### THE GLORY IN SIGHT: SCOTT HAHN REFLECTS ON THE SECOND SUNDAY OF LENT

In today's Gospel, we go up to the mountain with Peter, John, and James. There we see Jesus "transfigured," speaking with Moses and Elijah about His "exodus."

The Greek word "exodus" means "departure." But the word is chosen deliberately here to stir our remembrance of the Israelites' flight from Egypt.

By His death and resurrection, Jesus will lead a new Exodus—liberating not only Israel but every race and people; not from bondage to Pharaoh, but from slavery to sin and death. He will lead all mankind, not to the territory promised to Abraham in today's First Reading, but to the heavenly commonwealth that Paul describes in today's Epistle.

Moses, the giver of God's law, and the great prophet Elijah, were the only Old Testament figures to hear the voice and see the glory of God atop a mountain (see Exodus 24:15–18; 1 Kings 19:8–18).

Today's scene closely resembles God's revelation to Moses, who also brought along three companions and whose face also shone brilliantly (see Exodus 24:1; 34:29). But when the divine cloud departs in today's Gospel, Moses and Elijah are gone. Only Jesus remains. He has revealed the glory of the rinity—the voice of the Father, the glorified Son, and the Spirit in the shining cloud.

Jesus fulfills all that Moses and the prophets had come to teach and show us about God (see Luke 24:27). He is the "chosen One" promised by Isaiah (see Isaiah 42:1; Luke 23:35), the "prophet like me" that Moses had promised (see Deuteronomy 18:15; Acts 3:22–23; 7:37). Far and above that, He is the Son of God (see Psalm 2:7; Luke 3:21–23).

"Listen to Him," the Voice tells us from the cloud. If, like Abraham, we put our faith in His words, one day we too will be delivered into "the land of the living" that we sing of in today's Psalm. We will share in His resurrection, as Paul promises, our lowly bodies glorified like His.

## **PASTOR'S COLUMN**

I was good friends with Fr. Peter Kovarik who, as you may remember, was tragically killed in a plane crash a few years ago. Fr. Pete was a big gardener. I'm not talking here simply about vegetables. He would create elaborate gardens in his yard in whatever parish he was assigned. I once asked him how he decided where each type of plant or flower should go. He replied that when you look at your own yard, people often make the mistake of thinking of it as one big space but if you're going to turn it into a garden you need to see it as a bunch of small spaces. Then one can design each space individually. The architecture of a Catholic church is like this. We often make the mistake of thinking about a church building as one big space. When more accurately the church is a group of smaller spaces organized theologically as a whole, each with their own liturgical purpose.

"The sanctuary is the space where the altar stands, where the word of God is proclaimed, and where the priest, the deacon, and the other ministers exercise their offices."

The principal furnishings in the sanctuary are the altar, the ambo, and the celebrant's chair. Among these, the altar is the central focus. It is here that the Eucharist, the ritual sacrificial meal that recalls and makes present Christ's life, death, and resurrection and which proclaims the death of the Lord until he comes, is celebrated."2 Wherever Christ becomes present all of heaven becomes present with Him. Whenever we celebrate the sacrifice of the Mass, that place becomes the throne room of the King of Kings, the "Wonder-Counselor, God-hero, Father-Forever, Prince of Peace whose kingdom is vast and forever peaceful".3 In the celebration of the Eucharist, heaven is opened for us, and like Peter, James and John in the vision of the

Transfiguration, we see Christ present to us. Thus, we are given a glimpse of what God has prepared for us when he comes again. The purpose of the sanctuary is to worship Christ present in the word and in the word made flesh as he becomes present—body, blood, soul and divinity.

Liturgical art in the sanctuary should facilitate and clarify this focus. "Throughout the ages, Catholic churches have been enriched with images of many kinds, recalling sacred history, supporting devotional practice, and providing a foretaste of heavenly realities. Each is important and useful in the life of a Christian, yet each is distinct, and proper usage clarifies their theological and liturgical foundations.

