Gospel Meditation

Many Americans are fascinated with England's monarchy. For many different reasons, we are drawn to the regal pageantry and all of the protocols associated with royal lifestyles. What's most amazing is that for all of the media attention focused on the comings and goings of English royalty, they really have very little effect on the day to day dealings of their country. Thoughts and images of kings and queens are often centered on this story book understanding of who and what they are. We associate protocols, etiquette and proper words and actions to how we approach members of a royal family. These tools serve the necessary purpose of keeping them isolated, enthroned and at a distance. There is something attractive about being an observer of ritual, pomp and circumstance. It's almost theatrical.

Is this how we see Jesus Christ, too? We often behave as if Christ is an isolated, enthroned, royal and even ineffective king. Jesus wants nothing to do with having the status of an earthly king. Jesus also does not want to be watched, observed, or set apart. He wants to get down and dirty with the very stuff of life especially the poor, marginalized, confused, hurting, lost, broken, imprisoned and forgotten ones. Jesus is the king who turns the tables on us and wants not only our attention but our engagement and conversion. He wants us to get dirty too.

How we treat other people is at the heart of Christ's kingdom. "Whatever you did for one of the least brothers of mine, you did for me." At different times in our lives we are all counted among the "least" ones. We may not be physically poor, but we can easily become emotionally and spiritually poor. We may not be marginalized as many physically are, cast aside because they have too many needs or don't quite fit in. But who hasn't experienced isolation, loneliness, inner turmoil, angst, heartache or loss? Almost every human being has experienced brokenness at one point or another, or will most definitely at some future point, facing discouragement, fear, insecurity. People are thirsty for more than water. We are imprisoned by our prejudices, misconceived notions and ideas, self-focused obsessions and ideologies. There is a lot of pain and many least ones around us. Stop, look and listen. This is what Christ the King is asking us to do. Look deeply into the eyes and soul of your sisters and brothers, all of them, and see Christ himself.

Being a spectator and observing all of the pageantry isn't enough. Jesus wants us to inherit the kingdom and live the kingdom. It is built on the blocks of love, mercy, compassion, hope, faith and blessing. It engages those who want it, changes and informs minds, inspires and transforms hearts, converts and renews souls, and sets things right. There is such a great need around us. Are you ready and willing to do whatever you can to serve in God's kingdom?

FROM OUR HOUSE TO YOUR HOUSE

Week of 11/22/20 -The Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus **Christ, King of the Universe**

GATHER: Begin simply by saying "Bless Us, O Lord!" and make the Sign of the Cross.

LISTEN: Use a portion of the reading this week to read aloud.

Our Gospel for today is Matthew 25:31-34. This feast marks the end of our current Liturgical Year, and it is always the feast of Christ the King. Not many of us have experience with actual kings and queens. But in the Kingdom of God, we see Jesus as King of the Universe – a vast universe, but also as close as you and me, as the people who gather in Jesus' name. In the parable, we hear that the nations are separated as a shepherd might separate sheep and goats. We can understand this as God's way of judging, of seeing how each of us and how each community tries to do God's will by loving God and neighbor each and every day. What other titles might we give to God in addition to King? How many can you name?

Pause a little.

SHARE: Use this thought or question for family sharing:

What exactly does the Kingdom of God look like, feel like, or act like? Have we caught glimpses of that Kingdom around us? When someone looks at me, can they tell that I am a part of that Kingdom? How?

Being a King is not just being a "ruler," but it also entails care and protection for those in the Kingdom. It includes working together to create a Kingdom of fairness, of peace and sometimes even reconciliation.

PRAY FOR: After sharing, consider all those you want to remember in prayer today.

You might want to add to your prayer today all those who lead countries and nations, especially our own - that the leaders we choose might reflect the same qualities we find in our feast today, that they may be examples of honesty and fairness, dignity and service, and compassionate care for those most in need.

