LITURGY CORNER

What is the Liturgy of the Hours? Liturgy of the Hours is the public prayer of the Church for praising God and sanctifying the day. It is also referred to as the Divine Office or Christian Prayer. The book used for recitation of the Office is often called the Breviary (usually in 4 volumes) as well as the Christian Prayer Book (usually one volume). The daily praying of the Liturgy of the Hours is required of the clergy and the religious who have professed solemn vows. The Church also recommends the praying of the Liturgy of the Hours by the lay faithful. The Liturgy of the Hours is rooted in early Church practice. Christians gathered at various hours of the day to pray, especially in the morning and evening. Recitation of the Psalms was always core to the Hours. The Apostolic Constitutions, a manual of Church order and liturgy written about 380 A.D., recommended the praying of the Hours by priests and “everyone of the laity”. In the Liturgical Movement of the 20th century there was much study of the early sources of Church history and liturgy. In addition to renewal in the Eucharistic liturgy and the sacraments, the movement emphasized participation in the Liturgy of the Hours for all of the people. Many laypeople began reciting the Divine Office and drew inspiration from it regarding the sense of the Mystical Body of Christ, being joined to people all over the world in the communal prayer. The Liturgy, revised since 1965, consists of: Office of Readings, morning and evening prayer, daytime prayer, and night prayer. *More next week... Gay Snell*

Building Fund Update: As we start the new year, let us give thanks and praise to our Lord for His guidance, mercy, wisdom and love this past year. We began our **Phase II Building Campaign** in April, 2018. As of December 31, 2018, we have received pledges in the amount of **\$530,497.07** from which we have collected **\$163,993.57**. In order to begin construction, we must collect about **\$3,000,000**. If you have not yet made a pledge, please prayerfully consider doing so. With the Lord’s help and with all of us working together, we can accomplish our goal of building a new Parish Center. You may have noticed that a “**thermometer**” is up in the vestibule of the Church, by the center doors. This is how we will track our progress and it will be updated regularly to keep you advised of our fundraising efforts. We will also have our first major fundraising event, a Mardi Gras themed Calcutta on Saturday, March 2, 2019 after the 5:30 pm Mass. Tickets are \$100 each and entitle you to two meals at the event and a chance to win up to \$10,000 with several smaller cash prizes as well! You need not be present to win. Please have your family consider helping us sell one book of 5 tickets. Contact the Parish Office for more information. Let us start this new year with every confidence that together we can accomplish our goal with the help of God’s grace. During the 2019 Flu Season

New Mexico is one of the states listed by the U.S. Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) as having widespread flu outbreaks and high Influenza-like Illness (ILI) Activity.

Due to the severity of the flu season, the archdiocese will be taking the following steps in regards to the celebration of Mass:

- **During the Sign of Peace**, instead of shaking hands or hugging, as is practiced in some parishes, it would be best to simply nod your head and avoid bodily contact.
- **When praying the Our Father**, please do not hold hands. Simply extend your hands toward Heaven or fold your hands.
- **Holy Communion** will not be received under both species, just the Consecrated Host and not the Chalice.
- **The celebrant of any Mass in the Archdiocese of Santa Fe is to encourage the reception of the Consecrated Host in the hands.** Please note, many liturgists believe the reception of the Consecrated Host in the hands is considered more appropriate liturgically than receiving the Consecrated Host on the tongue. This directive is aimed at limiting contact with saliva, thus limiting the spread of the flu virus.
- **Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion** should wash their hands just prior to distribution Holy Communion and should wash them immediately after distribution. If it is easier, an anti-bacterial gel can be used.
- **If you are sick, sneezing or coughing**, it would be best for you to stay home. You are welcome to take advantage of the Sunday TV Masses which are available in English and Spanish. It is not a sin to miss Mass on Sundays if you are ill. Please note the reason for these directives is to limit the spread of influenza and to save lives. Please pray for all who have lost their lives as a result of the flu, and may we do our part to prevent its spread.

These directives will be revoked when the situation improves.

THE PRESENTATION OF THE LORD

The feast was first observed in the Eastern Church as "The Encounter." In the sixth century, it began to be observed in the West: in Rome with a more penitential character and in Gaul (France) with solemn blessings and processions of candles, popularly known as "Candlemas." The Presentation of the Lord concludes the celebration of the Nativity and with the offerings of the Virgin Mother and the prophecy of Simeon, the events now point toward Easter.

"In obedience to the Old Law, the Lord Jesus, the first-born, was presented in the Temple by his Blessed Mother and his foster father. This is another 'epiphany' celebration insofar as the Christ Child is revealed as the Messiah through the canticle and words of Simeon and the testimony of Anna the prophetess. Christ is the light of the nations, hence the blessing and procession of candles on this day. In the Middle Ages this feast of the Purification of the Blessed Virgin Mary, or 'Candlemas,' was of great importance.

"The specific liturgy of this Candlemas feast, the blessing of candles, is not as widely celebrated as it should be, except of course whenever February 2 falls on a Sunday and thus takes precedence. There are two ways of celebrating the ceremony, either the *Procession*, which begins at a 'gathering place' outside the church, or the *Solemn Entrance*, celebrated within the church."

Saint Blaise's Story

We know more about the devotion to Saint Blaise by Christians around the world than we know about the saint himself. His feast is observed as a holy day in some Eastern Churches. In 1222, the Council of Oxford prohibited servile labor in England on Blaise's feast day. The Germans and Slavs hold him in special honor, and for decades many United States Catholics have sought the annual Saint Blaise blessing for their throats.

We know that Bishop Blaise was martyred in his episcopal city of Sebastea, Armenia, in 316. The legendary *Acts of St. Blaise* were written 400 years later. According to them Blaise was a good bishop, working hard to encourage the spiritual and physical health of his people. Although the Edict of Toleration (311), granting freedom of worship in the Roman Empire, was already five years old, persecution still raged in Armenia. Blaise was apparently forced to flee to the back country. There he lived as a hermit in solitude and prayer, but he made friends with the wild animals. One day a group of hunters seeking wild animals for the amphitheater stumbled upon Blaise's cave. They were first surprised and then frightened. The bishop was kneeling in prayer surrounded by patiently waiting wolves, lions and bears.

The legend has it that as the hunters hauled Blaise off to prison, a mother came with her young son who had a fish bone lodged in his throat. At Blaise's command the child was able to cough up the bone.

Agricolaus, governor of Cappadocia, tried to persuade Blaise to sacrifice to pagan idols. The first time Blaise refused, he was beaten. The next time he was suspended from a tree and his flesh torn with iron combs or rakes. Finally, he was beheaded.
