

## **Dear Parishioners-**

"Trust the past to God's mercy, the present to God's love and the future to God's PASTOR providence." St. Augustine

This Friday, August 28th is the celebration of the Feast of St. Augustine. It gives me a reason to probe a bit deeper the mind and heart of our parish patron as we honor his robust legacy of faith.

Confessions is arguably St. Augustine's most famous and important work. As Augustine wrote therein, "Nothing is closer to God's ears than a contrite heart and a life of faith" (Confessions, Book 2, 3:5, 67). Though an unvoiced longing for Truth led Augustine (354-430) eventually to the Scriptures, he put them aside because of their "unpolished" style and turned instead to the doctrine of Manicheanism. This is a dualistic religious system which combines Gnostic Christianity, Buddhism, Zoroastrianism and various other elements. Augustine adhered to this doctrine which maintained that reason alone could free people from darkness and error. This false form of belief expressed a revulsion for the material world and became the rationale ultra-ascetic practices purported to lead practitioners to spiritual awareness.

Augustine was involved with the Manichees for nearly 10 years. Their influence on him lingered until the episode that marked his conversion. Unknown to Augustine, St. Ambrose had become Bishop of Milan in 373. While Augustine's life was a cauldron of mental, emotional and spiritual turmoil, Ambrose's was a calming presence though a prism of clarity. Their meeting, arranged by his mother St. Monica, began to dispel the doubts Augustine felt. "And when I opened my heart to receive the eloquence with which he spoke, there likewise entered, although only by degrees, the truths that he spoke" (Confessions, Book 5, 4:24, 131).

So inspiring was the personal life and powerful preaching of Ambrose on Augustine that he began to read the Bible, no longer with the intention to argue against it, but with a disposition of humble submission to the wisdom of the word. With each passing day, Augustine became more convinced that he ought to enter the Church as a catechumen, that is as one preparing to receive the

Sacraments of Initiation. At the age of 32, Augustine was baptized by Bishop Ambrose in Milan. This pivotal event would mark a new beginning in his spiritual life that continues to inspire and influence others through his writings and powerful witness of faith.

## HIS WORD TODAY by Rev. William J. Reilly

"Jesus went into the region of Caesarea Philippi and he asked his disciples, 'Who do people say that the Son of Man is?' They replied, 'Some say John the Baptist, others Elijah, still others Jeremiah or one of the prophets.' He said to them, 'But who do you say that I am?' Simon Peter said in reply, 'You are the Christ, the Son of the living God.' Jesus said to him in reply, 'Blessed are you son of John...'"

We are no different, because we are disciples of the Lord. He asks us the same question, but I wonder if we answer as did Peter, or as the disciples responded. There are countless ways we use to describe someone. We can speak of size, talent, profession, family. All might be true. But it's more important to know the person, rather than know about the person. Peter's response is quite clear and to the point. Jesus is the Christ, the Messiah, the Son of God. We have accepted His invitation to consider what reply is most fitting for me to describe Jesus. We echo Peter's response, He is not just the Savior of all humankind,



but my personal Savior as well. If that is true for me, Jesus affirms me as He did Peter and entrusts to me my responsibility in the church, missionary discipleship.
