From the Pastor

Bishop da Cunha Announces Clergy Record Review

In 2004, the Diocese of Fall River released a list of thirty-two priests and one seminarian who had sexual abuse charges made against them in the previous fifty years. The diocese also reported at that time the total number of abuse allegations was 216. BishopAccountability.com has a database listing the names of priests from throughout the country who have been accused of abuse. They list the names of twenty-nine priests and one seminarian who were attached to the Diocese of Fall River who have at some time been accused of sexual abuse. According to the BishopAccountability.com website charges against two of the twenty-nine priests were found to be unsubstantiated. Three of the priests listed were convicted and served time in prison for their crimes. By 2004 the statute of limitations had already run out in the cases of the other priests so they were never criminally charged nor were the accusations against them proved. It is also my understanding that the diocese has spent approximately \$15 million dollars in legal settlements and counseling services for abuse victims. The last charges of abuse made against a priest of the diocese was in 2012. This priest died in 1996.

As Bishop da Cunha states in his letter clergy files were reviewed again last year to insure no abuse cases were overlooked. He states the diocese has hired Mr. William Gavin, a former FBI Assistant Director, to review clergy personnel records to provide independent proof that all cases have been accounted for. Bishop da Cunha states that he is doing so in the interest of accountability and transparency.

This week the US Bishops completed a week-long quiet retreat at a seminary in suburban Chicago praying for the Holy Spirit to guide their actions to continue to address the clergy abuse scandal. The retreat was proposed by Pope Francis and it was directed by the preacher to the papal household, Capuchin friar Fr. Raniero Cantalamessa.

To begin the retreat Pope Francis addressed the bishops in an eight-page letter. In it the pope "called for a "new ecclesial season" led by bishops who are more than administrators interested in "pointing fingers," and instead, leadership marked by "collegial spiritual fatherhood," rooted in humility and unity," according to an article by Christopher White on the Crux Now website. White also wrote that the Pope had, "re-upped his call for "a pastoral conversion" to change a culture which he posited allowed for a culture of abuse to fester."

In an article in America Magazine Zac Davis addressed the criticism from some quarters that the bishops shouldn't be praying about abuse but doing something about it. In his article Davis points out that, "There is a long tradition in the Catholic Church regarding the necessary relationship between prayer and action, and the importance of it preceding action." It is always good to take the time to reflect before initiating reforms to make sure they really address the issue and don't have unintended consequences that end up exacerbating a problem. Then decisive action must be taken. At the close of his article Davis says, "Catholics should pray that their bishops have the grace to understand where God is leading the church, but also that they will have the courage to enact change when they leave the retreat center and return to their dioceses."

Back in the summer I said in a homily, soon after the wounds of the clergy sexual abuse scandal were reopened, that as Jesus said in scripture fasting and prayer are what will finally help the church solve the abuse scandal. I want to thank parishioners who joined with me to use the fall and winter Ember Days for fasting and prayer on the sexual abuse issue. I plan to continue to take the opportunity of commemorating the Ember Days in this way.

From February 21-24, Pope Francis will be meeting with representatives of the Bishops' Conference from throughout the world with the intention of developing a world-wide plan to address the sin of sexual abuse and form policies to hold bishops and those who enable abuse accountable. I plan to fast and do extra prayer during those days asking the Holy Spirit to enlighten the bishops to formulate a plan to address the sexual abuse scandal and help begin to restore credibility to the Church.
