Okie-dokie, June it is! We will continue to increase the number of people selected for each Mass, and we have opened up a couple more sections in the church for unrestricted seating. Yayyyyyy. For now we are going to continue to require masks in the church for weekend Masses due to the number of people present. Daily Masses remain mask-optional.

And, for those of you who are just not comfortable being in church with more people present, please know there is no judgment or shame on choosing to participate from home or in the parking lot. We will continue our live streaming of the 5:30pm and 9:30am Masses and continue to bring Communion out to the parking lot (near front doors of church) at both of them. Come Holy Spirit and continue to guide us as we make these steps towards normalcy!

It became official on June 4th that our new Parochial Vicar will be Tony Galati. He is currently a deacon, just finished at Mt. Angel, and will be ordained a priest on June 26th (ordination is at the Cathedral at 10:00am – we'll have the link on our website if you wish to participate!). I am confident he will be a great fit for our parish and will fill in at least part of the void of our losing Fr. Hans after the three years he

has been with us. Please be praying for Deacon Tony daily as he gears up to come!

“The Cost of Discipleship” will be my theme for this weekend. Living our Christian faith in the midst of a culture that is increasingly indifferent and sometimes hostile to our convictions as followers of Jesus is going to require greater attention on our part. We need to expect “pushback” and need to be especially watchful of the example and witness we are making by our lives. That is going to mean avoiding slipping into negativity, defensiveness, aligning with one political party or another, and being always people of joy, generosity, kindness, self-control, and patience. Only with a life of daily prayer, being part of a community of faith, and the sacraments (especially the Eucharist) can we make this kind of witness. Come, Holy Spirit!

Blessings to Abigail Corpuz, Kennedy Parsons, Ben Reznick, and Simon Sztelle, who were baptized this weekend!

Funeral services were held last week for Chris Supalla and John Steele. May their soul and all the souls of the faithful departed, rest in peace.

WHAT'S SHAWN THE SEMINARIAN UP TO?



What a whirlwind it has been since arriving at Holy Trinity over a month ago! And what a wonderful experience it has been!

Since arriving, I've done a bang-up job of remembering many of your names, and I've also been successful at misremembering the faces to which they belong (to those whom I've called by another name, my apologies!). I've also been involved in Homebound Ministry (including delivering Communion); helping with Masses (including funeral Masses and graveside services); sitting in on business, school, and pastoral meetings; attending Youth and Young Adult Ministry gatherings; shadowing Fr. Dave and Fr. Hans; and helping out in whatever ways I can. As a result, this past month has been an incredibly blessed learning experience for me; thanks to all of you who have contributed to this wonderful experience for me!

Outside of Holy Trinity, I've had the opportunity to reconnect with folks from my home parish (the Cathedral) whom I haven't seen since last Summer. At Mt. Angel, we're “locked down” during the semesters to reduce the chance of COVID being brought back into the “Hilltop”

monastic community; consequently, I wasn't able to visit my home parish on the weekends (which is what I would normally do in pre-COVID pandemic times). And, I was able to attend First Communion of a little girl who was in my online “Zoom” ministry last year – it was wonderful to finally be able to meet her and her family face to face, and outside the computer “Zoom Box.”

Due to a very different summer schedule (caused in part by the pandemic), my schedule at Holy Trinity is split between a six-week block (which I'm wrapping up this week) and a two-week block (which I'll complete immediately before returning to the Seminary on July 22nd). This means I'll be away on my month-long summer vacation from June 10th through July 12th.

What does a Seminarian do for vacation? Well, my plan is to head back to Idaho to visit family and friends for a couple weeks, and then spend a couple weeks visiting friends in Montana and Wyoming. I also plan to annoy the local trout populations in those states as best I can while using a fly rod. After I'm done visiting family, friends, and fish, I'll return to Holy Trinity – and I hope you're all are looking forward to it as much as I am!

BRETT'S TWO CENTS

Hello everyone! If you've been following along in the bulletin for these past several weeks, you know that Al is stepping down as our Director of Community Outreach in order to devote more time to the Beaverton Resource Center (BRC). We'll miss him greatly, and are thankful that his change in work doesn't mean he and Cathie will be changing parishes. Who else would keep the Benjamin's in line at the 5:30pm Saturday Mass?

Michelle Dieter is stepping into Al's shoes as our new Food Closet Coordinator (though she tells me she prefers the term 'Warrior Princess' – I think I'm in trouble). You may have noticed the changed title, and that's intentional. With the BRC right next door and able to handle the many outreach needs that are presented at our Food Closet so much more comprehensively, it's a good opportunity for us to think about where we want to direct our Food Closet energies going forward.

That sort of strategic thinking will be led by Michelle, but for the time being I want to assure you that the heart of the Food Closet Ministry – getting food to hungry people! – will remain central and untouched. That includes our Backpack Program, our Thanksgiving Food Baskets, and our Christmas Giving Tree. We'll also continue to provide some outreach assistance, albeit in a more targeted way, focusing predominantly on parishioners in need. All of these efforts will now fall under the heading of Holy Trinity's Food Closet Ministry.

Reflecting this more streamlined approach, those of you donating online will notice that there are now three giving options rather than four: Holy Trinity Parish, Food Closet Ministry, and Holy Trinity School. Our Backpack and Teen Duffel Bag Programs (which were listed as a fourth option) will continue, but will now be funded out of our general Food Closet Ministry account, rather than a separate outreach account as in the past. Any current donations to these programs will be changed over to the general Food Closet Ministry account as well starting July 1st. Over the next few weeks, we'll be reaching out to those of you with recurring donations to confirm these changes before they go into effect.

For parishioners who receive offertory envelopes quarterly in the mail, you'll see an updated "Holy Trinity Food Closet Ministry" special collection envelope replacing the current "Holy Trinity Community Outreach" envelope starting with the October-December mailing.
