From the Pastor

Good Politics is at the Service of Peace

Besides being New Year's Day and the Solemnity of Mary the Mother of God, January 1st is also celebrated as World Day of Peace. The date was so designated for the first time back in 1968 by St. Pope Paul VI. Every year since that day the Pope has released a message outlining his prayers for peace and giving an indication of what will be the focus and tone for the Vatican's diplomatic endeavors for the coming year. The message is distributed to government foreign ministers around the world before it is officially released by the Holy See on New Year's Day.

In early November the Vatican released the theme of the message which is, "Good politics is at the service of peace". In his message Pope Francis will stress, "political responsibility belongs to every citizen, and in particular to those who have been given the mandate to protect and to govern". Given the political climate in our country and in so many other nations throughout the world where the political environment is tumultuous the Pope has chosen an important topic.

The Pope states that those who exercise political responsibilities have received a mandate to protect and to govern. He reminds politicians that they have the mission to, "safeguard the law and to encourage dialogue between all actors of society, between generations, and between cultures".

Pope Francis will be noting in his message that there can be no peace without mutual respect. In his message Pope Francis will recall Pope Paul VI's observation that the first condition for trust is respect for the given word. The Pope will point out that, "political commitment – which is one of the highest expressions of charity - implies concern for the future of life and of the planet, of the youngest and of the smallest, in their trust for fulfillment".

It seems as if in his World Peace Day message, the Pope will be addressing some major concerns regarding the deterioration of the political climate throughout the world. In our country and in so many others political discussion has become very contentious and a willingness to debate and reach a consensus or compromise increasingly impossible.

As a new Congress takes its seats early next year we should pray for an improved political climate in our country. We need to pray and work to encourage politicians of all stripes, at all levels of government, to work together for the common good. We must especially remind those who are newly elected to office of the responsibility to formulate policies that protect the most vulnerable in our society and treat all with respect.

The spirit of Pope Francis' World Day of Peace message doesn't only apply to the professional politician but to all of us. We all need to work for an improved political climate. A handout from the US Conference of Bishops published to mark the day suggests that we make a transformed political climate the focus of our prayer. Don't make that just a general prayer request but as in all prayer we need to get specific. We can get specific in prayer for a better political climate by maybe taking a particular issue discussed in a newspaper or social media article. Ask God to open the contentious sides to move their hearts to compromise as they work towards a resolution of the issue.

We need to also learn about the issues that are causing disagreement in our country or community. Don't just settle for one point of view on an issue but listen to different sources and viewpoints to come to your own opinion. Most of all look for stories about instances of hope for a better political climate. Seek out stories of where people worked together through compromise and a willingness to reach a consensus to resolve issues.

We also can't sit on the sidelines moaning about our political climate. We need to join together with others who hope for progress in our political climate to work for policies that work to support justice and peace and bring an end to poverty. This new year we should work to reestablish respect and bipartisanship in our political climate.
