RCIA RITE OF ACCEPTANCE & RITE OF WELCOMING



The November 21-22 Church of the Gesu bulletin contained an article about the combined Rite of Acceptance and Rite of Welcoming, the first public church ritual in the RCIA or Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults. This ritual was supposed to take place on November 21, but due to the surge in COVID cases

and warnings from health and government officials and the Cleveland Catholic diocese, it was postponed until a later date.

Curt Kassigkeit is a catechumen – one seeking the sacrament of Baptism. His sponsor is Michael Scorzo. Caroline Bland (sponsor, Sadie Curtin), Bruce Peepers (sponsor, Kelly Siemborski), and Dr. Rodney Trimble (sponsor, Dr. Charles Macias) are candidates – those seeking full communion in the Church through the sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist. Finally, Andrew Turner is a baptized Catholic seeking the sacrament of Confirmation. His sponsor is Ginny Thomas.

Even though we cannot formally accept/welcome our catechumen and candidates into our Church due to the ongoing pandemic, we consider them to be part of our parish community and invite all parishioners to pray for them, as they continue to explore the Catholic faith with a view towards joining the Church at the Easter Vigil in early April.

COMMUNAL RECONCILIATION

Out of consideration for the health and well-being of our parishioners, we will not hold an Advent Communal Reconciliation Service this year. Those wishing to go to Confession may do so on Saturdays at 3:00 pm or by appointment. During the season of Advent, a priest will also be available in the Usher's Room immediately following 7:30 am weekday Masses. Just a reminder: if there is no serious sin, there is no obligation to go to Confession before Christmas.

The First Sunday of Advent

GATHER: Begin simply by saying "Bless Us, O Lord!" and make the Sign

of the Cross.

LISTEN: Use a portion of the reading this week to read aloud.

Our Gospel for today is Matthew 13:33-37. We begin this Advent season with WATCH! BE ALERT! The landowner entrusts his property to the servants, but never tells them when he will return. So, be ready!

Pause a little,

SHARE: Use this thought or question for family sharing:

This season of Advent finds us waiting for so much! For Christmas and the coming of Jesus, of course! But this year we also wait for a vaccine, for an end to political turmoil, for a lasting peace.

What are the signs we see around us this Advent season that remind us of the Coming of Jesus – in our church and in our homes? What can you do in your home? If you are going to our livestream Mass, look carefully for signs of Advent! Find at least 3!

Next week we focus on the next Corporal Work of Mercy, to Clothe the Naked. Look at the bulletin page for suggestions for service at home and with the parish.

PRAY FOR: After sharing, consider all those you want to remember in prayer today.

Light the first candle on your Advent wreath. Create your own Advent Litany, and conclude with "Come, Lord Jesus, Come."

Start with these and add your own:

Into our home...Come, Lord Jesus, Come!

To all who are sick and afraid...Come, Lord Jesus, Come

To those who suffer from the cold...Come, Lord Jesus, Come!

To those longing for peace in our families and our world...Come, Lord Jesus, Come!

To those who are alone... Come, Lord Jesus, Come!

GIVE THANKS: Conclude with: "Bless Us, O Lord, and these your gifts which we are about to receive from your bounty through Christ our Lord. Amen."

In these times, when we are daily and mercilessly reminded of our common mortal condition, burying the dead would seem to have a particular spiritual significance. It has, however, been described as the "lonely stepchild" of the corporal works of mercy. It is not enumerated in the Gospel of Matthew as being among those acts by which we serve Christ by serving others in this life.

Instead, the Church reaches back to the example of Tobit burying the discarded bodies of the Israelite dead in Nineveh for scriptural inspiration of this undertaking (Canon 2300). Its origins appear to be found in the practices of the early Christian community, particularly the recovery and burial of the abandoned bodies of martyrs. These circumstances are guite foreign to most of us. In contemporary culture, when a member of our community dies, we "pay our respects" by visiting the funeral home or attending the person's funeral. Especially if the deceased or her relatives are known by us, we offer words of consolation and share memories. These acts are gracious gestures and may provide comfort for the bereaved. They are indeed acts of mercy.

But this corporal work is also and perhaps foremost intended for the dead. We bury the bodies of the deceased in faith and hope of the Resurrection and the promise of eternal life. It is not simply an act of respect or remembrance, as important as those things are. It is the outward expression of our belief, shared with that person, in the communion of the saints, the resurrection of the body and life everlasting. It is the ultimate assertion of our creed.

The final act of charity extended to our Lord in this world was his burial. No less than any of the other corporal works, when we do the same for our sisters and brothers, we do this for Him.

- Volunteer to help clean up an unattended cemetery.

Surviving or Thriving: HOPE IN A TIME OF PANDEMIC



YEAR-END GIVING

In this season of giving, consider making a year-end gift to our parish in gratitude for all the blessings you have received in life. As you plan to make the most of your charitable donations in 2020, know that we gratefully accept gifts of cash and appreciated assets such as stocks or bonds. Even if you don't itemize your taxes, because of the new stimulus package passed by Congress, gualified charitable donations up to \$300 for individuals may be tax-deductible. The CARES Act legislation also temporarily suspended the limitation on gualified charitable contributions of cash, allowing for a current year deduction up to 100% of AGI. This provision is in effect only for the 2020 tax year. And, if you are 70 $\frac{1}{2}$ or older, you may be able to make a gift of a Qualified Charitable Distribution from your IRA that will help us in our ministry and reduce your taxable income. Talk to your advisors and IRA administrator for more information and to be sure that your IRA Qualified Charitable Distribution gift is made directly from an IRA to a qualified charity such as our parish.

Gifts of stock are also accepted for Gesu Church and School. The information that you or your broker may need includes: Gesu Church and School, DTC 0221, Acct #NG 15019 and our broker is Linda McGann at UBS (216) 765-8102
