From the Pastor

Candles, A Martyr, and Committing Your Life to God

It has been forty days since Christmas and so on Saturday the Church celebrates the Feast of the Presentation of Jesus in the Temple. According to Luke's gospel this is the day that Mary and Joseph brought the infant Jesus into the Temple for the first time. They came to the Temple to offer the humblest sacrifices, two turtledoves, and with two purposes in mind. Mary came to be purified after giving birth to Jesus. Jesus was brought because as a first-born son they needed to offer a sacrifice to redeem him as required by the Law. Luke's gospel also tells us that two holy people, Simeon and Anna, were the first to recognize Jesus' greatness when he came into the Temple. They astonished Jesus' parents when they both prophesied that Jesus would become someone very special to God.

February 2 holds such significance in regards to Jesus being committed to serve God. It was long celebrated as the day new candidates to the Religious Life were accepted into convents and monasteries. For many years it was a favorite day for ordinations to the priesthood, too. In 1997, St. John Paul II instituted February 2 as World Day for Consecrated Life. Today we pray for vocations to the consecrated life. Please pray for all those who have made commitments in the consecrated life, and be sure to thank them on their special day. May they continue to be inspired by Jesus Christ and respond generously to God's gift of their vocation.

Since it was at his Presentation that Jesus was first recognized as the light of the world, the Feast of the Presentation is often referred to as Candlemas Day. It is the day to bless candles for use throughout the year. We will be blessing candles at Masses today. Each family is welcome to take one candle home with them. It is a good pious practice to light the candle on birthdays, anniversaries of baptisms and marriages. Some people like to light it during storms or other times when they might be anxious. Help yourself to a candle on your way out of Mass.

Finally, Sunday is the Feast of St. Blaise. He is the saint who is called upon to help protect us from ailments of the throat. The traditional blessing of throats will be invoked at the end of all Masses. Below is a little story about St. Blaise found online at the Franciscan Media website.

Saint Blaise's Story

We know more about the devotion to Saint Blaise by Christians around the world than we know about the saint himself. His feast is observed as a holy day in some Eastern Churches. In 1222 the Council of Oxford prohibited servile labor in England on Blaise's feast day. The Germans and Slavs hold him in special honor, and for decades many United States Catholics have sought the annual Saint Blaise blessing for their throats.

We know that Bishop Blaise was martyred in his episcopal city of Sebastea, Armenia in 316. The legendary Acts of St. Blaise were written 400 years later. According to them Blaise was a good bishop, working hard to encourage the spiritual and physical health of his people. Although the Edict of Toleration (311), granting freedom of worship in the Roman Empire, was already five years old, persecution still raged in Armenia. Blaise was apparently forced to flee to the back country. There he lived as a hermit in solitude and prayer, but he made friends with the wild animals. One day a group of hunters seeking wild animals for the amphitheater stumbled upon Blaise's cave. They were first surprised and then frightened. The bishop was kneeling in prayer surrounded by patiently waiting wolves, lions and bears.

The legend has it that as the hunters hauled Blaise off to prison, a mother came with her young son who had a fish bone lodged in his throat. At Blaise's command the child was able to cough up the bone.

Agricolaus, governor of Cappadocia, tried to persuade Blaise to sacrifice to pagan idols. The first time Blaise refused he was beaten. The next time he was suspended from a tree and his flesh torn with iron combs or rakes. Finally, he was beheaded.
