

With Me Every Day May I begin each day with grateful thoughts of You. May I be ever grateful for all that You do for me ... for guidance each and every day, protection strong and true, lifting me up in Your great love in all I say and do. Your love is like a river flowing through my heart, as I awake each morning, You're with me from the start.

The Man Born Blind It took a lot of courage for a young blind man to stand up against great odds. Even his parents were afraid to speak out. They excused themselves by saying: "He is of age. Let him speak for himself." But he was intelligent as well as courageous. He outwitted the crafty and clever Pharisees. "Well, this is news!" he said. "You do not know where He comes from, yet He opened my eyes it is unheard of that anyone ever gave sight to a person blind from birth, if this man in today's world it takes real courage and deep faith to be loyal to God. We live in very lax times. Too many people, youth and adults, want to be "with it." They go along with a group or gang because they lack the courage to be different. They find it hard to defend Jesus and His teachings to an unbelieving generation. It takes courage to say: "I'm different. I have certain standards. I think for myself. I won't follow like a meek lamb

I won't follow like a meek lamb led to the slaughter. I want to be me! At one time, people painted over beautiful wooden objects.... furniture, doors, fireplace ornaments, because it was the "style." With the passing of years they realized their mistake and removed the layers of paint to uncover the real beauty of the wood grain. People often do this to themselves. Sometimes an intelligent high school student will hide his superior scholastic talents by saying: "I don't want the gang to think I'm a brain." Others go along with the gang and conform to low standards of behavior. Many adults also lack the courage to be different. Because "others do it," they follow like sheep. As Christians, we must be different. God gave us definite rules and laws. Do we have the courage to keep them and stand up for Christ? Can we do less than the today's Gospel.

Memorial Day, May 27th Memorial Day was originally known as Decoration Day. Many people still designate it as such. It was a time set aside to honor the nation's Civil War dead by decorating their graves. It was first celebrated on May 30, 1868, to commemorate them after General John A. Logan of the Grand Army of the Republic made a proclamation on May 5 in General Order No. 11 that: "The 30th of May 1868 is designated for the purpose of strewing with flowers, or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country during the late rebellion, and whose bodies now lie in almost every city, village, and hamlet churchyard in the land. In this observance, no form of ceremony is prescribed, but posts and comrades will in their own way arrange such fitting services and testimonials of respect as circumstances may permit." During the first May 30, 1868 celebration of Decoration Day, General James Garfield made a speech at Arlington National Cemetery, after which 5,000 participants helped to decorate the graves of more than 20,000 Union and Confederate soldiers who were buried in the cemetery. Several towns throughout America claim to be the first to decorate the graves, which gave inspiration for the official proclamation. But in 1966, the federal government, under the direction of President Lyndon Johnson, declared Waterloo, NY the official birthplace of Memorial Day, because the town had on May 5, 1866 made Memorial Day an annual community-wide event, closing businesses and planned a special program so that people would be encouraged to decorate the graves. After World War I, the observance was expanded to include all those who had died in all of America's Wars. In 1971, it was declared a national holiday by Congress, which was to be celebrated the last Monday in May. It differs from Veteran's Day, which is observed on November 11, which honors all veterans - living and dead.

Feast of the Ascension of Our Lord, Thursday, May 30th Jesus did not live with his disciples after his resurrection as he had before his death. Filled with the glory of his divinity, he appeared at different times and places to his people, assuring them that it was he, truly alive in his risen and glorified body. To them he presented himself alive after his passion by many proofs, appearing to them during forty days, and speaking of the Kingdom of God (Acts 1:3). On the fortieth day, Jesus ascended into heaven to be glorified on the right hand of God (Acts 1:9-11).



A Link to Baptism

The cure of the blind man also symbolizes mankind's means for its recovery from its blindness. It symbolizes the Sacrament of Baptism. Baptism is called holy enlightenment. Those who have been recently baptized are called the newly enlightened. This gospel from Saint John was read in the ancient Church on Holy Saturday when Catechumens were baptized. As this man is cured of his blindness when he washes in the waters of the pool of Siloam, as Jesus tells him to do, so are we brought out of darkness into a new life when we are baptized as Christ instructed us to be. Jesus restores His creation, mankind, with the potential to become what it was meant to be before the fall of Adam.

We also hear in the reading that after this man was cured many of those who knew him before did not recognize him. He is still the same man

but something has significantly changed about him. He is no longer blind. So when we are illuminated we are also new persons, though our outward appearance might be the same. To symbolize this newness a white garment is put on us to show the purity with which we start this new existence. We must, however, become different and unrecognizable in our inward and outward actions also. We must manifest our new existence to those around us through these actions. We must radiate this new found light to others by the way we live our lives. We must say to the world, "I am he who was blind but now my eyes are opened." Credit must be given to Him who has cured us of our darkness by living our lives according to the lessons of the illumination we have received and the continued guidance we get with the reception of the Holy Spirit.