"Historical images recall the history of Christianity and keep alive the memory of the saints and biblical events." Historical images, for example the stations of the cross, belong in the nave (where the pews are), or in another place excluding the sanctuary.

"Devotional images are used for personal devotion outside of the liturgy. The humanity of a saint is typically emphasized in devotional art, and figures are typically shown with their poses and glances directed toward the devotee. Here the Christian finds a place for individual piety, a strong engagement of the emotions, and a wider range of expressive possibilities. Devotional images properly belong in a distinct area suitable for private prayer and should not be confused with liturgical art.

"Liturgical images reveal the [Eucharistic] liturgy itself, particularly in its heavenly cosmic dimensions. Intensely theocentric, liturgical images reveal the glory of the heavenly realm and show the heavenly beings filled with divine

life for all is radiant, orderly, and restored. This sort of image is most proper in the sanctuary of the church, though it might flow out to the nave, and belongs to the liturgy itself because it provides signs and symbols of heavenly realities."<sup>1</sup>

If you recall, on the west side of our sanctuary, there used to be a statue of St. Joseph and a statue of St. Teresa of the Little Flower. In front of each of these statues was a small set of vigil lights. This encouraged parishioners to enter the sanctuary and light a candle asking for the intercession of one of these saints. The devotion of lighting candles and asking for the intercession of a particular saint in front of an image or statue of the same is a pious practice that has always been encouraged in sacred tradition. I think such devotional practices are important and should be maintained but not in the sanctuary. It is more appropriate for them to be located in a place more suitable for private prayer. As a result, I have relocated them to the adoration chapel.

As I'm sure you have also noticed, in the place where the statues of St. Teresa and St. Joseph once stood now stand images of Jesus and Mary. Where they once stood is a large Divine Mercy image. To discourage private devotional practices in the sanctuary I have placed the vigil candles in front of the Divine Mercy image, which is properly located just outside of the sanctuary. This also makes it possible for those who sit in the section of pews on the north side of the church to see a heavenly image of Jesus as well as those who sit in the section of pews on the west side of the church. In addition, all the people in the church were able to see the crucifix except for those who sat in the last four rows of pews in the center pie shaped section. For these worshipers the image of the cross was blocked by the beautiful image of the liturgical year sewn into the large quilt which hung above the center section. This piece of art is currently being cleaned. When it is returned, one side of

it will return to the nave and be placed in the gable of the wall behind the north section of pews. Its duplicate side will be placed on the west side of the church hall. In this way we are still able to appreciate this beautiful depiction of the liturgical year and all are also able to see the image of Jesus crucified.

Lastly, I moved the image of the Divine Mercy from the adoration chapel to the main church because I want to encourage this devotion among you. In these difficult times in the Church where scandalous headlines seem more common than not, I think that it is of utmost importance to place our focus confidently on Jesus' mercy and love. This is His Church and He promised that "the gates of hell shall never prevail against it." The Catholic Church is being purified and prepared. It is imperative that we look to the Divine Mercy and say, "Jesus, I trust in You."

# EXCERPTS FROM A CATHOLIC FRAMEWORK FOR ECONOMIC LIFE

As followers of Jesus Christ and participants in a powerful economy, Catholics in the United States are called to work for greater economic justice in

the face of persistent poverty, growing incomegaps, and increasing discussion of economic issues in the United States and around the world. We urge Catholics to use the following ethical framework for economic life as principles for reflection, criteria for judgment and directions for action. These principles are drawn directly from Catholic teaching on economic life. (Continued from last week)

- 5. All people have a right to life and to secure the basic necessities of life (e.g., food, clothing, shelter, education, health care, safe environment, economic security.)
- 6. All people have the right to economic initiative, to productive work, to just wages and benefits, to decent working conditions as well as to organize and join unions or other associations.
- 7. All people, to the extent they are able, have a corresponding duty to work, a responsibility to provide the needs of their families and an obligation to contribute to the broader society.

Priests and Laity Working Together to Form the Mystical Body of Christ 1 Corinthians 12:12-13 With Keynote Speaker Rev. Charles Lachowitzer




