^Ahe Gospel reading today takes place at the well. When you live in the desert, water

lacksquare is experienced as essential for life. It's simple, no water equals no life. The well is also the meeting place. It is the place of encounter and engagement. Jesus meets the woman at the well. The woman at the well comes to draw water. Yet when she leaves, she leaves behind her water jar for she has found something more than water, more life giving, she has found the source of life - The people when they come to Jesus at the well - tell the woman after they hear Him speak - "No longer does our faith depend on your story. We have heard for ourselves and we know they this is really the Savior of the World!" Jesus is the meeting place for Christians - He has established the New Covenant in His Body and His Blood. Take this and eat it. This is my Body. Drink of this all of you. This is my Blood of the new covenant for the remission of sins. Do this in memory of me. Jesus is the source of faith. He opens up for us and is the gift of Divine Life. It is around this that our faith, our worship, our community, our identity is made as Christians. The communion hymn for Mid-Pentecost on Wednesday says: He who eats My flesh and drinks My blood live in Me and I live in him. says the Lord. Alleluia! Our Communion hymn for today says: Receive the Body of Christ! Drink the source of immortality. Alleluia! Our Liturgy, our worship identifies Jesus as the well, the source of immortal life, the source of divine life. Jesus is the one around whom we gather and offer ourselves with Him. Jesus is the one who leads us and teaches us, who meets us in the Divine Liturgy. Jesus is our source of faith and hope. At every Eucharist we receive Him into our lives. At every Eucharist we offer ourselves to Him as we receive our Lord and our Savior. At every Eucharist we are united to Christ and one another. The Eucharist is the source of immortality!

oday's reading is rich in meaning; one way of understanding it is as a demonstration of the truth of a verse that we read in the past: 'God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but that the world might be saved through him" (3:17). The Samaritan woman would have been a good candidate for condemnation, if Jesus had wanted to go around condemning people. Being a Samaritan, she was a heretic. She had been divorced five times and was now living with a man. She might have been lazy as well: noon is a little late to be getting the day's water (verses 6-7). Jesus could certainly have found plenty to berate her about. Instead Jesus struck up a friendly conversation with her, and offered to give her something. She was thirsty for ordinary water; Jesus told her about a source of water welling up to eternal life. He was that source, and he took the initiative to enter into her life. Jesus neither approved of her multiple partners nor thought that Samaritan beliefs were just as valid as Jewish beliefs. This woman had done nothing to merit what Jesus offered her. But he offered it anyway, and offered it before pointing out her sins and mistakes. Jesus treats us the same. There are things in our lives that he wants changed, but his first word to us is an offer of eternal life. He wants to slake our thirst with a spring that will never ran dry. Picture yourself coming to this well and meeting Jesus. What words would he speak to you? What invitation would he give to you? Lord Jesus, you are the inexhaustible spring of water that can satisfy all my thirsts. Thank you for entering into my life and inviting me to share your life.

The newly awakened faith of the Samaritan woman stirred the interest and faith of others. Soon the whole community 📕 was awakened to faith in Christ. This is our challenge: to be in love, to be on fire with the love of God and one another, especially those who need to meet Christ in their lives - the unchurched and the alienated, "To reveal Jesus Christ and His Gospel to those who do not know them has been, ever since the morning of Pentecost, the fundamental program which the Church has taken on as received from her Founder" (Evangelization in the Modern World #51).


The Samaritan Woman

The Fourth Gospel, attributed to Saint John the Evangelist, is used exclusively from Easter until Pentecost for the Sunday readings. The first chapter of John's Gospel is the proclamation used for the Divine Liturgy on Easter itself. This week, we are reminded of the story of Christ's encounter with the Samaritan woman at the well of Jacob, and thereby Christ's fulfillment of the Old Testament. In one of the many unique stories of the Fourth Gospel not found in the Synoptics (Matthew, Mark or Luke), Jesus reveals himself as Messiah to this woman of Samaria and talks with her about the "water that I will give will become ... a spring of water gushing up to eternal life."

In the early days of His ministry, Jesus travels back and forth between Galilee and Jerusalem, and must pass through Samaria. The Samaritans were outcast Jews because they were not subject to the Babylonian exile of the Israelites from other provinces. Therefore, when Jesus talks with this Samaritan woman, His disciples are surprised and in shock that He would carry on a conversation with a woman at the well, let alone a Samaritan. But as the story is explained, the woman's testimony about Jesus spreads through the nearby town, and because of her many come to hear His teachings. After hearing His word, they come to believe in Him, and proclaim Him "the Savior of the world." (Jn 4:42)

With water as the focal point of this encounter, we are once again reminded of our Baptism, and that Christ's Baptism is that of "eternal life" through "living water."
