as scientists continue to learn more.



Understanding how bias plays a part in the information that we seek when making decisions. Narinder Kapur, a neuropsychologist, explains some bias types:

- **Confirmation bias**- the tendency to search for, interpret, favor, and recall information in a way that confirms or supports one's prior beliefs or values while ignoring other, non-supportive data.
- **Common practice bias**- reasoning that because something is common, it is also valid.
- **Loss aversion bias**- the pain of suffering a loss is outweighed by an equivalent gain.
- **Framing bias**- reactions to information may depend on how the data is presented (highlighting its benefits vs. risks).

Practice these steps when reading/listening to information and before sharing:

1. Take a deep breath and acknowledge triggered emotions.
2. Recognize and reflect on your bias.
3. Confirm the information by checking the credentials of the author and corroborate evidence by utilizing primary resources such as the CDC, local and state health departments, and medical/scientific journals.
4. Be wary of screenshots, viral memes, cut-and-pasted text and numbers in relation to context.

St. Clare of Assisi is confident that the safety protocols we have in place to minimize health risks under the guidance of the Madison Diocese, Green County Health Department and CDC are based on mitigated bias and reliable primary sources.





Use this Advent calendar to prepare yourself for the celebration of the birth of Jesus. “Pray” includes a suggested focus for your personal prayer that day. “Action” items are ideas for Advent and can be done on any day during Advent. We hope you enjoy getting in the true spirit of Christmas!!

This year, try waiting to fully decorate your tree until Christmas Eve. Instead, let your bare tree be an “Advent Tree,” a symbol of our waiting for the coming of Christ. This doesn’t mean you have to leave the tree completely bare. You can put on a single string of lights during the first week of Advent, then add another string of lights every Sunday until Christmas. Some families also add one decoration per day during Advent. Other families hang Jesse Tree ornaments on their Advent Tree.

## 1 CLEANING

The church (pews in the sanctuary and chairs in the gathering space) is sanitized, emphasizing high-touch surfaces, after every Mass.

## 2 LIMITING

We are limiting the capacity of the church to 25%.  
We limit the seating by taping off every other pew.  
We are limiting the singing to the cantor only.  
We have limited entry to only the south and west doors.

## ACCESS 3

You have access to the church to pray from 6:30am - 4:30 or 6 pm daily.  
You have access to weekend and daily Mass.  
Even if you are high-risk or feel sick, we provide access to Mass via the livestream. We provide access to the bulletin via a weekly email.  
Even if the church itself is full, chairs are set up in the gathering space along with a TV and sound system for participation in the Mass.

## 4 REMOVAL

The holy water has been removed.  
The missalettes/hymnals have been removed. (They are available for purchase if you would like to keep one to bring to Mass or to use during the livestream.)

## ENCOURAGE 5

We encourage using hand sanitizer, staying home if you are sick or high-risk, receiving Communion on the hand, social distancing, arriving early for Mass, not gathering/socializing after Mass, and notifying the parish if you test positive and were at Mass recently.

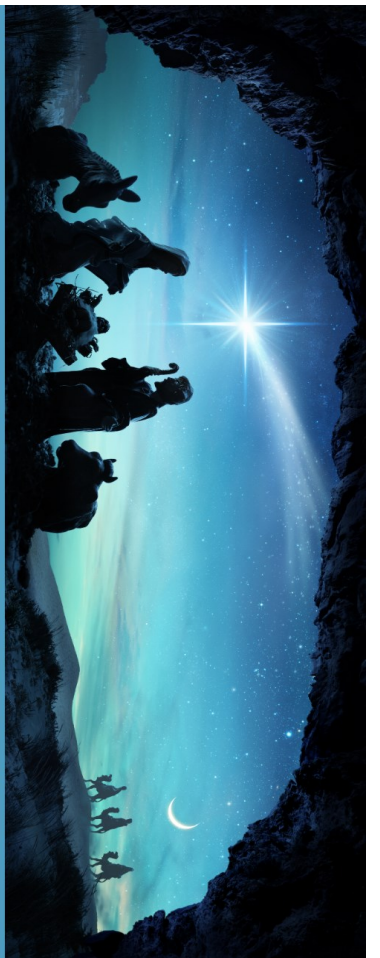
