**REFLECTION OF THIS WEEK'S READING**—Who did you come to see? A version of this question is posed by Jesus many times in the Gospels. He asks it of Andrew and John when they begin to follow him. He asks it of Mary Magdalene in the garden of the resurrection. He asks it in today's Gospel. "What did you go out to the desert to see?" There is something innately human about "seeing." Animals have eyes — some with much more powerful vision than our own — but that's not the kind of seeing Jesus is talking about. We could phrase the question several other ways. "What are you looking for?" "Whom do you seek?"

It is in seeing for ourselves that our suspicions or hypotheses are confirmed, that our desires discover their fulfillment, and that we can rest for a moment in certainty. John the Baptist sought certainty of Jesus' identity. "Are you the one who is to come, or should we look for another?" Jesus sends word to him based on the testimony of sight, observations of the mighty deeds Jesus has begun to work. "Go and tell John what you hear and see."

God recognizes our desire to see. In the Incarnation, the Word is made flesh. The invisible is made visible. The supernatural is made manifest in an infant who can do little more than the most natural of movements as he feeds, cries, sleeps. We don't need to wait for Christmas to see God. The work of God is all around us. Those blinded by sin *"regain their sight."* People overcome backgrounds of poverty and violence to make world-changing contributions. Addicts grow and heal. Truth is spoken, and people listen. Let's pray for the grace to see God's movement in our lives this week. How have you seen the work of God?

**Hom the A** man was arrested a couple of weeks before Christmas and brought into court. When the judge asked the man what he was charged with, he answered, "doing my Christmas shopping early." The judge replied, "that's not an offense. How early were you doing this shopping?" the man answered, "Before the store opened."

In our gospel today, John the Baptist was in prison. John got in trouble with the king for condemning the king's immoral lifestyle. While in prison, John sends his disciples to Jesus to ask, "are you the one who is to come?" In other words, "are you the Messiah, the Savior, the one who is to establish the kingdom of God in our land, or are we waiting for someone else?" Jesus gave them just a verbal answer but evidenced that he was the awaited one. The miracles Jesus worked fit the description of the prophets that he was the one, especially Isaiah whom we heard from in today's first reading.

What was the point of John's question? John had leapt with joy within his mother's womb when Mary came to visit. John had pointed out Jesus as the Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world. Why now is he asking, "are you the one who is to come?" There are 2 possible explanations as to why John asked this question:

1) Perhaps, John was feeling discouraged being in prison, locked up as he was, possibly contemplating his own execution. Maybe he was getting a little impatient, saying to himself, if you are the Messiah, and have come to establish the kingdom where is it? If you have come to proclaim liberty to captives, why am I still in prison? Was he losing faith? Was he losing Hope?

2) Perhaps, John may have sent his disciples to ask the question of Jesus, "are you the one who is to come" so that they could discover for themselves that Jesus was the Messiah. John had already pointed Jesus out to them, but now he wanted them to convince them further.

At any event, whether John's faith was getting weak, or whether John was trying to inspire in his disciples, we all know how our own faith is challenged when we pray and we try to do good and life beats us down. "Why do good people suffer?" "Why do bad people seem to get away with murder?"

There's no one good answer, or even a combination of good answers to these profound questions. Yet, St. James gives us one approach to an answer. He tells us we too need to be patient when life seems unfair. God will even things out and those who have been faithful to his word will enjoy happiness beyond our ability to imagine. Patience is especially hard to people in our society today because we have become so used to so many conveniences. St. James uses the image of the farmer, who has to wait for the harvest as an example of patience. In spite of all the instantaneous conveniences we have in our modern day, there are still things we have to wait for: the birth of a child, for the baptism of a child, for a child to grow up, to develop a talent, to get to college degree. Patience takes faith, faith that God is at work creating something wonderful, even when I don't see it happening.

Jesus gave us evidence that the kingdom has arrived. But we need patience to wait for its completion. With each "Our Father" we pray, "Thy Kingdom Come." Like John in prison, we too must keep believing that Jesus is the answer to that promise. He is more than an answer, Jesus is the guarantee of that promise. Through the eyes of faith, we have this guarantee in the Eucharist we now celebrate. "He who is to come" comes to us now. In this faith, we look forward to being able to celebrate his birth once again with the hope his birth gives us and that is our joy at this time. **So as our liturgy this Guadete Sunday celebrates, "Let us Rejoice".....+JMJ......Fr.**



**LOOKING AHEAD TO THE EPIPHANY** The **blessing of the home** is a popular Epiphany custom. Using chalk, many households mark their entrance door with the year and with the inscription CMB, the initials of Caspar, Melchior and Balthazar, the names of the three wise men in legend. The inscription also

stands for *Christus Mansionem Benedicat*, which means "Christ, bless this home." The popular form the inscription takes is **20+C+M+B+20**. It remains above the doorway until Pentecost.