GIVE THANKS: Conclude with: "Bless Us, O Lord, and these your gifts which we are about to receive from your bounty through Christ our Lord. Amen."

The Rite of Acceptance & Rite of Welcome

The adults who have begun the process of inquiry into becoming members of our Catholic community will be gathering publicly for the first time on Saturday, November 21. The Rite of Acceptance will be celebrated for them at the 4:30 pm Mass at which time they will be accepted into the order of Catechumenate (Greek: "one who is being instructed"). Catechumens are unbaptized adults who have undergone their initial period of instruction and are now ready to make public their intention to proceed toward becoming members of our faith community at the Easter Vigil. We their community, in turn, accept them and pledge our prayers and support as they continue this journey. This rite marks the first official blessing of their faith by our Church and celebrates the graces being bestowed on them by our loving God. They are literally signed with the cross of Christ as God's own. Our one adult seeking catechumenate is Curt Kassigkeit.

Additionally, those already baptized Christian inquirers who are on their journey through the RCIA process will experience the Rite of Welcoming as they officially request to become candidates for full communion in the Catholic faith with the reception of Confirmation and Eucharist at the Easter Vigil. Our adults seeking to become candidates are Caroline Bland, Bruce Peepers, and Rodney Trimble.

Wholehearted prayer and support for our catechumens and candidates in the RCIA is an essential part of our identity as a faith community, the people of God, striving always to share the Good News by our word and example.





November: Bury the Dead



ORPORAL WORKS

As children of God, we are not only called to reflect on God's mercy in our lives, but also on how we are the mercy of God to others.

After my dad succumbed to liver cancer in January of 1993, I remember having a conversation with one of my brothers. He said that it annoyed him when people told him they were sorry that his father had "passed away." "It's too recent," he said. "Call it what it is. He died. Don't soften it, or whitewash it with the nebulous 'passed away;' he died." The journey my mom and siblings went through during the last weeks of Dad's life were part of the process of "burying the dead." It forced everything into sharp relief and called us to recognize what was and is most precious to us. If you asked my siblings and the grandchildren who were old enough to understand how they felt about the two weeks Dad spent on his deathbed, everyone would say that it was the best two weeks ever - with the worst possible outcome.

But 27 years later, after sitting with my mom on her deathbed, I find myself rethinking that perception of the outcome. Burying the dead is a gift for the living. It gives those in grief (while anticipating a deeper grief) the opportunity to offer gentleness and care to the dying. It brings moments of quiet and peace to both the living and the dying to shed tears of regret and forgiveness, of longing for what was and anxiety of what is to come. It allows all parties to explore what their faith means in that very moment when all self-protection, pride, confidence and sense of control is stripped away - leaving the raw, pure emotions that overwhelm and disorient us. If we allow it, it is in this moment that our faith envelops us in the hope and peace that is grounded in the Promise of Christ. Our lives were ransomed by Jesus' death and glorified through his Resurrection.

Burying the Dead compels us to consider our earthly mortality and anticipate our eternal immortality. It offers us the comfort of walking through the valley of death, knowing that God waits for all of us.

- Visit the cemetery to pray for the person(s); perhaps bring flowers or a wreath.
- Volunteer to help clean up an unattended cemetery.

Surviving or Thriving: HOPE IN A TIME OF PANDEMIC



Even if you don't itemize your taxes, because of the new stimulus package passed by Congress, qualified charitable donations up to \$300 for individuals may be tax-deductible. The CARES Act legislation also temporarily suspended the limitation on qualified charitable contributions of cash, allowing for a current year deduction up to 100% of AGI. This provision is in effect only for the 2020 tax year. And, if you are 70 ½ or older, you may be able to make a gift of a Qualified Charitable Distribution from your IRA that will help us in our ministry and reduce your taxable income. Talk to your advisors and IRA administrator for more information and to be sure that your IRA Qualified Charitable Distribution gift is made directly from an IRA to a qualified charity such as our parish.
