THE GOLD MASS

Archbishop Joseph Kurtz has worked with members of his faith and science dialogue group to introduce the Gold Mass to the Archdiocese of Louisville. Following in the tradition of the Masses for other professions - Red Mass for the legal profession, the White Mass for the healthcare profession, and the Blue Mass for first responders - the Gold Mass invites scientists to participate. Its goal is to create spiritual fellowship among Catholic scientists, science educators, and students of science, while also affirming the Catholic Church's long tradition of scientific inquiry and accomplishment.

This Mass will take place on Wednesday, November 3, 6:00 p.m. at Holy Family Parish, 3938 Poplar Level Road. A sandwich reception and special presentation by Dr. Kate Bulinski, Associate Professor in Bellarmine University's Department of Environmental Studies, will follow immediately after the Mass. Dr. Bulinski's presentation is "Faith and Science: Compatible and Complementary," which focuses on how a Catholic scientist sees herself in the world of science. The presentation and reception will take place in the Pastoral Center of the Archdiocese of Louisville, right next door to Holy Family Church.

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

In the Old Testament, wealth was considered a sign of God's favor. So imagine the rich young man's surprise when he approached Jesus, only to find out that he would need to sell what he had and then give to the poor in order to follow Jesus. His face fell and he walked away. His demeanor highlights the fundamental error of equating what we have, and what we do, with salvation - of relying on earthly things, rather than God, for our deepest comfort and security. In contrast, the Book of Wisdom speaks of the richness and worth of divine wisdom over that of any precious gem or gold. We understand that divine wisdom to be manifested in the person of Jesus Christ. Therefore, true wisdom means having faith in Jesus rather than in our own efforts and whatever we might have earned in our lifetime. Otherwise, we are like a camel trying to squeeze through the eye of a needle. Jesus truly offers us the only way. I like to think that the young man came around eventually. After all, as Jesus says, "all things are possible for God." As we reflect, we can ask Jesus what we need to "let go of" to turn our sights, our minds, and our lives over to God, knowing that following his will is the surest path to the Kingdom.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Just a few days ago, we celebrated the feast of St. Francis of Assisi. The behavior of the rich young man in today's Gospel - daring, enthusiastic, confident - brings the young Francis to mind. Born into wealth, he relished his carefree lifestyle and sought to become a knight. His dreams of glory, however, quickly became a nightmare as his comrades fell and he was imprisoned in a dank cell for a year. After his release, he fell seriously ill, and God spoke to him. Francis cast aside the trappings of wealth, choosing instead to seek God's will in all things. His example invites us to pray about our priorities: What things or attitudes get in the way of our relationship with God and one another? What is the Lord asking of us and how can we respond? How can we give witness to our belief that all things are possible with God?

ACTION Perhaps try a "consumption fast" for the next couple of weeks, purchasing only what you need - food and other necessities. Use time and energy you may have spent shopping to deepen your relationship with God and others by participating in Eucharistic adoration, going to confession, visiting an elderly relative, or contacting an old friend.

CHILDREN'S LITURGY OF THE WORD (CLOW) Resumes October 3

What is Children's Liturgy of the Word? Children's Liturgy of the Word, or as it is more affectionately known - **CLOW**, is an extension of the Mass. It is a <u>worship</u> experience geared especially for children ages 3 - 6 that is currently offered at the 11:00 AM Mass only. Children's Liturgy of the Word mirrors the worship experience of the larger community in an engaging and child friendly manner.

The Word of God has a message that is as relevant and fitting for children as it is for adults; however, children often fail to hear the message simply because the adult vocabulary is beyond their comprehension. Children's Liturgy of the Word offers an opportunity for children to hear Scripture in words they understand and to share their own understanding of God's word. Children are also guided through the proper Mass responses and postures at a much slower pace which helps them to learn and understand these responses better.

There is no registration needed for families who wish to participate in Children's Liturgy of the Word. The family should simply sit in church as usual for the Introductory Rites. After the Introductory Rites, the presider invites any children ages 3 - 6 who wish to participate to join in procession behind the leader as they go to their worship space. They return after the General Intercessions to celebrate the Liturgy of the Eucharist with the entire community.

There are several important covid updates that we will be asking of all families that have children that participate in CLOW this year:

- Children's Liturgy of the Word sessions will be **limited** to children ages 3 - first grade. Children second grade (preparing for first Sacraments) and older are asked to remain with parents in Mass.
- We must limit the number of youth helpers to **only two for each Mass.** Youth helpers must be grade 7 and up.
- We will be following all recommended and required covid safety measures. We will abide by the requirements set forth by our Archdiocese for mask wearing for events or programs involving gatherings with groups of children together.. All children and adults, <u>regardless of vaccination status</u>, will be required to wear a mask during the CLOW session. There are masks for children and adults at the entry doors of church for those who arrive without them.
