CATECHESIS ON THE MASS • CONCLUDING RITES

Our catechesis on the Mass has come to its end, and wraps up with the end of this calendar year! I hope you've learned something about "why we do what we do," when it comes to the liturgy of the Church, the greatest prayer humanity can offer in this life!

When the distribution of Communion is over, the priest, a deacon, or an instituted acolyte purifies the vessels. While the purification takes place, a priest prays quietly: "What has passed our lips as food, O Lord, may we possess in purity of heart, that what has been given to us in time may be our healing for eternity." Such incredibly beautiful words! (It took me forever to commit it to memory). These words have virtually remained unchanged since the sixth century.

When the distribution of Communion is over, if appropriate, the priest and faithful pray quietly for some time. If desired, a psalm or other canticle of praise or a hymn may also be sung by the whole congregation (GIRM 88). In general, periods of silence for the entire assembly are fresh additions to the Mass. At the beginning of Mass, after the priest says, "Let us pray," before the Gospel acclamation, after the homily, and after the distribution of Holy Communion, the priest, together with the assembly, is to observe moments of sacred silence: to collect our thoughts and intentions before the Collect (Opening Prayer), to reflect on the readings and psalm proclaimed (as well as set them apart from the Gospel), to reflect on what was offered in the homily, and to offer praise and thanksgiving for the gift of the Eucharist after all have received. "I will come to you in the silence." The observation of sacred silence is just as integral to the Mass as are our strong responses and singing.

Then, standing at the altar or at the chair and facing the people, with hands joined, the priest says: "Let us pray." All pray in silence with the priest for a while, unless silence has just been observed. Then, the priest, with hands extended, says the Prayer after Communion, at the end of which the people acclaim: "Amen." The Prayer after Communion concludes the Communion Rite, summing up its purpose in a single prayer to God. In centuries before the Second Vatican Council, it was customary to use more than one Prayer after Communion; for example, one for the saint's day and one for the season. But the revised Missal limits this to just one prayer, which gives clearer focus and direction to the Communion Rite.

THE CONCLUDING RITES

If they are necessary, any brief announcements to the people follow here. Once the Communion Rite concludes, and just preceding the final blessing and dismissal, announcements for the sake of the community may be made. These help the people

know how to live out the Gospel in the coming week. Logically, a community gathered regularly always needs announcements. People need to know where and when to meet the next time, and to exchange information pertinent to their upcoming activities. In modern times a custom developed for making the announcements part of the homily, but by assigning them at a certain time, the Order of Mass expresses its preference that they not interrupt the flow of the liturgy, but stand at the head of the

dismissal, suggesting purposes for sending the assembly into the

world.

Then the priest, extending his hands, greets the people, saying, "The Lord be with you." They reply, "And with your spirit." He joins his hands again and then immediately placing his left hand against his chest, raises his right and adds, "May almighty God bless you," and, as he makes the Sign of the Cross over the people, continues, "the Father, and the Son, and the Holy Spirit." All reply, "Amen." On certain days the blessing may be amplified with a Solemn Blessing, a three-fold prayer in the third person ("May almighty God ...") to which the people answer "Amen" after each part. If a deacon is present he instructs the assembly, "Bow down for the blessing." Then the deacon, or the priest himself, with hands joined and facing the people says one of four options for the Dismissal: "Go forth, the Mass is ended," or, "Go and announce the Gospel of the Lord," or, "Go in peace, glorifying the Lord by your life," or, "Go in peace." the people reply: "Thanks be to God." These four options are also used when the Liturgy of the Hours is prayed publicly. This final dialogue of the Mass is begun by the deacon, if present, who sends the people forth from the Eucharist into the world. During the Mass the deacon directs the people to perform certain actions: now he invites them to the kind of service he himself will offer the Church in the week to come. Double "Alleluias" conclude the dismissal throughout the Octave of Easter and on the solemnity of Pentecost.

Then the priest (and deacon) venerates the altar as usual with a kiss, as at the beginning. After making a profound bow with the ministers, he withdraws. It has become customary to sing a closing hymn or song. However, the GIRM and the Order of Mass never mention it. As with the kiss of the altar, however, it creates a balance with the actions at the beginning of the Mass.

If any liturgical action follows immediately, the rites of dismissal are omitted. In the instances when Mass is followed by another rite, the elements of the dismissal are deferred until the entire celebration is complete. This happens commonly at a funeral Mass. Following the Prayer after Communion, the liturgy continues with the Final Commendation, and subsequent burial. The dismissal, then, takes place at the cemetery.

Now, if "Mass" ever comes up as a category on **Jeopardy!** you're all set!


